TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

Planning: We dealt with two applications last month. We had no objection to either. One was for the conversion of garage space at Gorsey Down Farm to residential accommodation and the insertion of an extra level without affecting the roof line. The other was for the replacement of a mobile phone antenna at Waylands Farm.

We also noted that the banner advertising which had been displayed in various parts of the village for many weeks had been taken down. This happened in response to action by Tandridge District Council prompted by our query about whether the banners needed planning permission. They did!

Enforcement action by Tandridge has also been upheld on appeal at Cudham Road. A planning inspector has ruled that a mobile home, a motor vehicle and 'residential paraphernalia' must be removed from a piece of agricultural land.

Moorhouse Tile works: In view of the large number of responses on the proposal to turn the tile works at Moorhouse (in the very south of the parish) into a mail distribution depot, the District Council has extended until the end of this month the time allowed for further comments. The application is due to be discussed by the Planning Committee in Oxted on 26th November.

Highways: We reluctantly accepted that, for the time being, there was little prospect of improving pedestrian access along the whole of Church Lane. One landowner has expressed willingness to help make the road safer for walkers, but it has not yet proved possible to make further progress.

Community Games Area: Arrangements have now been made to improve supervision of the Games Area (MUGA) behind the Aileen McHugo Building. We hope that closing it at dusk will deter people from behaving in a way that upsets local residents.

The island outside the Ship: We have made progress on plans to make it easier to use the paths around the horse trough. We have selected a contractor and new stones could be laid as early as mid-January.

Waste bins: Two more dog waste bins have been ordered. Tandridge District Council will install them on our behalf on Westmore Green and in Goatsfield Road.

The vacant land between Ship Hill and the school: We have been asked to clarify the status of the piece of open land on Ship Hill at the start of the path (Footpath 21) which leads eventually to St Mary's Church.

This is part of the land acquired by Surrey County Council in 2008 in order to build the new school. In the event, this area did not become part of the school grounds and is outside the school fence. At one stage it was suggested that the

Parish Council should acquire it to be used as a recreation area, but we did not pursue the idea. So my understanding is that its status is the same as the status of any piece of land through which a public footpath runs. You are free to use the footpath, but unless you have the permission of the owner, you should not stray from the path.

Road Planings: In last month's magazine, those of you who live on un-made roads were invited to ask to be put on the list for road planings arising from the re-surfacing of the Approach Road. The idea was that the material could be used in self-help projects to repair and maintain the un-made roads.

A total of 15 households responded and were given details of how to contact the contractor but, in the event, there was less material arising than had been originally anticipated. This meant that not everyone who asked was successful.

However, the re-surfacing of a short stretch of Lusted Hall Lane is still to come and Church Lane is due to be re-surfaced at some point in the future, so we hope there will be further opportunities for self-help schemes to obtain material to improve some of Tatsfield's un-made roads.

Finally, please don't forget that we try to make as many of ourselves as possible available in the Bakery on **Saturday mornings between 11 a.m. and noon** to respond to any points you wish to raise – the response can also come with a coffee or a tea!

On Tuesday 3rd November at 7.00pm, the Overview & Scrutiny committee will be hosting another **Crime Summit** at the TDC offices. The Chief Executive will introduce the event with an overview of local community safety issues and key partnership projects and initiatives before Surrey

Police and Crime Commissioner, Kevin Hurley, provides an insight into the achievements and challenges of Surrey Police over the last twelve months. In addition, District Inspector Dan Gutierrez will be in attendance to provide an overview of local policing together with Clive Davies, Superintendent for Operations, East Surrey. The public are invited to join in as no doubt they will wish to join in the questions and answers session.

A **council tax phone scam** is currently taking place in our area. Residents are being called by someone claiming to work for Tandridge District Council or the Valuation Office. They are offering the resident a reduced council tax band and a refund if they pay a £65 fee. They are then asked to pay by credit card. Please note Tandridge District Council will never contact residents to ask for credit card, bank or other personal details. We always ask residents to call 01883 722000 to speak to us so they can be sure they are talking to council officers.

Tandridge District Local Plan Consultation - Tandridge District Council is currently preparing a new Local Plan for the Tandridge District. The Local Plan will help shape the future of our district by setting out policies that guide the development of homes and businesses, take into account our green spaces, landscapes and historic character, while also seeking to provide for the needs of all our communities. The Council is at an early stage of the plan preparation process and wants to ensure those who live, work and visit the district have a say and take the opportunity to respond. Subject to the approval of the Planning Policy Committee, the consultation will take place for 10 weeks from 18th December 2015 to 26th February 2016.

Anyone can make comments on the draft Local Plan. There will be more details about how to make comments and these will be published on the website (www.tandridge.gov.uk/localplan) nearer the time. Please look out for them and get involved. To make sure you are kept up to date with the latest news, consultations and events, please sign up for our news direct e-mail service www.tandridge.gov.uk/register.htm.

Residents rate council services and where they live. Tandridge District Council is delighted the findings of the 'Have your say about council services'

survey show residents still rate council services highly, are satisfied with the area they live in and feel well informed.

This report presents the results of a major survey carried out in July to find out residents' views about the Council. Over 1,800 households were randomly selected to take part in the survey about Tandridge District Council services, 620 replied, giving a 34% response rate.

Services are generally rated highly by those that use them, in particular recycling and waste, environmental health, parks and open spaces, street cleaning and council tax collection.

Summary of key findings

- 87% of respondents are satisfied with the area as a place to live and 77% strongly feel they belong to their local area.
- 77% are satisfied with the way the Council runs things, while 69% trust the Council.
- 73% feel safe outside in the local area after dark, while 91% feel safe outside during the day.
- 87% don't think noisy neighbours or parties are a problem, 79% don't think vandalism, graffiti or other deliberate damage to property or vehicles is an issue.
- 70% usually contact the Council by phone, 31% e-mail and 26% use the website.
- 77% think the Council keeps them well informed.
- 84% of respondents read the Tandridge Magazine and 72% think it keeps them informed about the Council's work and local services.
- 80% of respondents have access to e-mail and the internet.
- 47% of respondents read the County Border News, 21% the Caterham Independent and 20% the Surrey Mirror. 20% of respondents listen to BBC Surrey.

On my part I continue to attend the committees of the TDC to see how the system works and with this and interaction with the relevant staff my knowledge is growing, so:

REX BAMBER

7th January 1924 – 2nd October 2015

This tribute to Rex was read at the Thanksgiving Service for his life, held at St Mary's Church on 18th October.



Rex was born as an only child in Balham in January 1924. Those were challenging times and it is thought his early childhood was not an easy one.

As a teenager he found himself on a motorbike, carrying messages to and from air raid wardens during the Blitz and later he became a very enthusiastic motor bike trials rider. He volunteered for active service and joined the RAF in 1941 as a photographer; initially aerial photography of submarines in

Iceland, and then in Scotland focussing on the Tirpitz. He then moved to Allied Intelligence in Marlow to develop photos of the D-Day beachheads.

Wider travel beckoned – he spent 18 months in India, Malaya, Burma and Singapore – including such harrowing experiences as photographing the relief of Changi prison.

After the war he spent some time with the Air Ministry and then moved to a major fashion photography studio before becoming freelance in the early 60's. His photographic expertise was extended from glamorous people to enticing food – he contributed to the first M&S and Sainsbury's cookbooks and his photos were frequently seen in household magazines, often featuring his own Aga.

Rex was a fellow of the Royal Photographic Society and served on its assessment panels. He made major contributions to Croydon Camera Club for which he was awarded an honorary life presidency. His experience and expertise were willingly shared with others and it is good to see the Club represented here today.

His photographic career had brought him into contact with a wide variety of people and situations – the Queen's wedding, Liberace, Margot Fonteyn, Max Bygraves, Ray Ellington and the Beatles, who he described as 'nice lads'.

However there is far more to Rex than photography – his family life was very important to him, having married Margot in 1962, a year before moving to Tatsfield, followed later by the arrival of Kate. The family meal was a significant

event for him. He enjoyed playing chess with Daisy – or at least he did until she started to beat him.

He enjoyed watercolours and even created a board game. He liked to be in the garden – although not actually doing the gardening! He was a keen supporter of the National Trust and loved animals. He played golf at North Downs and at Parkwood and supported Margot during her year as Ladies' Captain. The recent Paynesfield Road Gang booklet records his contribution.

Rex read widely and had a very distinctive, possibly irreverent, sense of humour. As well as starting some sentences with a twinkle in his eye and the words 'when I was in the war', he appreciated the style and writings of Terry Pratchett – hence the quote on the back of your service sheet. Ronnie Barker was another favourite of his.

Sadly Rex's health began to fail but he would still be seen getting to Linda's to get the paper and he had was fortunate to have the committed support of Margot.

Rex will be remembered with great affection by many and will be sorely missed. We have been privileged to have known him.

SMOOTHING JOHNS ROAD

The photo on the front cover shows the John's Road gang spreading the scrapings from the Approach Road. Despite the appalling weather we stuck with it and got it done.

The work started the previous day when an excavator was used to flatten the high points in the road and to fill in some of the pot holes.

The following day a roller was bought in and Trevor Chris and Lee (in the picture) started rolling the road flat from 7.30 in the morning until just before it was due to be collected and taken back to the hire stop. The scrapings arrived about 10 and from then on a small gang of residents spent some time raking and flattening the scrapings for the roller to compress - a good team effort which would not have been achieved without the cups of teas and slices of lemon drizzle cake being on offer as a reward for the work undertaken.

Our thanks to our County Councillor David Hodge, the contractor Marshall's and our Parish Council for working together to get this organised. Thanks also go to Linda Bennett who organised the renting of the machinery and organised the troops to get this done.

I know it sounds obvious, but always pick up and hold a sparkler by the unlit end. It looks less fun, but it won't scar you for life. If fireworks have been bought, and are being fired in a back garden, please inform your immediate neighbours beforehand, especially if they have a cat or dog. And never return to a lit firework if it somehow fails to ignite. Leave it alone for a long while, then douse with water to be safe. Lastly, enjoy it all!! Isn't it a shame it only happens once a year? Whatever you get up to, be safe and be good.....'cos if you're bad, we'll be after you!

A SWAZILAND EXPERIENCE

Swaziland, a landlocked nation bordered by South Africa and Mozambique, is a quiet country ruled by Africa's last absolute monarch, King Maswati III, together with a government he appoints. Six out of ten of its people live in poverty and it has the highest incidence of HIV in the world.

In September Jed and I were lucky enough to spend two days in this country as part of a longer holiday in South Africa. We went to visit a child we sponsor, and to see what is happening in his community as a result of the World Vision Australia project that has been at work there for the past eight years. Vulindlela, who is 11, lives with his parents and extended family – nine of them in total. On the day we visited the family's rural home was shrouded in mist and drizzle (very reminiscent of Tatsfield). It is a small holding which consists of a few buildings; one where they sleep, another where they cook and a round mud house (a rondawel) that the community uses as its prayer room. The family grows a few vegetables and keeps chickens and goats. The father does not have work at the moment but is the community's Christian Minister and hopes one day to build a church on the adjacent land. They do not benefit from electricity or clean water. Although the Macdvulwini project will change that when pipework is laid, hopefully within the next 12 months, that will enable clean water to flow to a standpipe about 200m away. The scale of this task cannot be appreciated unless one actually sees the distance the brand-new water tank is from the communities it is to serve. We also visited Vulindela's school and on that day it was without water for the second time in a week. This meant that the children had to go home early.



One would expect that the country's scarce funds would be spent in improving the life of its 1.3 million people and yet in March 2014 a glitzy new airport and road system was opened. The airport and its 200 space car park are empty. It handles only three flights a day and the new road leading to it is virtually devoid of traffic – we saw only one other car in more than half an hour. Added to this, construction has begun on a 500 room hotel and conference centre. Along with the airport, they are part of the King's Millennium Project - a plan to turn Swaziland into a first world nation by 2022! Also planned are a theme park, a trade centre, a sporting complex and an amusement park. The contrast with how the majority of Swazis live is totally incongruous.





As in South Africa, stalls litter (literally) the sides of many of the roads with traders selling everything from haircuts to fruit and vegetables to handcrafts. Swaziland has a thriving handcraft industry much of which is Fairtrade and sustainable. It also has its own Fairtrade network - SWIFT - that provides training, trade and advocacy to its members. Some of these handcrafts are available in Britain. You may come across 'Gone Rural' grass placemats in John Lewis or 'Black Mumba' Chilli Sauce through Traidcraft, while others sell to the UK directly through the internet such as Quazi Design who make jewellery from waste magazines. A visit to the SWIFT website will reveal many individual and unusual items which would make a great alternative to the usual mass produced Christmas gifts.

You will all have noticed by now that the team have stripped all the beds of the summer plants and removed the mangers, troughs and hanging baskets from around the village centre. These were all taken to the village composting site, before it closed down, to continue our recycling.



We have now planted the Bakery Lawn and Tatol beds out for the autumn and winter with

polyanthus plants in red, white and blue to continue our French theme. These have been interspersed with narcissus bulbs which should make a good show in the spring.

The containers and troughs around the Village Hall and beds in the front have been planted with blue myosotis (forget-me-nots) and mixed bellis daisies also accompanied by narcissus bulbs. The remaining polyanthus plants have been



put in the cascade container.

ISABELLA IN PERU

Readers may recall the letter in September in which Isabella Gabelli wrote of her impending departure for Peru as part of the Project Trust. She now sends us some of her experiences there.

Due to some unforeseen circumstances Ava and I have been transferred to a new project. We are now to be located in the Amazon in a town called Pucallpa, which sits alongside of Ucayali River. We are so happy here and the children and helpers are so sweet and kind towards us. We have been here now for one month and thought I would give you all an update of what we have done so far.

To celebrate Ava and my one-month anniversary in the Amazon, we thought we'd have a lil' recap on what we've done so far. And this is it:-

We have experienced eight tropical storms; one lunar eclipse; cleared at least 20 ant infestations from our room alone; been greeted in the shower by cockroaches, frogs and spiders; constantly sweeping goat's poo off our garden path; been bitten alive; watched four chickens that woke us up every morning being beheaded, plucked, butchered and served at lunchtime; been projectile vomited on by a one year old; joined a youth prevention organisation; attended two baby showers and a fifteenth birthday party; ridden the back of motorbikes for the first time; caught our first moto taxi solo and survived; attended a community development event; seen traditional dances performed in the main street; danced zumba in the main square; been officially welcomed by the regional government; handed gifts to a hundred or so elderly people; been to a rock concert and a rap battle; been to Pucallpa's hottest club; sang karaoke; been to an English pub owned by a Welshman; witnessed the crowning of Miss Pucallpa; celebrated spring; danced Waka Waka in front of our whole Aldea for its 28th anniversary party, which landed us featuring in the regional news and local paper; learnt how to cross stitch; had our first bucket shower; been taught how to properly dance Reggaton/ Salsa; seen an adoption, an arrival and an escapee; have got lost in our town on our own; woken at 5 am to have the house fumigated; purchased new mugs for our bedroom; constantly stared at and stopped by randomers for selfies because of our blue eyes; been prepared traditional cuisine (including ceviche and lomo saltado); eaten weird jungle fruit (one in particular with a hard scaly shell) and river fish; never discussed bowel movements so frequently; brought 24 rolls of toilet paper in the sale and built a den when it rained. but I can assure you all.. we have been teaching as well!

TWO CONCERTS IN NOVEMBER!

North Downs Sinfonia will be presenting a Russian-themed concert on Saturday, 14th November at the Village Hall at 7.30pm as usual, and an EXTRA concert the preceding Sunday, 8th November, principally (but not exclusively) for schoolchildren.

In the main concert, we will be playing the overture to Ruslan and Lyudmilla, by

Glinka – a fast and furious work, followed by Prokofiev's Peter and the Wolf. Part 1 will end with a selection from Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite, which everyone knows and loves. After the interval, we will be playing the intensely romantic Rachmaninov Piano Concerto No 2, with our favourite soloist Mariela Cingo. This is consistently in the



top three best-loved pieces of classical music, and has recently been voted number one in the all-time Classic FM Hall of Fame - a concerto not to be missed!

As many of you will know, the music to the old fairy tale Peter and the Wolf was written primarily to introduce some of the instruments of the orchestra to children. Thus (amongst others) the flute depicts the bird, the duck is depicted by the oboe, Peter by the strings and the wolf by the French horns. There will be a **SPECIAL CONCERT** on **Sunday**, 8th **November at 4.30pm in the Village**

Hall, principally for children and their parents, although all are welcome. This short concert will just be **Peter and the Wolf**, and will be entirely informal. FREECYCLE FRAUD



This is a message sent via The Neighbourhood & Home Watch Network (England & Wales). This information has been sent on behalf of Action Fraud (National Fraud

Intelligence Bureau).

Fraudsters are targeting online advertising platforms where items are acquired for free. The fraudsters will list items on the website and advise any purchasers that they have recently moved from the area they were originally living in and can arrange a courier to dispatch the items for a fee.

The payment requested for this service is usually via Money Transfer such as MoneyGram or Western Union, or an e-money voucher. The items they were promised are not received and any attempts to contact the individual to gain a refund are unsuccessful.

Protect Yourself:

- Stay within the auction guidelines stipulated on the website.
- Ask to view the item in person.
- Be cautious of making advance payments to a stranger via Money Transfer or e-money products.
- If the item advertised seems too good to be true, it probably is.

TATSFIELD HISTORY PROJECT



Over the past decades the Tatsfield History Project has been involved in a number of publications. First was 'Tatsfield – the First 2,000 Years', published in time for the millennium and sold out many years ago. Since then we've been involved in the production of the history of the school, the story of the folly (Tangland Castle) in Goatsfield Road and the recently-distributed account of the activities of the

Paynesfield Road Gang.

I am often prompted to provide a new, updated version of the history of Tatsfield. Apart from adding accounts of some of the events of the last decade and a half and correcting any errors in the first edition, a new version would be able to take account of material that has found its way into our archives since 1999.

Absorbing all this material and cataloguing it has been quite a task and there's a backlog to be dealt with. It would be great to have help re-arranging our collection of pictures and providing captions. We also need to find a means of copying some documents that have been partially bound into record books before the originals go to join other irreplaceable documents which we have now deposited at the Surrey History Centre in Woking. Other tasks include scanning newspaper cuttings, checking the accuracy of the archive catalogue and selecting material for future publications as well as ideas for small displays of item from the archives.

To give you an idea of what historical records of Tatsfield exist and an opportunity to see whether you would like to help out, I am hoping to mount a display of material, including videos and Powerpoint presentations, in the Aileen McHugo Building over the weekend of 28th/29th November.

Notices will be displayed nearer the time if the display does indeed go ahead. If you are interested in helping out, please send an email – even if you have already expressed an interest in the past.

We have an expert and friendly postmistress in the centre of our village – Linda Dance. Make sure you use her, especially over the next couple of months when most of us will be thinking of posting letters, cards and parcels locally,

elsewhere in this country and abroad. If you are unsure about dates, rules or costs, just pop in and ask Linda before it is too late. Some of the things you may want to think about are:



• Check your latest posting dates. There is still plenty of time for cards and parcels sent within the UK but some of the latest dates to countries abroad are coming up fast.

- Check what is the most economical way to send parcels and to use special services like next day delivery. Ask Linda!
- Check what is the best way to make returns.
- Make sure you use the right postcode. If you are unsure, you can find out on www.royalmail.com/postcode-finder.
- Put a return address on a parcel just in case something goes wrong.
- There are some everyday items you cannot post. For example, you cannot post perfume, nail varnish or aftershave abroad (you can post them to addresses in this country but you have to use a special label). Make sure you get it right by asking Linda!

As for your Christmas shopping, you will find that the shop has a good selection of cards and wrapping paper plus trimmings for you to choose from.

ANOTHER SCAM

Motorists are receiving a fraudulent e-mail stating they will lose their licence if they fail to verify personal details online, the Driver & Vehicle Licensing Agency(DVLA) confirmed. It is likely that thousands, perhaps hundreds of thousands, have already received this message that claims to be from the DVLA.

The email contains a link to a website that resembles a legitimate online service. It also instructs the victim to enter his/her licence number plus a means of payment such as a credit or debit card number. The fraudster can then use this information to pay for goods and services.

Perhaps more seriously, the driver might become a victim of identity theft.

The Driver & Vehicle Licensing Agency said: "By using the online driving licence or vehicle tax services on GOV.UK, you can be sure that you are dealing directly with DVLA - and you will not be charged any additional fees". It explained: "Always start at www.gov.uk" rather than via a search engine where less honest sites might appear in the sponsored links or paid for section.

Furthermore, it claimed that such sites: "Often break the search engine providers' terms and conditions" and should be reported as necessary. Such sites can then be removed from any search results.

TATTY KNITTERS



This explains a lot.....

ROBES PROJECT, 27TH NOVEMBER

Last year I experienced just one evening of what homeless people face every single day - I spent the night sleeping out on the cold, concrete slabs in the grounds of Southwark Cathedral. The autumn leaves falling on my face was a weird sensation, and I knew I was lucky enough to be going back home to a warm cup of tea, shower and central heating - all things we take for granted.

The Robes Project was set up in January 2007 to support homeless people by giving them a safe, warm place to sleep, a hot meal, advice and support as they start to rebuild their lives. 22 churches in the Southwark Diocese and over 400 volunteers offer a temporary night shelter during the winter months, from November to April, of each year for 15-20 people sleeping rough in South London every winter night.

Robes costs around £90,000 annually to operate (approx. £46 per guest per week). It receives no public funding and relies solely on donations from churches, individuals, businesses and grants.

By spending a sponsored night outdoors, the main fundraising event, we help a rough-sleeper access short-term aid in winter and year round support in finding stable accommodation, training and employment.

Last year, the Sleepout raised over £80,000, which meant it could provide advice and support for rough sleepers throughout the year, as well as providing clean bedding for guests this winter.

The event is exceptionally well organised with a real sense of community spirit. I didn't know anyone but that doesn't matter as everyone is there for the same reason - we just want to do our little bit to help those less fortunate. Before we bed down for the night in our sleeping bags and cardboard mats, there is some organised musical entertainment and a short evening service in the Cathedral for those who wish to participate. Refreshments are available throughout the night and the torchlights of St John Ambulance volunteers flickering as they meander amongst the sprawled huddles of people young and old checking all is OK, are a comfort.

Tatsfield is in the Diocese of Southwark, and with local food banks becoming more prevalent in every town, it could be any one of us who one day has to unexpectedly knock on the door of a shelter wanting help and a warm bed.

So come Friday, 27 November I will once again be setting out my sleeping bag for the night, representing St Mary's church. Any support you might be able to offer, no matter in what way or how small - it all really counts to a rough-sleeper who needs help when the thermometer hits -5 degrees for the 2nd week in a row.

The Local Plan is the name for the documents which together set out a Local Planning Authority's development plan policies for their area.

The Core Strategy sets out the key policies for the district, this was adopted in 2008. Tandridge District Council agreed in September 2012 to commence work on a review of the Core Strategy (see below).

The Local Plan Part 2 - Detailed policies, to be used in the determination of planning applications was adopted on 24th July 2014.

In March 2012 the Government published the new National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) which sets out policy guidance to be taken into account by Councils when they prepare their local plans and when they make decisions on planning applications. This has been supplemented with the national Planning Practice Guidance.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO THIS MONTH



It was towards the end of November 1915 that news came of the eighth Tatsfield man to be killed in the war.

For one family, however, it was the second son to have died. 32 year old James Asling had been killed in France in August. Now, news came from the Middle East that his 30 year old brother, George, had been killed on the 21st of November in the defence against the Turks of the British colony of Aden. He is buried at Maala Cemetery, Aden (now Yemen) and was a member of 70 Company, Royal Garrison Artillery.

Gunner Asling was born in Battersea in 1885 and enlisted at Woolwich. His name appears on the memorial plaque in St Mary's Church, as does that of his brother James, but the Tatsfield archives have no record of whereabouts in the village the family lived or what their connection with Tatsfield was.

At home, the Parish Council, which met only every other month in those days, was keeping itself informed about the modernisation of daily life which had continued despite the war. It had contributed funds towards helping the connection of Tatsfield properties to newly-installed water mains and motor vehicles were already bringing not only the advantages of modern life but the disadvantages too. The increase in traffic had meant increased wear and tear to what was still an unmade road – Ricketts Hill Road – and the responsibility for repairing damage outside 'Hazeldene' was under debate.

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – NOVEMBER 2015

As I mentioned last month, three of the brighter planets are currently rendezvousing in the morning skies. Highest in the sky will be Jupiter, below that is Mars (which appears to be closest to the Moon on that day) and then a little lower is the brilliant Venus which is so bright it is impossible to mistake it for anything else. The exodus of the bright planets to the pre-dawn skies does mean that there are none currently on view in the evening.



However, the winter constellations are just beginning to appear in the east and by mid-November at 9pm Orion, the hunter and Taurus the bull are above the horizon, giving a hint of things to come in the long nights ahead. Taurus contains two so called "open clusters", which are collections of stars that are gravitationally linked to each other, travelling through space as a group. The two such clusters in the bull are known as the Hyades and the Pleiades. These can easily be found by first locating Orion and his belt. The map shows how Taurus and Orion appear with relation to the eastern horizon and indicates the position of the row of three stars that form the hunter's belt.

Draw an imaginary line through the belt and continue it upwards away from the horizon. It will pass close to a bright star (Aldebaran) that looks slightly orange. If you look carefully you will see that Aldebaran forms part of a distinct "V" shape of stars, albeit lying on its side. This is the Hyades cluster, and although the bright star seems to be part of the group it is, in fact, not related at all and simply lies in the same line of sight. If you return to your imaginary line and continue it in the general direction it was previously travelling, it will pass close to what at first appears to be a small misty patch of light. If you study it for a moment you will realise that it is a small group of stars that appear very close together. This is the Pleiades cluster which lies at a distance of 440 light years from Earth although it is still considered to be one of the closest clusters. It is also known as the "Seven Sisters" due to the number of stars visible to the naked eye, although some people claim to see 14. Despite the number we can see unaided, we know that the group has more than one thousand members.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN NOVEMBER

What do we make of nature's warning signs around us? We hear reports of birds migrating a month early, the hedges are heavy with berries, some say the leaves on the trees are falling early and some frost hollows report ground frost very early too. The recent persistent high pressure is very early and there has been plenty of early snow over the Alps and also on lower ground in Germany, Austria and eastern France. We have no way of knowing if these are indicators of an early winter here, but there is no doubt that our winter weather in Tatsfield has been much later in recent years, so who knows. It is best to be ready for any sort of bad weather at this time of the year, as I write these gardening notes I am very aware that it was this day (16th October) in 1987 that we had the worst storm in living memory and Tatsfield was cut off by road with a lot of big trees down that took weeks to sort out.

On that cheery note there are some important gardening jobs to do this month! Leaf clearing will be top of the list, not only in the garden but in the gutters and drains as well to make sure any heavy rain can drain away efficiently. If you are planning to compost your leaves remember to avoid doing this with Horse Chestnut that has been attacked by the leaf miner; stacking them provides the ideal conditions for this serious pest to successfully overwinter and ready to attack again next year. I know it is not very neighbourly but the best way to deal with these leaves is to burn them, preferably when they are dry. I don't advise taking them to the local tip (Bond Road is our nearest Surrey site) as they will be transported elsewhere potentially spreading the infection.

I try to avoid talking about the law in gardening but it is important to note that this year saw the coming into force of the Infrastructure Act 2015. This Act has proved to be very controversial as it contains important changes for planning, fracking and managing our highways; this has masked the very important Part 4 that provides powers for local authorities to take enforcement action, including

prosecution, against landowners/homeowners to control Non Native Species both plant and animal on land and in water. I am looking into how this will impact on those landowners/gardeners who have problems with Japanese Knotweed and other pests that are listed as non-native species and must be controlled – watch this space!

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

The Bird Register:

Current display:

The 'Bird Register', unlike 'Nature Notes', is something I inherited, hence the readership consultation. I must say, I've never been happy using percentages of responders as a means of recording the results of the survey. Even with minor changes made over the years the chart still presents difficulties for some and is misleading. Consequently, I am now proposing a change to the way the recorded observations are presented. Here's the problem as I see it. Let's say that two responders out of twenty (10%) observe and record a solitary kite flying over the village during the period January to June, followed by four responders out of twenty (20%) seeing and recording what was probably the same solitary kite flying over the village during the July to December period. The 'Bird Register' will show a 100% increase in kite sightings, but implies that there was a two-fold increase in the number of kites. To add to this confusion, because the number of respondents varies from year to year, the numeric variance is greatly distorted; two sightings from 20 respondents is shown as 10% but from 10 respondents it is 20%. Obviously, the number of reported sightings is irrelevant. What matters is that at least one person made the observation and recorded it. My proposal, therefore, is that we scrap the percentages and use instead a simple 'seen' symbol. Here's an example:-

This simplified form of display, combined with the contributions from John (Rosenbaum) and our growing band of reporters, will, I feel sure, be sufficient to satisfy our ornithological needs whilst at the same time presenting a clear, visual pattern that everyone can easily interpret and understand. Furthermore, I would like to produce the register annually rather than bi-annually as at present. The date of observations is, of course, of interest, particularly when recording migrants, but the register has never been able to show this so we have relied, and will continue to rely, on individuals sending in details, including the date of their observations (see examples below). Hopefully, these changes will prove agreeable. If so, they will be implemented at the end of the year in preparation for the 2016 survey. You have until the end of this month to suggest otherwise!

Hobby sightings:

Although not on the register, John (Rosenbaum) did mention in his notes that he had a 'possible' sighting of a Hobby on 30th April and a sighting on the 5th May. I can now confirm the presence of a local Hobby by adding my own observation of 31st August. This was one of those totally unexpected events that happen now and again. I was taking in the washing when a bird, like a giant Swift, zoomed across the sky, quite low, heading towards some trees further down the road. As it approached the trees it veered away, heading back directly towards me. It could only have been some ten yards away from me when it sped between ours and our neighbour's houses, disappearing through the Lime trees across the road. Needless to say, the washing had to wait while I rushed indoors, leafing through various books to confirm what I thought I'd seen. Now, if you missed out on this one you're going to have to wait a while. Being summer migrants, by the time you read this, the Hobby will be on its way back to Africa; a 2,500 mile journey. But, you never know, it (or they) may be back next year.

Correspondence:

Talking of migrants, here's news of an early winter visitor, probably from Scandinavia, visiting Liz and Alan's (Armitage) garden at the top of Greenway:

(07/10/15) 'Just been watching a flock of about 20 birds flying around and settling on the TV aerial above Ken's house at the bottom of our footpath. Thrush sized. Brown, speckled body. Pinkish tinge to breast when caught in sunlight. Alan says greenish breast, but I don't see that. Long pointed beaks. What are they?'

I initially suggested Starlings! Their partly metallic plumage changes colour in the sunlight which could have explained why Liz saw pink and Alan saw green.

'They definitely weren't starlings - we know what they look like - and we have never seen these before. Alan recognises more bird species than me, and he wasn't sure. We've looked in our book, maybe a Woodlark or some type of bunting? Unfortunately, too far away to take a photo but we could see through binoculars. Big, like a Collared Dove, but creamy beige with heavy dark brown splodges on back & wings. Slight pinkish sheen on breast when flying. Alan still says turquoise (which probably means grey!)'

On the basis of information provided in both emails I then suggested Fieldfares.

'Oooooooohhhhhh how exciting - is it rare to see them here? Read up on it and it does seem likely. The nearest we have got anyway.'

Not rare, Liz, but definitely exciting. A flock was seen around Crossways last year. They tend to appear, feed on some found berries then move on. So, if you've been lucky enough to see them, the rest of us will be (and are) quite envious!

PUMP HUNT FOR SEWAGE STATION OWNERS

Thames Water is to take on the responsibility for 4,000 sewage pumping stations from property owners and managers. The utility will take over electricity and maintenance costs under new legislation, potentially saving customers thousands of pounds.

Thames Water is appealing to customers to help identify privately-owned sewage pumping stations.

The utility, which serves 15 million customers across London and the Thames Valley, will take responsibility for around 4,000 pumping stations in October 2016, but needs to track down 1,800 currently off its radar.

New legislation means sewage pumping stations, which power wastewater away from properties and out into the public sewer pipe network, currently owned and maintained by customers will become legally owned and operated by the local water company.

The pumping stations are found in all shapes and sizes, and can be in places where there are a number of properties needing to connect to the public sewer network. Customers will know they have one as they'll be paying to maintain and power them.

Jerry White, of Thames Water, said: "This is really good news for customers. We'd urge anyone who thinks they may have one to get in touch so we can check they are eligible for the transfer of ownership. In some cases, as well as electricity savings, maintaining and replacing pumps can cost thousands of pounds so it's an excellent deal for them.

"We believe we know where approximately half of the stations we need to take over are, but really need help to find the other 1,800. Please get in touch if you think this applies to you and we can take on the responsibility forever."

A sewer pumping station is likely to be 'adopted' by Thames Water if it:

- was in use before July 2011 (and)
- serves a single property, and is outside the property boundary (or)
- serves two or more properties.
