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
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
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

TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council tends to rest in August so there is little to report, but we have become aware of an increase in litter in the village centre and I wonder if everyone could speak to members of their household and remind them that any rubbish is to be placed in bins. We do have many rubbish bins dotted around so hopefully it's not too onerous a chore.

You will have no doubt heard that Surrey County Council is considering closing the Bond Road Community Recycling Centre in Warlingham. We have objected to this vehemently and suggested that if Surrey simply cannot keep it open then reduced days or hours should be offered in the first instance.

Unfortunately, funding from the County Council for the Scout Hut path is no longer available and rather than shelve this project we are looking at ways in which we may be able to fund it. The Parish Council receives part of the Community Infrastructure Levy which is imposed on certain developments and we could use the money we have in the kitty towards the path. We are speaking to the County Council about this possibility and will hopefully have an update shortly.

We've been consulted about a number of planning proposals in the parish over the past couple of months, but only one is likely to need detailed consideration when it comes to a full application. This is for the restoration of Covers Sandpit - just across our border with Westerham on the A25 - and its infilling with *'imported suitable engineering material to restore the site to agriculture, landscape planting and biodiversity'*. The site is part of the Squerryes Estate and an important question will be the choice of access route for the vehicles importing the material and how this will affect Tatsfield. The Squerryes Estate prefers a new temporary link from the Beggars Lane roundabout on the A233 and across the Croydon Road (B2024) just south of the M25 on the way from Tatsfield to Westerham. We await a full planning application.

Lastly, but by no means least, we have been thinking about Christmas and have decided to put lights on an additional two trees on the island outside the Old Ship. This work should be carried out in the next few months - well in time for December. Meanwhile, we hope you have had an enjoyable summer.

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be held at the Aileen McHugo Building at 8.00 pm on Monday 11th September and then on Monday 25th September 2017 - also at 8.00 pm. As always, the agendas will be made available on village notice boards and at: <u>www.surreycommunity.info/tatsfield/</u>

TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

Progress Update with your Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan (NP): We have continued to make good, solid progress over the summer as we start to develop the shape and content of Tatsfield's Neighbourhood Plan.

Having created our draft vision and set out our draft objectives (please go to the Tatsfield <u>Neighbourhood Plan</u> website for full details) we have now divided our teams into six topic research areas to research the main elements we are looking to address in your plan.

This is a pretty key stage and we would welcome as much participation, discussion and engagement from parishioners to highlight and help shape the direction, opportunities and challenges for the parish. One important caveat - we are generating an aspirational list for what we want to address and achieve – we will then have to assess, debate and survey the full parish to confirm the feasibility for each of the various options before we can consider taking them forward into the Tatsfield NP.

Have a look the topic group areas below and see which you would like to get involved with. Once you have decided, you can then send an email to our Parish Clerk, Sam Head: <u>clerk@tatsfieldparishcouncil.org.uk</u>, who will pass your details over to the topic chairs and let you get involved from there. The commitment won't be too onerous. We are looking to engage and consult as wide a cross-section of parishioners as we possibly can and set up a few discussion forums. Contributing your views will greatly help the process and enable your views to be considered in the proposals.

Topic Groups - Our topic groups cover

- **Environment/open spaces** (Chaired by James Barker) looking at how we protect and enhance the environment, woodlands, meadows, landscapes, open views (our part of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty), bio diversity and wildlife and how we preserve the historic heritage and environment of the village.
- Built Environment (Chaired by Paul Jackson) looking at the planning system to achieve high-quality design and sustainability, consistent with the established character of the village and landscaped in a way that is consistent with our rural aspect.
- Housing and Planning (Chaired by Mark Watts) looking at the location and range of housing we need to plan for to meet the needs of the current and future community. The team will look at areas such as the mix of housing to meet the needs of older residents for downsizing, younger residents looking for their first home, affordable houses for lower income earners and invite land owners in the parish to offer potential plots they would like to be considered for development.

- **Travel and Infrastructure** (e.g. travel and transport roads, parking, digital economy, information and communication) (Chaired by Sue Smale) looking at how we improve the local infrastructure, roads, public transport, utilities, drainage, digital connectivity, improvements to the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and other traffic. Sue and her team will also look at how we improve the availability of village parking as well as facilities for people with disabilities.
- Local Economy (local businesses, shops and services) (Chaired by Sue Smale) looking at how we support local business and promote opportunities for local employment.
- Community Facilities (sports, recreational, school, police, church, Village Hall, clubs, village amenities etc) – (Chaired by Natalie Ruggins) looking at how we maintain and enhance the recreational, cultural, religious and charitable activities. The team will also look at protecting and expanding the acquisition of community assets such as woodlands, meadows, sports grounds etc, supporting community energy projects and the provision of a vibrant local sporting facility.

We are looking to complete this process by the end of the year when we will arrange a series of detailed updates and briefings for residents and present the findings from our topic groups before we arrange a detailed survey for everyone in the parish.

We continue to remain keen to hear from you with any comments and suggestions on the draft vision and objectives for the village. Natalie Ruggins has recently worked closely with Little Acorns pre-school and the head and team at Tatsfield School and we have asked each of the families to comment on the draft vision and objectives. We look forward to their feedback. All of these comments will help guide and steer the direction for each of the topic groups. Please send any comments to Samantha Head our Parish Clerk at clerk@tatsfieldparishcouncil.org.uk, come along to our monthly meetings in the Meeting Room at the Aileen McHugo Building (third Monday of every month at 8pm), pop into the parish surgery every Saturday morning at 11am in the Bakery or alternatively you can write and leave your comments at Linda's shop.

The Tandridge District Local Plan continues to progress. The local newspapers have provided details of the garden village consultation process for circa 4,000 houses that continues to October. We have also recently met the TDC Planning team to ensure our Tatsfield NP and the Local Plan elements are aligned.

TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL/CONCILLOR REPORTS



Dan Gutierrez - our Tandridge Safer Neighbourhood Inspector: On the 3rd August Nichola Stokoe, your Parish Council Chairman, and I met our local Police Inspector, Dan Gutierrez. After the normal press call organised by Dave Bishop we got down to discussing policing in

Tandridge and more particularly in Tatsfield over a well-received cup of coffee made by yours truly. Although crime figures were up recently, on a rolling three years average the current increase follows a period where Tandridge was the only Borough / District in Surrey to have seen a reduction in total crime.

The most recent operation "Trump" concentrated on rural crime that had been showing an increase and as a result 55 vehicles were seized for having no tax, MOT or insurance and 16 people were arrested for a number of offences. Domestic daytime burglary was highlighted and we should all take care not to leave ourselves exposed. Burglary does not happen only at night. Here it seems Tandridge has cross border burglars coming up from Kent and even Essex, resulting in two Chilean burglars being caught and convicted, another man from London recalled and awaiting charge for a number of crimes in Surrey and Kent and three teenagers from Lambeth recently arrested in Warlingham following a spate of car and garage break-ins.

On this point Dan stressed to us that a close community along with CCTV and a good Neighbourhood Watch scheme are good deterrents. On the question of whether the current lack of street lighting was fuelling crime there appears to be no perceptible difference here, nevertheless the usual caution should be taken. Another suggestion was made that a tool safe could be fitted within vans or additional external locks would deter offenders if people had no option to safely store tools at home. Dan is working like all public servants with a smaller budget and fewer PCSOs available, but we do have the Local Area Policing Team covering Tandridge and that does make response times better than in the past. All in all, things are quite crime-free around the Tatsfield/Titsey area with only one burglary in the past six months and there have been only four non residential burglaries this year in the local area - a reduction of six.

We talked about anti-social behaviour at the MUGA, asked for more patrols along Water Lane Titsey and Chestnut Avenue Tatsfield, discussed CCTV for the village centre and the possibility of "hiring "additional police time. If you think that we should follow this route then please discuss this with the Parish Council.

Meantime we were asked to keep passing information to Surrey Police on the 101 number or on the website but always remembering for emergencies to use the 999 number. We have seen the current trend of a marked reduction in domestic burglary

which you and I are very glad to see. I am also pleased to see an increase of reports from the community on a range of matters from suspicious behaviour to reporting crime. Communication is vital to improve confidence which can make a real difference in the quality of life. If you have not signed up or you do not look at the police social media streaming I would ask that you take a look.

Tandridge District Council Services survey: Almost 2,500 households have been randomly selected to take part in a survey about Tandridge District Council services. The *Have your say about council services* questionnaire will help the Council find out what residents think about the services the council provides, the area they live in and how well the Council communicates with them to see where improvements could be made. f you did receive this I hope you completed and returned it.

Grasshopper Inn at Moorhouse: Those of you who know and have visited and eaten at the Grasshopper Inn will know what a superb establishment this has become under the ownership of Faucet Inn Limited and its MD, Steven Cox. There is now multi-function use of restaurant, pub, rooms and function rooms. Because of this they offer jobs within the district and their future plans will offer more hotel space for wedding functions. So it is a great disappointment that I was advised that their recent planning application to knock down and improve these facilities was refused by a majority of the Conservative Councillors on the District Council's Planning Committee. Having had the plan accepted by the usually tough AONB Planning Adviser who stated that the form and design of the replacement wing are in character with the main hotel/restaurant and would not detract from the character of this part of Surrey the councillors then went on to disagree with this statement as part of their objections.

The government has asserted through the National Planning Policy Framework that it is committed to securing economic growth in order to create jobs and prosperity and further states that it is committed to ensuring that the planning system does everything it can to support sustainable economic growth. Planning is supposed to operate to encourage and not act as an impediment to growth. Significant weight should be placed on the need to support economic growth through the planning system. Yet despite all of the above this planning application was surprisingly refused by the shortsighted actions of some of the committee. I have since had a meeting with the Leader of the Council and asked him to review the events behind this refusal, having heard from him and his fellow Conservative councillors many times about the need for action to ensure Tandridge does not wither and die. There is a lack of hotel accommodation in this general area and the application should have been supported and it is beyond me why these councillors who profess to be working for the good of Tandridge made this decision. I will continue to work with the applicant to get this planning application resubmitted and passed and in doing this I would like to thank the Conservative, Liberal and Independent councillors who clearly understood better the needs for this application to be permitted.

Local Plan: Garden Villages Consultation: This consultation, which runs until Monday 9th October, is an opportunity for all Tandridge residents to have their say on the location of a garden village development which forms part of the preferred strategy the Council is pursuing in preparing the Local Plan.

Fly-tipping Guidance: Are you having work done on your home this summer? Did you know your construction waste is your responsibility, even if you pay a company to take it away for you? You could be prosecuted if your waste is found somewhere it shouldn't be, so it's vital you make sure the company you employ does not fly tip it. Fly-tipping costs councils money to clear up and damages the environment, so it's important we all do what we can to help stamp it out.

- Make sure your tradespeople will dispose of waste responsibly before employing them, visit <u>www.recycleforsurrey.org.uk</u> to find out how to check they're a registered waste carrier.
- Be wary of traders you find online or who knock on your front door.

Flytippers face an unlimited fine, their vehicle being crushed, community service, or even a prison sentence.

Old Ship's recycling facilities: An update on the Old Ship's recycling facilities, as unfortunately we now have to remove the remaining textile bank due to persistent fly tipping in the area. They will probably have been removed by the time you read this. The usage of the recycling bank had decreased since it was moved to the back of the car park and therefore hopefully not too many of you will be inconvenienced. You can still recycle plastic carrier bags full of textiles, clothes and paired shoes from your homes every week using the collection service.








SHOPPING AT LINDA'S STORES IN SEPTEMBER

POLICE REPORT

Hello Tatsfield residents......

Long time no type!! Apologies for missing the deadline on the July/August issue - no excuses.

Through a mixture of operational work commitments and times off sick, I haven't been around the village quite so much recently. That didn't stop a few crimes happening during the period between mid-June and mid-August.

Firstly, a slightly sickening incident, a car was broken into by smashing a window, and two handbags stolen. This happened in June outside St. Mary's Church, Church Hill, whilst the victims were attending a funeral. That should be considered amongst the lowest form of crimes. Sadly, there are no positive lines of enquiry to identify the offender.

Next, one of the CCTV cameras was stolen from outside Linda's Stores, Westmore Green. The other camera shows two hooded males, but no identities could be determined from the footage.

A quad bike was stolen in Parkwood Road, plus a horsebox broken into. A neighbour's CCTV sadly did not pick up anything and there were no other lines of enquiry. A national marker was put on the bike, but so far has not been found. Really not having any luck with the follow up enquiries on these crimes, which is rather frustrating.

But wait...... a property was broken into on Ricketts Hill Road during the daytime and various items stolen. The victims had CCTV cameras and through circulating the images of the male offender, he was identified by Surrey and Kent Police as a prolific burglar. Now remanded in custody, he has been charged with six burglaries (three Surrey, three Kent) and will be sentenced soon. Result. That's better.....

That was all in June. Nothing for July, but lastly in August a van was entered on a driveway in Westmore Road. A lawnmower and strimmer were stolen, along with cans of petrol but various tools were left. There was no CCTV coverage, no witnesses and no forensics, so the offenders will sadly not be found.

Reading this last one should induce you to think of protectively marking your valuables. That's where I can help. Firstly, I would direct you to the website 'Immobilise.com.' You can list all your items precious to you, especially those with a make, model and serial number. Even jewellery can be photographed and downloaded onto the website. It's run by the NCA (National Crime Agency) who send back an email, confirming your registration. So if anything gets nicked, and recovered by any UK Police force it will get traced back to you at your address. Also, I can visit you with a Smartwater DNA Kit, the forensic version of marking property. Call me if you need one on 101 (ask for Surrey Police) Extension 30822. These two actions (both free) will make you as safe as you can get.

Lastly, by the time you read these words, I should have moved house to East Sussex, so then should be the best time to see me in Linda's as I'll be the least grumpy version of myself.

Enjoy the rest of the summer and kids, the fun is now over. Get back to school, it's good for you. I promise you it will be an education!

EVENING GARDEN VISIT TO TITSEY PLACE GARDENS

On Wednesday 28th June the Society hosted an evening social garden visit to Titsey Place. It was a warm and balmy evening and we were met by Rhod Jones, the Head Gardener at Titsey (for those of you who came to our AGM you would have been introduced to him

there) and received a very warm welcome.

We were given an introductory talk about the history of Titsey, dating back to Roman Times. The Estate follows the London to Lewes Roman Road. The Romans left their mark at Titsey, and there are two Roman sites in the Titsey Park. There are many fresh water springs in the south facing hillside and as we all know water is a necessary source for survival. Titsey is also mentioned in the Doomsday Book in 1086 which I was very fortunate to see a few days later inside Lincoln Castle.



Fast forwarding on to the present day, the Innes family now reside at Titsey and they are the first family to live in the big house with children for over 100 years!

Huge improvements have been undertaken in the last few years and Rhod was very keen to show us the new layout of the walled garden. The south facing position of the protected garden made for some very healthy and early vegetables. The courgettes, marrows and pumpkins were looking marvellous, as were the beetroots, onions,



parsnips, potatoes and leeks to name but a few. Companion planting encouraged bee and insect pollination and there were roses, sunflowers, dahlias, gladioli and sweet peas in abundance.

The restored glass houses were full of interest especially the bananas which Rhod had left for us to see as they were ready for picking but sadly not enough for us all to sample. The tomatoes were red and they had been picking them for over a month. Mine are never ready until the end of July.

Rhod also explained that every year is different in the garden. This year, following a warm and dry winter and spring, everything was 3-4 weeks earlier than usual. Of course there is a down side

to this, and maybe autumn will be upon us earlier than normal.

Rhod then took us out into the grounds, where the vistas were amazing. Fine Sussex cattle adorned the landscape and for a short while we were transformed in to a magical environment. The rose garden was full of scent and the bushes were under planted in lavender. The herbaceous beds were full of interest and colour, and the newly constructed rock garden was a work in progress. Rhod gave us an interesting insight into various facts about pests and diseases, composting, planting timings and pruning.

Our evening concluded with refreshments including a glass of wine and picnic nibbles of sandwiches, savoury and ginger biscuits, fruit cakes and of course Victoria sponge.



A very happy group of Tatsfielders returned to Tatsfield, full of enthusiasm and inspiring ideas for their gardens. We did have some 'first timers' to Titsey and I know they will be returning with friends and family again very soon. For those of you who have never visited, please do put it on your 'Wish' list. Details are on the inside cover of this magazine.

Finally huge thanks must go to Rhod for his garden knowledge and kindness and to the Innes family for allowing us to visit their beautiful historic grounds and gardens.

And the sheer quantity that should be delivered to Bond Road during the week is causing us some angst without the additional manpower

to cope with it. We have plenty of stock of Black Gold as we have managed to sieve bins weekly as we must to be able to refill them. Some repair work has been undertaken even whilst we are doing all of the above. We are grateful for the volunteers who have come along and helped us.

We are fortunate that we have a steady group of volunteers to deal with the amounts of green waste and grass coming into the site ON SATURDAY and the Black Gold leaving the site.

Please remember the operation runs on the goodwill of the volunteers so please do not abuse their goodwill. Help us by bringing waste up ONLY ON SATURDAYS. Thank You.

We would particularly welcome people to do our meet and greet at the site. This role is to welcome the users, enrol them into the THS if they are not members and to direct them to the correct bins for the waste that they are bringing up to the site. This role is very helpful to us as it can save us much time having directed the waste direct to the filling bin rather than the holding bin so if you want a couple of hours in the fresh air meeting the villagers please contact me to offer your dates.

The Duke of Edinburgh volunteers (four young men and one young woman) have done extremely well this year and have worked capably in all areas of the site. They have worked well together and when working alongside one of the regular volunteers.

Please be considerate and not dump any material whilst we are closed and separate the waste you bring to the site for ease of transport to the correct bins. See the new signs on the bins for guidance.

Details of what and when you can bring waste to the site can be found in the 2017 THS Year Book on Page 40. September is the last month that we are open to receive green waste but there will be Black Gold available through October so do please come along and collect the Black Gold for laying on your gardens or allotments over winter.

Tatsfield has been a Fairtrade Village since 2009 thanks to the vision, commitment and leadership of Jennie South. After years of dedication to the cause, Jennie is moving away from Tatsfield. Her quiet but effective approach has ensured that Tatsfield villagers are aware of Fairtrade and have

regular opportunities to make purchases of goods that ensure fair and decent working conditions for the people in less developed countries who grow our food. We are so grateful for all her work with us for over ten years.

Tatsfield Fairtrade Group therefore has a vacancy and we would welcome anyone in our community who would like to support our work. We meet about four times a year to plan our activities. These include Tea Tents on the Village Green, a presence at the Scout Fete and Church Teas as well as a Fairtrade Fortnight event. If you would like to join the committee please do get in touch with our Co-ordinator, Barbara Hester. She would also welcome anyone who would simply like to help support one of the events.

You may have noticed that Fairtrade has been in the news a lot in the last few months. Sainsbury's has decided to withdraw from the Fairtrade Foundation's standards for its own label tea. Instead it has have set up its own scheme, which most people agree will not ensure such high standards in terms of welfare for the people who grow and pick our tea. The Fairtrade premium allows communities to vote on projects to enhance their own prospects. These vary from clean water pipes, to schools as well as shared tractors or tea bagging facilities to add value to their final product. The good news, however, is that both Waitrose and the Co-op have increased their commitment and are extending their own brand ranges of tea and chocolate.

Rupert Thomas, Commercial Director at Waitrose, said: "We've found that our customers are extremely loyal towards Fairtrade products and appreciate our long-standing and continued commitment - it highlights the investment in and support for the people, communities and businesses that produce our food."



So please think Fairtrade every time you shop whether locally at Linda's or in a supermarket. Show your support by opting for Fairtrade whenever possible – tea, coffee, sugar, chocolate, bananas, lemons, honey and more. NDS TO SICILY (a few of us anyway!)

Music can take you to some interesting places, and in July it took us to play a concert in an amphitheatre at the Museo della Pietra (stone museum), Sampieri in the south east of Sicily. Billed as the South London Sinfonietta, the orchestra was made up of a mixture of musicians, some from South London where organiser Peter Fender conducts, some local Sicilians, and included four members of Tatsfield's own North Downs Sinfonia.

We all made our own travel arrangements to Sicily, and Val and I decided to spend 10 days doing a 'Portillo', travelling down by train. Luckily for us cellists we were able to borrow instruments from a local music school otherwise this would have been difficult! These days of course there is plenty information on the net, <u>www.seat61.com</u> being particularly useful for planning European train travel. Starting with the Eurostar to Paris for a day, we then took the TGV through the Alps to Milan, then the very fast Frecciarossa (Red Arrow 186mph!) to Rome for a few days, on to Catania via Naples and the train ferry (yes they divide the train in two and actually put it on the ferry from Villa San Giovanni to Messina). From Catania we found a bus to Syracuse, then after a few



days the train to Scicli.

For the week before the concert we were based in Scicli, a beautiful historic town and UNESCO World Heritage Site. Our accommodation was dotted around the old town, so we'd meet up for breakfast at a cafe in the town square, then have a quick rehearsal in the morning conducted in English and Italian (in true NDS style we had minimal rehearsing!) leaving plenty of time for the important things - drinking, eating, drinking and site seeing.

There were visits to local farms, and Donnafugata Castle used for the filming of 'Inspector Montalbano', as well as the beach, being aware as we were enjoying the sea with the locals that not so far away many people were desperately trying to survive crossing it.

The concert itself (outdoors under flood lights, which seemed to be a work in progress) was due to start at 9.30 when it would be cooler, but as my fellow Sicilian cellist pointed out, locally time keeping wasn't so important - in Milan where he taught yes, but here no. As it got dark the audience of around 400 gradually filled the stone seats. With the impresario introducing us, and every piece, we eventually started at about 10pm and finished around 11.30 without an interval. The programme was made up of light classical pieces; Mozart, Bizet, Rossini, Bellini, Borrometi and some film themes. We were joined by the local concert band for some of these. By the end unusually

damp air had blown in from the sea, curling the music (at least the clothes pegs had kept it in place) and covering the instruments in condensation. There followed speeches by local dignitaries and an encore for the enthusiastic audience.

On the journey back we reflected on the many interesting people we had met, both through the music and by travelling in this way, how much we had enjoyed each other's company and exchanging our stories and ideas. Returning to Britain the idea of 'Brexit' seems more irrelevant than ever.

NORTH DOWNS COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA AND ENSEMBLES



Summer news catch-up and plans for the coming year.

Since holding its successful First Birthday Concert at the end of March, the North Downs Community Orchestra has been enjoying a lively summer of music.

With lovely warm evenings in May and June, some rehearsals were held outside the Endeavour Scout Headquarters on Godstone Green rather than inside. Following on from the Birthday Concert programme, a few more toe-tapping pieces were practised to add length and an even more varied programme for their Caterham Festival Concert, held at the Caterham United Reformed Church on Make Music Day UK. In just over one year this young orchestra has gained considerable experience and now has stamina to perform longer concerts as well.

Make Music Day UK is to become a regular fixture on the Summer Solstice, as it is already in many countries around the world. The aim is to involve as many people as possible with making music on one day. Before the evening concert, members of the Orchestra and its Musical Director, Shona Fenion, had arranged to meet with interested members of the public at Church Walk Shopping Centre, Caterham. People could have a listen, a chat or a try - an assortment of orchestral instruments were available. What hadn't been bargained for was the sweltering 34 degrees on 21st June this year!

This Orchestra always includes a few pieces in its programme where the audience may participate informally. The favourite piece has generally been 'Land of Hope and Glory'. The best audience 'performance' was that of the attendees of Caterham's Douglas Brunton Centre's AGM. The Orchestra had been requested to entertain Centre members after the AGM; however, because this was a weekday afternoon, numbers of available instrumentalists were much smaller than for a normal concert. ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO THIS MONTH



September 1917 was the worst month of the First World War in terms of the village's casualties. Four Tatsfield men were killed in action that month.

Harold Mudd, a corporal in the London Regiment, was killed in Flanders on 16th September. His name is commemorated at the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial - one of four memorials to servicemen missing in Flanders in

the Ypres salient. The third battle of Ypres took place in the summer and autumn of 1917 in deteriorating weather ending in November with the capture by British forces of Passchendaele. Born in 1895, Cpl Mudd was the son of Walter John and Bertha Roye Mudd of Leehirst, Maesmaur Road. His father was a builder in Tatsfield in the 1920s and 30s.

Four days later, Private Bertram Rushen of the Royal West Surrey Regiment died and his name appears on the Tyne Cot Passchendaele Memorial - another of four memorials to the missing in the Ypres Salient. Born in Tatsfield in 1898, Pte Rushen was the son of William Henry and Sophia Rushen (née Holman) of Manor Cottages, Tatsfield, also known as Goddards Cottage. His sister, Louisa, had died in January 1916 after being hit by a car while working as a bus conductress near Lewisham Town Hall. His twin brother, Stanley, and another brother, Joseph, were also killed in the First World War and all three names appear on the memorial plaque in St Mary's Church.

Then on the 20th September, Lance Corporal Archibald Lock of the London Regiment was killed. His name is also commemorated on the Menin Gate. He was the son of Arthur Henry Lock & Ruth Lock (née Underwood) of Meadowsweet, Ricketts Hill Road, and had been employed as an outfitting assistant. His brother, Francis, was also a First World War casualty and was killed in 1919. He is buried in Tatsfield churchyard.

On 26th September, Gunner Edwin Larkin of the Royal Garrison Artillery was killed in the Ypres salient. He was married to Anne Maud Larkin (née Willis) of Emily Road, (now Westmore Road) Tatsfield where they ran Larkin's Stores – a drapers and general outfitters shop. His name appears on the memorial plaque in St Mary's Church.

THE INSTITUTE, BOROUGH ROAD



There is very little reference in Tatsfield's archives to the building known as The Institute which stood in Borough Road for much of the last century. Until this summer, all we had was this poor-quality image of the building.

The derelict building was demolished in the late 1960s and a bungalow -Anglecroft - built on the site by the

Ling family of builders. A couple of months ago, Brian Ling re-discovered this 19th century matchbox recovered from the site at that time and has kindly donated it to the History Project. He also remembers a similar artefact left behind by a night-watchman at the site being found at the time.



The 'E. Crane' whose name appears on the fragment of wood found in the matchbox is Edward Crane, who was aged 42 in the year mentioned - 1884 - when the Institute was being built. He and his twin brother, Joseph, were carpenters and almost certainly lived at Crane Cottage at the southern end of Westmore Green where their sister, Susan, ran a grocery shop. Their father, Stephen, was a thatcher, born in 1803.

The brothers' names continued to appear in local directories until 1916 but after that only Joseph appeared - until 1924 when he was still described as a carpenter and would have then been in his 80s.

Doris Geary, in her 1987 'Tales of Tatsfield', noted that the Institute was known locally as The Tin Hut. Dances were held there with piano music by a Mr. Adams and she added: "I am told by the older residents that the Tatsfield Brass Band practised there."

Mr Adams was the secretary/treasurer of the Institute. An organist, he was also headmaster of Tatsfield School from 1898 until 1921.

Doris Geary's nephew, Tony Watson, remembers a flint house next to the old building. This was also known as Anglecroft, occupied in the 1930s and 40s by the Tilley family and in the 1950s by Charles and Violet Kilgour.

If you too have information about the Institute - or indeed any other artefacts or papers giving insights into the history of Tatsfield - the History Project would be delighted to see them with a view to photographing or making copies of them to include in the archive of the parish. Old deeds, maps and plans are of particular interest and copies of the proceedings of village organisations from the past help build up our picture of Tatsfield's history.

There are also opportunities to work on the several thousand items already in the archive or to contribute in other, practical ways. I've already had help from villagers in cataloguing local newspaper cuttings and will soon again be asking them to process more material. If you would like to help with this activity, please get in touch.

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – SEPTEMBER 2017

If you're lucky you might just catch a final glimpse of Jupiter low down in the west immediately after sunset at the beginning of September. Saturn is still on view a little to the west (right) of south although it moves progressively west as the month continues. The crescent Moon is just four degrees north-west of Saturn on the 26th. If you rise early then Venus is a brilliant object around twenty degrees in altitude due east at 6am.

Women in Astronomy – Henrietta Leavitt – Part 5

Following Henrietta's death, the debate continued to rage about whether the Milky Way was, in effect, the whole universe containing everything we could see with the eye and telescope, or whether it was a common enough galaxy amongst a myriad of similar stellar conglomerations.

Harlow Shapley, having calculated the size of the Milky Way (our galaxy) was sure that due to its great size, it must be all there was. Edwin Hubble though took the opposite view and continued to search for Miss Leavitt's variable stars, known as Cepheids, in distant star clusters. He wrote to Shapley on a number of occasions with fresh evidence but Shapley would not yield his viewpoint.

Hubble, using the 100-inch telescope on Mount Wilson, continued his work and found Cepheid variables in Messier 31 (then known as the Andromeda nebula) and its neighbour Messier 33 as well as amongst the star clouds of Sagittarius. Measurements of them, when applied to the principles set out by Henrietta, showed these bodies lay at distances of more than one million light years. The argument about "island universes" was over and Hubble was the victor. It was realised at last that these tiny fuzzy patches were huge star systems at vast distances (Messier 31 is 2.5 million light years away) and that our Milky Way was nothing special at all. Had Shapley been less blinkered it is entirely possible that today we would be admiring images taken from beyond the Earth with the *Shapley* Space Telescope.

What then of Henrietta's place in the hierarchy of astronomical history? True, she has a crater on the Moon named after her and also an asteroid (5383 Leavitt) but sadly the greatest accolade that a fellow scientist wanted bestowed on her simply could not be.

In 1925 the Swedish mathematician Gösta Mittag-Leffler wrote to Henrietta praising her work and telling her that he wanted to nominate her for the 1926 Nobel Prize for physics. He was unaware that she had died almost 4 years earlier, so the letter was passed to Harlow Shapley. His reply does him little credit as he hints broadly in it that he (Shapley) was the one who interpreted Henrietta's data so by implication perhaps it is he who should receive the award; though fortunately this never came to pass. Henrietta couldn't receive it either because the Nobel Prize cannot be awarded posthumously so instead that year it went to the French scientist Jean Baptiste Perrin.

Had she lived for longer, then we can only hope that she would have received the recognition that she so richly deserved for being the woman who made it possible to not only measure the size of the galaxy but also that of the universe.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN SEPTEMBER

I remember speculating on the chances of having a very dry summer after such a dry start only to have near record rainfall in August! If we are confused and disappointed about the weather in the main holiday period just imagine how it is confusing plants as they struggle to produce flower and fruit? We are having super crops of bush and top fruit with some record vegetable crops but what about the flowering plants? Our displays in the village got off to a superb start with many glowing comments, sadly by August the rain and dull cool weather had almost completely stopped the display. With light levels now



falling this month, they will struggle to regain their former glory. I also noticed record amounts of damaging powdery mildew on plants that would not normally suffer from this fungus disease; in our perennial pollinating border on the Bakery Lawn the Bergamot (Monarda) was defoliated and we had to replace the dwarf tobacco plants (Nicotiana). If I now say we are going to have a glorious 'Indian Summer' I bet it will be the opposite so no predictions!

In late June, I was asked to have a look at a collection of bush roses that were looking pretty sad after an initial flush of lovely flower. The keen gardener explained how all the plants were regularly dead headed, watered and given a feed. The plants had lots of long stems neatly trimmed at the ends, but not much flower. When your plants have finished their first flush of flower they need a summer prune; that is to remove about 12" (30cm) of the old stems down to a leaf bud or emerging shoot. This will stimulate new growth that will produce a new flush of blooms that could keep on flowering right up to the end of the year – weather permitting. A lot of folk are shocked to see me removing so much growth but on returning three or four week later I can see they have seen the benefits of such 'drastic' action!

Gardener's Tip - If you are intending to move a shrub or fruit tree this winter you can help it 'get ready' to be moved by cutting a circle around the plant to stimulate new root growth within the ball of soil you will be digging up. Use a sharp spade pushing it into the ground vertically, us old gardeners call this process 'wrenching'. If the ground is very dry make sure to thoroughly water the area first and remember to watch out for flints – the Tatsfield Diamonds!

Hedges are very much in the news these days – the right type – the right size and shape – when to cut for best growth and to reduce disturbance to nesting and roosting birds; watch out for my October notes when this will be the subject.

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

Correspondence:

You may remember that in the July issue I cheekily suggested that the old house opposite us ('Charmwood' in Greenway) may be home to bats and other forms of wildlife. Well as it turns out, it is, as John (Andrews) explains (06.07.17):

'This old house has been home to a family of **Pipistrelle Bats** for a number of years. On a warm summer's evening at dusk they can be seen ducking and diving across the lawn looking for insects. These little chaps, only a couple of inches long and making no sound in flight, look like large moths. They seem to live under the tiles at the back of the house. At the front, we also have a colony of **black bees** in the loft which seem pretty busy. We have **Blue Tits** and **Wrens** nesting regularly each year in various small gaps in the weather boarding. So, this old house is home to much more than just the Andrew's family!'

Another village nature reserve! Thanks for the report, John. Great to know that bats and bees are made welcome at 'The Andrew's House'. I wonder if one of our local apiarists can shed light on the 'black bees'? I haven't come across these before.

Steve (Gaskell), one of our village naturalists, has kindly sent a report of some recent butterfly sightings – exciting ones, I'm sure you'll agree (11.07.17):

'Top butterfly spots this weekend ($8^{th} - 9^{th}$ July) – A **White Admiral** in the garden both days. It settled on Carol's knee! Sunday 9^{th} (10 am) – male **Purple Emperor** at the top of Beddlestead Lane, near the gas installation. Even the cyclists I was with were impressed! We went the next day, at the same time, with binoculars and a camera, but had no luck. Maybe worth a second go? No luck with **Glanvilles** [Fritillaries] at Hutchinson's [Bank] this year, but we did spot a **Dark Green Fritillary**.'

Great sightings, Steve. I guess you just have to be in the right place at the right time. As previously mentioned, we had a White Admiral in our garden a few years back but have seen none since. If yours is able to breed I guess there's a small chance of developing a small local colony. Let's see what next year brings. In the meantime, let's all plant Honeysuckle – the necessary native plant for White Admiral caterpillars to feed on.

And now, news and an exciting proposal from 'Adventurer Jim' (Yeeles) (16.06.17)

'For the second year running I've seen **Swifts** prospecting for accommodation up at the old school. I don't think they were successful last year, but may have missed it. Do you know if they used to breed at this site in the past? What do you think of the chances of 'Monkey Puzzle' allowing me to put up a Swift nesting box ready for next year?

After a slow start, the butterfly season is starting to get back on track with the return of warm weather. The numerous **Meadow Browns** have been joined by the odd **Ringlet**, **Marbled White** and the 'golden' **Skippers**. Happy Days!'

I'm not sure whether Swifts nested at the old school site, Jim. Unfortunately, when my family arrived here there was no room for me so I had to go over to Hamsey Green for my schooling. Hopefully, one of the previous inmates will remember and message us. The photos you supplied certainly demonstrate the birds' interest. With community action in mind, I feel certain 'Monkey Puzzle' will be willing to assist, provided they don't have to get up the ladder! Perhaps the Parish Council could be approached for funding? As former members of the Green Spaces Committee I recall it being stated that our input would be welcomed by the Council. I'm happy to join an action team, if it helps. Now, what about a title? 'Adventurer Jim's Conservation Corps', perhaps. Or with mass appeal, 'Adventurer Jim's Conservation <u>Army'</u>! I volunteer to design the sweatshirts.



I am pleased to say that we have received other reports (on hold), but as Swifts have been mentioned, and are still just about observable at this time of year, this seems an ideal time to expand upon this theme.

In case you're not sure, Swifts are those large, streamlined birds that scream as they zoom across the sky on a summer's

day, skilfully darting around as they catch insects on the wing. I have very fond memories of them from when I was living in Winchester: A warm summer's evening, nipping in to 'The Wykeham' for a pint and a hot sausage after evensong at the cathedral, wandering through the college lanes on the way back to my digs with the sound of numerous, screaming Swifts echoing around as they sped over the rooftops heavenly times. (End of digression.) Their Latin name is apus apus which means 'footless'. Whilst not strictly true, their small feet are of little use which may, evolutionarily wise, be a consequence of spending so much time in flight. Conversely, their time spent flying may be a consequence of having small feet. Take your pick. Whichever the case, Swifts spend most of their lives in flight and when I say 'flight' I mean seriously long periods on the wing. After birth, the young birds have just a few weeks to prepare themselves for their first major excursion - to Africa! Thousands of miles of flying; feeding and sleeping on the wing without landing anywhere. In fact, they remain airborne for the first three years of their lives. Amazing, isn't it? When they eventually return to their birthplace to nest and reproduce, the awe they inspire is well deserved. Wouldn't it be wonderful to have a breeding destination for these summer visitors within the village? If one or two nesting boxes will help I say, 'Go for it'. Perhaps you know of other suitable sites? I would suggest the side of the (ex) Post Office (now estate agents) but in my mind, I still have that earmarked for House Martins!

MARROW MINDED?

This year we are all discovering courgettes, which overnight became marrows. So here is a recipe given me by Pam Pearce, no not stuffed, but MARROW PIE.

1 FULL SIZE MARROW, handful of sultanas, sugar, 2 teaspoons lemon juice. Cornflour. + Pastry. Cut marrow into slices about I inch to 1.5 inches wide, peel and de-seed, then cut each ring into bite size pieces, again about I inch.

Place in a saucepan with the sultanas and lemon juice and perhaps a tablespoon of sugar, then cover with water. Bring to the boil and simmer gently until the marrow is translucent and soft.

Strain the liquid into a jug, then tip the marrow into a basin and return the liquid to the saucepan. Mix about 1 tablespoon of water with 1 dessertspoon of cornflour and add to the juice, bring to the boil then simmer, stirring all the time, until it becomes translucent and finally return the marrow to the pan and mix well. At this point you can adjust the sugar or lemon juice if necessary.

Finally, put the mixture into a pie dish, cover with pastry and bake for 25 minutes (?) until the pastry is cooked.

The lemon juice gives a tang to the flavour and, of course, the sultanas provide sugar, so you don't need too much. People who have tried it cannot decide what the "fruit" is, but no-one guessed it was marrow!

Good luck, I will be trying this out with the next courgette/now marrow.

Anyone got a recipe for French bean soup?

ADVICE AFTER REPORTS OF A TELEPHONE FRAUD

You are advised to be vigilant following a recent fraud which has seen offenders pose as police officers over the phone before sending couriers to collect money from their homes.

A person claiming to be from either Surrey Police or the Metropolitan Police explained that there had been fraudulent activity in their bank accounts, either with items being illegally purchased or with bank transactions being deleted from their statements.

Victims were told the bank was involved with the scam and subsequently told to withdraw a large sum of money. It was then arranged for a courier to collect the money from their address as the notes were 'counterfeit'.

These fraudsters tend to target the most vulnerable members of our society, in particular the elderly, and do come across as very plausible on the phone. They may even know some of your personal details, such as a name or an address which can be easy to obtain from a phonebook or voters register.

The Police will **NEVER** instruct you to withdraw money over the phone. If you are ever suspicious of a call, hang up immediately and wait five minutes to ensure your line is clear or use a different telephone.

You can then call 101 to report the suspicious activity, or clarify whether you had been contacted by the police.

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
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
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
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
