One thing that appears to have struck a chord with people from the Queen's message, was her quotation attributed to St Teresa of Calcutta: "Not all of us can do great things but we can do small things with great love". The Archbishop's message complemented this, with a focus on the great themes of forgiveness, reconciliation and unity, which could all be seen as expressions of love.

What about life here in Tatsfield in 2017? It has been said that "we may not be able to change the world but we can change the world for one person" – and hopefully some of us are already doing that by being good neighbours to those around us. On another level, we cherish the continuation of village traditions as the annual calendar unfolds but hopefully we shall also see new people adding their support alongside those who already sustain them. Finally, I wonder what new ventures and projects may emerge to "break new ground" and add to the rich tapestry of life in Tatsfield and at this time I join with others in wishing every success to the new owners and staff of our local pub, The Ship, as it is relaunched this month.

I wish you a happy and hope-filled New Year.

Our locum, Maureen Gibbons, has kindly agreed to show her the ropes until she finds her feet so we are confident the transition will be smooth.

Our December meeting sees us set the budget for the coming year and we agreed to keep the precept at £42,000. Whilst we do have several projects running we thought it best that any shortfall should be absorbed by the Parish Council's reserves rather than increase the tax paid by Tatsfield residents.

A Neighbourhood Plan Development Committee has been set up with its first meeting with James Garside, our appointed consultant, deciding on its next steps. You will see on page 28 of the Magazine that we are asking for volunteers to help establish what will be best for Tatsfield, so if you are interested in taking part please do get in touch.

We have also agreed our response to Tandridge's Local Plan Sites Consultation. The main site which affects the village contains the rear gardens of a number of houses in Paynesfield Road. The proposal is that this site is removed from the Green Belt and included in the village settlement area. This would make way for houses being built along the unmade part of Westmore Road. The Parish Council agreed to object to this proposal on the basis that the boundary of the defined village was drawn deliberately tightly to prevent urban sprawl and further erosion of the Green Belt.

We were also asked to comment on whether we felt the village as a whole should be removed from the Green Belt and should become 'inset'. We have been unable to obtain clarity on what exactly this would mean for Tatsfield and so responded stating that we were unable to make an informed decision on the information currently provided but that we would not want to reduce the level of protection offered by current policies.

And finally, I suspect Christmas feels an awfully long time ago now but I do hope that you all enjoyed the new Christmas lights on the Old Ship Island. As you can imagine it took an awful lot of hard work and perseverance to achieve such a brilliant result and I'd like to thank not only Councillors Kells and Sarll but also Doug Freeze, Stuart Farmer (seen below right installing the lights) and Ted Chaproniere, without whose help the project would not have succeeded.

TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

I hope you all had a very Happy Christmas and may I wish you all the very best for 2017.

The Visit of Police Inspector in November: My apologies for the very late cancellation of the visit of Chief Inspector, Neighbourhoods - Major Crime Team, Surrey and Sussex Police – Mark Preston. Mark had been off sick for some time before our scheduled meeting and has remained ill since so we obviously wish him a speedy recovery and return to work.

I did receive a visit from Jackie Elkins, Temporary Chief Inspector in the absence of Mark Preston, and Inspector Dan Gutierrez our own Neighbourhood Inspector. Mike Sarll from the Parish Council and I discussed with them matters regarding policing in Tatsfield. With this in mind we have agreed that they will return sometime in March ahead of a Parish Council meeting where they will update us on matters relevant to Tatsfield. I will advise the details when this has been confirmed.

Local Plan - Drop in sessions: I hope the Drop-in that I organised for the 12th

December proved useful for those that attended the session. It was well run by both myself, members of the Parish Council and the three staff members from Tandridge District Council. It seemed that the important item that affects us was the Plan called "TAT005" (Paynesfield Rd) where it was suggested that this area could be developed. Having seen the facts and the options I hope you took the opportunity to "Have your Say" by



visiting and commenting on the Local Plan. By the time you read this the consultation will have closed and the next stage will be the consultation on the Local Plan Preferred Strategy in the Autumn/Winter of 2017.

Tandridge Magazine winter issue 2016: I have been advised by one resident that this was not received. I trust everyone else received their copy of this Magazine.

Moorhouse Tile Works planning application: I can confirm that this application has now been withdrawn from the formal planning system but that negotiations continue to see if there is a better way forward either with this application or a different way of using the facilities that already exist on site.

At the full Tandridge Council meeting of the 17th November I was appointed to a second committee, **Community Services**, restoring the correct percentage of independent councillors on committees. So, I am now a member of this committee as well as Housing. Last month saw the normal round of council meetings and it will be the same for January although these are more important. These are the budget-setting

meetings for each committee whose recommendations are then sent to full Council for approval. You will start to hear much about budget shortfalls involving both Tandridge and Surrey Councils - amongst others - due to decreased government grants. The news regarding the level of Council Tax for 2017/18 is unlikely to be good.

Finally, as we go to print I spent the morning of the 5th January walking the streets of Tatsfield helping David Hodge deliver his election leaflet in readiness for this year's County Council elections, but more on that later. I did this with him so that I could show him the problems we are having with the "lorries" using the unmade roads - John's Road, Westmore Road, Kemsley Road - and I hope this will have helped him to formulate a set of road signs that will help us deal with this problem in the future.

SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL

Dear residents: Happy New Year to you all and I hope that 2017 brings happiness to everyone in Tatsfield.

As I write this contribution early in January at County Hall I am still leading the work on the forthcoming budget to be announced on 7th February. During the first 20 days of January (as that is when we publish the draft papers) I shall be taking our case to the Government for fairer funding. SCC currently has a duty to look after individuals and in three key areas we require support from the Government. This is because of rising demand from adults requiring Social Care Services, rising demand for children with Special Educational Needs and, specifically for Surrey, how we fund the Learning Disabilities cases for which we took over responsibility from the NHS on 1st April 2011. At the time of that transfer of responsibility the NHS passed the annual £64 million funding for these high need cases to SCC to provide daily care. We have the highest number of individuals with Learning Disabilities in the UK and hence the loss of this funding is critical to our annual budget discussions.

I am leading discussions with the Government at this stage. The question is how does SCC continue to carry out its duties to these individuals now that the annual grant has been removed from our budget. This has left a significant black hole and I will be doing all I can to get Government to address this funding requirement.

My New Year wish is that the Government ensures that Surrey residents receive fair funding as, after all, we make the second highest contribution to the Government for distribution for public services across the UK.

Likewise, I also believe that the Government should look again at its Overseas Aid Budget. Where local councils are looking after children from overseas I see no logical reason why overseas aid funds should not be used to support those children who are

now in the UK. This would provide much needed financial support to councils in Surrey and throughout the UK.

So, wish me luck in my discussions with the Government.

CBE FOR OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

David Hodge has been awarded a CBE in the Queen's New Year Honours for services to local government and charity.

David said: "I'm delighted and honoured to receive this accolade which is really a tribute to the tireless work of thousands of council and charity workers who deliver services to the people of Surrey.

"It's a huge privilege to serve the residents of Surrey as a councillor and as its leader and I'm determined to carry on doing all I can to stand up for the County including when it comes to highlighting the funding pressures we're facing.

"I wouldn't be able to carry out my local government and voluntary work without the support of my wife and family and this award also recognises all the help they've given me over the years. I'm very grateful to them and I'm looking forward to them joining me when I receive my award."

Following a 22-year career in the British Army, David was elected to Tandridge District Council in 1992. He was elected to Surrey County Council in 2005 and became Deputy Leader in 2009. As Deputy Leader, he led a Public Value Review of every service and department in the Council which uncovered £280million of savings.

In 2011, David became Leader of Surrey. He championed a "one team" approach — where organisations work together in the best interests of residents — which has helped Surrey win awards including "Council of the Year" at the Efficiency Awards 2013.

Mr Hodge grew up in an orphanage and a boys' home and, in recognition of his upbringing, he has worked to provide opportunities for young people.

Mr Hodge is Leader of the Local Government Association's Conservative Group and Vice-Chairman of the LGA. He has also served as Chairman of the County Councils Network.

A dedicated Rotarian, he has served as President of his local club and District Governor of Surrey and Sussex, and holds Rotary awards for his charitable work over 25 years.

In 2005 he led a team of Rotarians to Sierra Leone to raise funds and help build a hospital. Over the next three years he led a further team to raise nearly £200,000 to help build a new village for 670 orphaned children, providing a school, training centre and homes.

POLICE REPORT

Hello Tatsfield.

I can't believe it's 2017 already. What is it about the month of December that makes it simply fly by? Probably the expectation - I always liken December to a balloon. You blow it up, bigger and bigger, then at the moment both you and the balloon can't take it anymore it suddenly bursts, and there is nothing left - it's all gone flat, you're exhausted and there's a lot of mess strewn around just like the aftermath of Christmas!!

Anyway, philosophies aside, December has been generally (quiet) on the crime front, but sadly not completely - more vehicle crime to be exact. A Ford Transit van was stolen from outside a property on Old Lane during the night. A neighbour saw it leave, but at the time thought it was their neighbour leaving. Despite the vehicle immediately being put on the national vehicle tracking system ever since, as yet, it has not been located.

Also, an unmarked delivery van was taken during the day, whilst a delivery was being made in Paynesfield Road. Using its internal tracker, the van was soon located near Brands Hatch and the driver reunited with it that afternoon. Police believe that due to the location being unlikely for someone to have followed the vehicle, waiting to grab an opportunity, it is more likely that the suspect was more local and grabbed their opportunity while passing. Sadly, the lines of enquiry have been exhausted.

Finally, you probably are all already aware of the extensive damage caused to the gazebo that was used for the Carol Service on Westmore Green. This happened late the same evening, with the main suspects, a group of 4-5 drunken teenagers, having just left a large party up at the Football Club. Obviously, because this sort of incident simply doesn't happen in Tatsfield, it caused widespread anger and disbelief. Despite various investigations by colleagues, there are now no lines of enquiry, as no witnesses were identified, no CCTV overlooked the scene and because the offenders were part of a large group, trying to identify those few has proved an impossible task. Further enquiries by the reporting resident with the Council and the school the boys attend, may glean more information. Also, the Council will be reviewing whether similar events can be held in future at the Sports Club.

Well, that's it for now. Wrap up, stay warm, take Echinacea to avoid colds and flu and kids - let's hope you get to have snowball fights I can intervene or join in with.

We are seeking help and input from anyone with a keen interest in the future growth of Tatsfield over the next 20 years, but in particular, anyone with interest in the planning, the legal and development process, project management, infrastructure development and local government. The topics that need thought include:

Natural Environment and Landscape Built Environment Housing / Affordable Housing Transport and Parking Community Facilities Local Economy

This project will be ongoing for the next year or two and will involve significant communication with local bodies and interested parties, so please come and get involved if you care about Tatsfield.





POPPY APPEAL 2016



Once again Jane Abram organised the collection for the Poppy Appeal in Tatsfield last November, when the magnificent total of £2,657 was collected. Collection boxes were placed in the Grasshopper Inn, St. Mary's Church, Park Wood Golf Club, Tatsfield School, the Bakery, Linda's Stores, the Village Club, the Summerhouse, the Village Hall and Thackray Williams (the solicitors

where Jane's daughter Imogen works). In addition, Jane with Pam Draper, Lorna Tony, Richard Swadling and Imogen stood and collected at the Clacket Lane M25 Service Station (which is in the parish of Tatsfield), where almost half of the total collected was given.

Jane is grateful to all the places where collection boxes were located, and in turn the village as a whole thank Jane and those who helped her.

The Poppy Appeal was first held in 1921, the year the British Legion was founded. Red silk poppies, inspired by the famous World War I poem "In Flanders Fields", sold out instantly. The funds helped World War I veterans find jobs and housing after the war. There is a long history of collections in Tatsfield each year. The funds raised are used by the Royal British Legion to support the welfare of the Armed Forces.

In addition to the total above, the Remembrance Day service at St Mary's resulted in a collection of £90 which has also been forwarded to the British Legion.

Dementia Friendly Tatsfield Open Meeting Parish Room on Tuesday 14th March 7.30 pm

What have we done already?

There have been two Alzheimer's Society Dementia Friends sessions held in the village and, as a result, over 30 people are now Dementia Friends. This means that more of us, here in Tatsfield, now know that dementia is an umbrella term to describe a range of brain diseases that trigger a gradual loss of brain function - thinking, remembering and reasoning and that while there is currently no cure, there is much we can do as a community to support those whose lives are affected by dementia. It is ways of doing this in Tatsfield that we are continuing to explore. As a community, more of us are talking about dementia. This is important if we are to break down the fear and anxiety often associated with a dementia diagnosis. Those with dementia and their friends and family need support and understanding. There is some way to go until we think, act and talk about dementia, to ensure that those with dementia feel they can continue to be involved and included in their community.

What are we doing next?

Two Tatsfield Dementia Friends are taking this further and attending a Dementia Champions induction day. That means we will have two 'home grown' Dementia Champions who will be able to give dementia presentations to interested local groups. We hope that this will be particularly of interest to the many thriving Tatsfield clubs who want to be able to help any of their members who have dementia, or go on to develop it, to go on enjoying their interests for as long as they can.

Please put this date in your diary now. Lauren Merrison, the Alzheimer's Services Manager for Dementia Friendly Surrey will be coming to help steer us in the right direction!

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD JANUARY/FEBRUARY 2017

As the New Year begins there are bright planets to be seen in both the morning and the evening skies.

As I mentioned previously, Venus is a very conspicuous evening object, visible slightly west of south as soon as the Sun has set. During the early part of the year Venus becomes progressively easier to spot as both its distance from the Sun and its altitude increase. As though it were needed, its brightness also increases as it demonstrates that, save for the Moon, it is the brightest object in the night sky. On the nights of January 2nd and 31st a thin crescent Moon is close by to provide a pleasing photo opportunity.

In the morning skies it's the "gas giant" Jupiter that currently dominates. If you are an early riser you will see the brilliant planet due south at 6.30 am in the early part of January although as the month progresses you will find it a little further west each day. This continues through February until on the last day the Sun is about to rise at 6.30 am with Jupiter low down in the south west, an hour away from setting. On January 19th a last quarter Moon is less than two degrees to the north of Jupiter whilst slightly further away to the south lies Spica, the brightest star in the constellation of Virgo.

If you are lucky enough to view both planets around this time, it will become clearer to you how the entire sky seems to rotate around the pole star, Polaris. If whilst looking for Venus during January evenings you turn to the north you will find the Plough low down near the horizon. However, if you look at the morning sky you will find the Plough almost directly overhead. This is one group of stars that never sets from the latitudes of the UK and for that reason we describe it as being "circumpolar". This is especially useful to us in the UK because the two stars in the end of the "bowl" of the Plough point towards the pole star. This means you can always find north if the sky is dark and clear.

The Plough though, is not a constellation in its own right; rather it is what we call an "asterism". This is the name given to a group of stars that make up a well-known or easily-recognised shape. All the stars in the Plough belong to the constellation of Ursa Major which in mythology was the Great Bear. However, it isn't necessary for the stars in an asterism to belong to the same constellation at all. Take for example the Square of Pegasus which lies immediately north of Venus at the moment. Only three of the stars lie in Pegasus, the other one in the top left corner is a star in the neighbouring constellation of Andromeda. The Summer Triangle is another example where the three bright stars that form it belong to three different star groups. Vega is in the constellation of Lyra, Deneb is in Cygnus and Altair is in Aquila.

Correspondence (and lots of it - thank you!):

Let's begin with this report from Marian Godfrey (Parkwood Road) (19.11.16):

We (Marian and Ian) really enjoy watching the antics of the many birds in the garden. At certain times of the year we have regular visits from pheasants who have become very tame, and sad to say, we have given them names. This year we have been visited by a whole family; Mum, Dad and four chicks. As they were quite musical with their chirping, we named them the 'Abba' family. They would troop down the garden from the field at the back in a line, with Mum in front and Dad (Benny) proudly bringing up the rear. For weeks and weeks now, the 'Abbas' visit three times a day demanding their corn, with Benny standing guard to ward off any other cock pheasants who dare come too close. They use the same route every day, stopping to preen their feathers and scratch around part of the rockery (which they have really ruined - but a small price to pay). If one of the youngsters gets left behind they do a 'road runner' across the garden. We thought initially that all four chicks were girls, but after a few weeks one of them started to look a bit moth eaten with different coloured plumage sprouting through, and it soon became evident that this one was in fact a cock – now aptly named Bjorn. He is now a fabulous looking specimen; well, he would be wouldn't he, with all that corn inside of him! We are fascinated that they have stayed in a family group for such a long time and that they are still visiting on a daily basis, even though the 'chicks' are now as large as their parents. Apparently pheasants have a very short life span of one to two years in the wild (if not shot), so they must mature quickly and do what pheasants do. It will be interesting to see how long they do stick together and whether, next year, we have three or four family groups visiting.'

Well, Marion, I've had several reports of pheasants visiting gardens around the village, including our own, but none that chirp as melodically as yours. The ones I've heard are more reminiscent of Mick Jagger with a sore throat. Lucky you!

And now we hear from a new reporter - Karen Clifton (Crossways) (1.12.16):

'I loved reading your article in November's issue and wanted to share my experience today with you and/or your readers. Previously I taught in a school, so my main source of feathered entertainment came from the 'enticed' visitors into my garden, such as the hordes of **goldfinches** on the sunflower hearts. However, I am now fortunate enough to be tutoring from home which means I get much more time to enjoy the birds on an ad hoc basis, as I randomly peer out of the window (obviously not when I'm working with my students!) On this morning, a glorious sunny winter's day (quite honestly I keep pinching myself... I must have chosen the loveliest autumn and winter on record to start working from home!), a little 'dot' of a bird was buzzing (not literally of course) along the branches of my berberis. As it had a shortish, dumpy appearance, I thought it was a little wren at first. Then it started hanging upside down and scuttling along the branches, and as it was greenish in colour, I thought it was, perhaps, a blue tit. Then.... I spotted the yellow stripe down its nose. The experts among you will probably have

identified this bird by now, but as a fledgling 'twitcher', I had to consult my handy bird book and look it up. I was astounded to be having my first experience with a **goldcrest!** What a pretty little, Christmas-looking bird. My handy guide said that these little treasures 'seem indifferent to humans'. This was indeed true... It then flew over to the window I was peering out of and settled on the myrtle plant right beneath where I was standing. This has absolutely made my day. The point here, also, is that as we change the course of our careers and jobs (in my case swapping school with working from home) those other things that change, such as missing our colleagues, etc., are replaced by the tiny things that we were too frenetic to notice before, and what a delight they are. So, 'Hello', little goldcrest... I hope to see you again soon x.'

I am delighted by two things, Karen - firstly that you enjoy reading 'Nature Notes', and secondly that you sent me such a wonderfully uplifting email. The goldcrest is indeed a pretty little bird. You can consider yourself fortunate; not everyone gets to see them in their garden. Let's hope it's the first of many exciting observations.

Our final report this month is from Peter and Jan Maynard (5.12.16):

'We saw this bird in our garden (photo attached) and could not identify it for a while, although it had a familiar look. However, I am now sure that it's a juvenile **moorhen**, but what it is doing here? We have no pond, but it's been around for three days – I



don't know!'

Most strange, Peter. Do neighbours have ponds? I'm sure at some point it will return to water. I've just checked it out (as I'm sure you have) and, as expected, its main food is water plants. The supply of supplementary its foodstuffs, insects and worms, will surely be very limited at this time of year.

I guess it's the seeds you put out that is keeping it in your garden. As I say, strange, but rather wonderful!

PRIMARY MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE - ANSWERS

These questions were on page 52 of the December magazine and came from the challenge taken by some pupils at Tatsfield School. Here are some answers.

- A. There are 123+321 = 444 stamps in total. K to have twice as many as J, so divide 444 by 3 giving 148 for J and 2x148 = 296 for K. So he needs to give her 148-123 = 25 stamps.
- B. The only possible square numbers are 1, 4, 9, 16 and 25. Mondays are separated by multiples of 7 and so are Wednesdays: the only possibilities are 16-9=7 and 25-4=21. There are 2 and 5 days (plus multiples of 7) separating Mondays and Wednesdays and this fits with them being 9 and 16, and 4 and 25 respectively. So 4^{th} was a Wednesday and 1^{st} would have been Sunday.
- C. 1001 in 13 days gives an average of $1001 \div 13 = 77$ per day. As his rate increases uniformly each day he must have knitted 77 on the middle day i.e. 6^{th} . So 5 days later, i.e. 11^{th} , he knitted 77+5=82 socks.
- D. The dots are frightening as we have no idea how many 6's there are. However if we get stuck in then a pattern emerges: 666x6=3996; 6666x6=39996; 6666x6=39996 etc. The sums of the digits of these answers are: 27 (i.e. 3x9); 36 (i.e.4x9); 45 (i.e.5x9) etc. For the number we are seeking the sum of the digits is 2016 which is 224x9. Hence the number has 224 digits, n=224.

Once again congratulations go to our school pupils who, remarkable as it may seem to some, thoroughly enjoy such challenges. They are the ones who will be confronting the many challenges of our world in years to come.
