EDITORIAL

A recent Sunday service at St Mary's began with the prayer: "Lord God, there are lots of things we could be doing today. But we have come here". Perhaps Easter weekend is like that for many, with family and friends to see; children to entertain; and the welcome opportunity of an early season holiday for those who can afford it.

Easter is the most important festival in the Church year. If we believe the Biblical account of the events and meaning of Good Friday and Easter Day and the testimony of Christians for two millennia, then it has the power to transform all our weekends (and weekdays for that matter). Thus every Holy Communion (Eucharist or Mass) remembers the Good Friday sacrifice of Jesus Christ for humankind and every Sunday is a celebration of His physical Resurrection on the third day.

Hopefully, we admire sacrifice when we see it – for example, the commitment of those who staff our lifeboats in order to "save souls" - but on another level we may be slightly uncomfortable when a sacrifice is asked of us or offered on our behalf, depending on the situation.

In the run up to Easter two things struck me concerning the sacrifice of Christ. One writer spoke of looking into the eyes of Christ on the Cross and seeing the depths of the love of God. Another speaker, on BBC Songs of Praise, reminded me of the picture of a hen covering its chicks to protect them, which was an illustration that Jesus Himself used to describe His love for the people He would save.

I warmly invite you to join us at St Mary's on Easter Day and/or the following Sundays, as we especially explore, celebrate and experience the sacrificial love of God in this Easter Season.

WE NEED YOUR HELP, TO SECURE THE NEXT 20 YEARS IN TATSFIELD

TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

First and foremost, I'd like to thank Kim Jennings for coming forward to fill the vacancy on the parish council and we welcome her to the team with open arms. Kim has been in the village for many years and I'm sure many of you know her through the village organisations with which she has and continues to be involved.

Last month we discussed the planning application for Linda's Stores to convert the two shops into one unit with external changes to the shop front and change of use of the rear store rooms into a flat. We decided to support this application as it means a return of the vital services provided by the village shop and post office, which have long been the focal point of the community.

We have recently had a Legionella Risk Assessment carried out on both the Village Hall and the Aileen McHugo Building and, subject to a couple of non-serious rectifications, both buildings are clear.

We have selected a contractor to install new gateways and signage as you enter the village on the Approach Road and the same contractor will also now build the footpath between the village and the scout hut and up to the corner opposite the car park at the old Beaver Water World site. We hope both these works will start in the next couple of months.

We have been made aware of Japanese knotweed growing on some parish land and at various other points in the village. If you are aware of any such areas please do get in touch with us. We are in the process of carrying out various site inspections to see what needs to be done to have it eradicated.

Finally, a reminder that the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday, 1st May. There will be the usual reports from Parish, District and County Councillors as well as from the police. We are also hoping to be able to use the meeting as a public consultation for the proposed installation of CCTV around the village. Once we have managed to confirm this I will let you know but, in the meantime, please do keep the date free.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held at the Aileen McHugo Building on Monday 9th April at 8.00 pm. As always, the agenda will be made available on village notice boards and at: <u>www.surreycommunity.info/tatsfield/</u>

TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Council agrees district council tax increase of 2.99%

At the full Council meeting of the 22^{nd} February an increase of £2.99% was agreed (for a Band D property) in



Tandridge District Council's share of the council tax for 2018/2019.

This means Band D council tax will increase by £6.09 to £209.71, which is less than 12p a week. Tandridge District Council's share of the Council Tax helps fund a wide range of services including recycling and waste collection, planning, street sweeping, housing, housing benefits and children's play areas.

The increase will help resource work to improve our town centres, invest more in our parks and open spaces, protect our greenbelt, deliver affordable homes and support the district's most vulnerable residents.

Surrey County Council, which provides services including schools, adult social care, children services, roads, fire and rescue and libraries, together with the office of the Surrey Police and Crime Commissioner, have both agreed to increase their Band D level for 2018/2019.

Surrey County Council has agreed a council tax rise of 5.99% in 2018/2019, which includes 3% for social care, while Surrey Police and Crime Commissioner agreed an increase of 5.34%.

This year's total band D Council Tax will be £1,857.57, this is an increase of 5.56%, which is divided among the different organisations as follows:

Surrey Police & Crime Commissioner	£224.57	£236.57	5.34%
Tatsfield Parish Council	£48.09	£ 47.57	Small decrease

This gives a Band D Council Tax level of \pm 1953.23 for the 2018/2019 financial year. This was agreed with difficulty, including some abstentions on the vote, but after careful consideration and taking in to account the loss of government grants it was felt prudent for me to vote with the Conservative majority in this matter.

Most people on income support, guaranteed pension credit, or very low incomes will continue to have the cost of council tax met by council tax support. Other people will automatically have their council tax support recalculated to reflect their revised bills.

All councils are facing a challenging financial situation due to reduced government funding. TDC are doing all they can to generate savings, as well as reviewing their services and how they are currently delivered. The overall aim is to continue providing services to a high standard and to be available to support more vulnerable residents."

Closer to home I was pleased to be able to welcome Ms Amanda Bird from TDC to the village to explain the new **Community Transport** system to the WI and NSY club members. She will be back for one of the Pop-ins and then the Annual Parish Meeting. Meanwhile the single phone number (01883 732937) for residents who need community transport services in the district will be open every weekday from 8.30am to 5pm to provide advice on the most appropriate form of transport available.

During April I will attend a civic reception for the volunteer section of which Tatsfield have many and I have invited Mr Barry Bull to come along with me so that he may receive the thanks of the wider community.

I am aware that **dog fouling** continues to be a nuisance and I will continue to work with both TDC and TPC to eradicate this problem. Do not be afraid to name and shame the owners who not scoop their poop!

In the future all council meetings will be broadcast live, won't that be fun for you all to watch the Councillors in action (or not in some cases)? More information as the system becomes available.

Over the next few months your dealings with Tandridge District Council may be affected by the changes being implemented under the "Customer First "programme, so please bear with them during these changes. There are some hard decisions being made about staffing with inevitable job losses so if everything else is failing contact me for assistance.

POLICING

By the time you read this, I really would like to think that spring is upon us, i.e. no more snow. But as this country has a nationwide obsession with the weather, anything is possible. Heatwave, perhaps?

Well, my colleagues and I are always ready to spring into action, wherever something bad occurs. Thankfully, during the past month, not too much has happened (Rupe's kiss of death strikes again).

There have been two crimes of note. In early March, a vehicle parked on Rag Hill Close was damaged when an unknown offender tried to extract fuel from its tank. Not very successfully, as lots of fuel was discovered on the ground. Sadly no lines of enquiry with this one.

The other one has been classified as a business burglary, as a site off Clarks Lane was illegally entered, with a generator taken. Frustratingly, there are no lines of enquiry to pursue, not even forensics.

That's it for the month. What else shall I fill up the rest of the page with? Simply put, two local appeals for your help please, as Tatsfield residents......

A regular, yet persistent, issue which seems to come and go, is the parking of vehicles at the junction of Westmore Road and Redhouse Road. The Highway Code is very clear, stating: No parking within 10 metres of any road junction. So that's at least two cars' length. I do understand the location has a premium for parking, but if you are parking a vehicle there, please stop. It is extremely dangerous for anyone exiting Redhouse. If you notice any parking right on the junction, please do not hesitate to report it to Surrey Police on 101. Thanks.

Secondly, Tatsfield is normally a quiet village with (let's admit it) an unusual road layout, which lends itself to keeping any traffic travelling quite slowly. However, recently we have received reports of a red Fiat Ducato van, which has been noted both driving extremely slowly around several roads, and parked with the engine running, with males seen in the van and approaching/leaving it. Not sure what the intentions are, but we're sure that they are not there for any justified reason. Please report any suspicious vehicle to police immediately. Thanks.

Kids: now that you have off weeks off to go wild, please be aware of your own safety when away from parents. If you can, stay in a group, and never talk to strangers. Unless it's me. Also don't get sick on all your choc eggs. Give some to me!!

THE ORPHEUS CENTRE – THE JEWEL OF EAST SURREY

Twenty years ago Sir Richard and Lady Annabel Stilgoe made it possible for the Orpheus Centre to be opened in Godstone. Orpheus was started with the aim of providing a space for young disabled people to let their talent and imagination blossom through music and the performing arts. Sir Richard had seen through his work with neurologist Dr Michael Swallow how performance could transform the lives of people – not least because it builds a confidence that can be transferred to day to day living and the work environment.

Orpheus began with five students who lived at the centre and were taught life skills – cooking, doing the laundry, managing budgets, shopping – but who also wrote songs,

choreographed dances and performed. These performances began to change peoples' perceptions of disabled people and helped to build support for the centre and allow it to expand – and expand it has. There are now 26 full time residents who live in independent flats, and 20 day students. These students have achieved a staggering 167 qualifications in music and the arts. Students past and present have performed in venues such as the Royal Opera House, Glastonbury, the Paralympic Opening Ceremony and appeared in *Call the Midwife*. The students also often came to Tatsfield to sing at St Mary's The link with Tatsfield has been a long one. Former resident Patti Thomas-Verweij, currently a member of the Orpheus staff has brought

Orpheus students regularly to St Mary's Church for Sunday worship. In addition, current resident Ann Lovelace is Orpheus's longest serving volunteer. Former students Angus Morton, Charlotte Rowling and Luke Tye have all performed at the Flower Festival concerts.

The success of the centre is a result of the determination and talent of students both past and present, and the dedication of its founders, staff and 98 volunteers. All are passionate about the work they do not only at the site in Godstone for the students themselves, but also the outreach work the students take part in which inspires other young adults also in very challenging situations; for example Orpheus students have worked with inmates at Bronzefield Prison and Medway Secure Training Centre. In addition the outreach programme links with other organisations supporting those with

disabilities such as young people with epilepsy and also with schools. In all these programmes the gift the students of Orpheus give is "Inspiration and Confidence and Joy".

At a packed reception at the House of Lords on Monday 26th February Sam Gyimah Member of Parliament for East Surrey spoke about Orpheus being the Jewel of East Surrey because of what it says about people and what is important to people – how the Orpheus mission is to give disabled people the ability

and confidence to do things themselves, exercise their will and their talent. This was

fully evident when alumni of Orpheus performed. Angus one of the very first students spoke about his 5-6 years at Orpheus and the positive effect it has had on his life, including an opportunity to perform at the Queen Elizabeth's 80th birthday celebrations at Windsor Castle, his work recently performing in prisons as part of the Birdsong Project and singing with the Kentish Opera Society.

Sarah Newton, Minister of State for Disabled People, Health and Work emphasised the need to always focus on what people can do, not on what

they can't. The right support, she said, can help people make their fullest contribution to society. Sarah is very grateful for Orpheus, not only for its focus on performing arts, but also for enabling students to move forward, to be accepted and to gain skills to help them join the workforce.

The cost of running the Orpheus Centre and its outreach programmes is of course considerable. The reception at the House of Lords was sponsored by Citibank with the aim of raising funds but also encouraging volunteering. John Beere who has now taken over as Chair of the Orpheus Board of Trustees praised the longevity of the Centre's volunteers, especially Ann Lovelace who after 16 years is still finding it very difficult to leave! There are currently 98 volunteers at Orpheus who contribute in all sorts of ways. LEWIS RISES TO THE MATHS CHALLENGE

Lewis Longley from Tatsfield Primary School has been presented with a Bronze award by The Mathematical Association in this year's Primary Mathematics Challenge (PMC). The prestigious honour demonstrates his achievement as one of the best young mathematicians in the UK.



The first stage of the challenge took place in November 2017 when the Tatsfield Primary pupils competed alongside 68,000 children across the country. Successfully answering a variety of multiple choice mathematics problems, 10 year old Lewis joined the highest scorers who were invited to take part in the PMC Bonus Round in February.

Lewis rose to the challenge and was one of 1,857 pupils to win an award.

Speaking of Lewis' success Kevin Bellinger, Headteacher at Tatsfield Primary, said "We are all extremely proud that Lewis has won a Bronze

award. It is such an achievement to receive recognition for mathematical ability on a national scale. We like to stretch all our children and are delighted that Lewis did so well and that he enjoyed taking part in the Challenge."

Lesley Jones from The Mathematical Association added: "We would like to offer our congratulations to Lewis and all of the pupils that participated. We received a large number of entries, which reflects a real appetite for solving maths problems and puzzles. We always try to make the questions interesting and accessible, while giving pupils an opportunity to apply fundamental maths skills. It is great to be able to acknowledge brilliant young minds in the UK and nurture the future mathematicians."

NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA CONCERT

The next NDS concert will be on Saturday May 12th, at the Village Hall at 7.30 pm.

Gioachino Rossini wrote nearly 40 operas, although many are now only remembered for their overtures. He wrote '*The Barber of Seville'*, *The Thieving Magpie'* and '*William Tell'* amongst many others, but NDS will be playing the overture to '*An Italian Girl in Algiers'*, a comic opera written in 1813. This will be followed by the Mozart '*Piano Concerto 24*' played by Mariela Cingo, who has played with us many times before, and is very popular. The piano concerto number 24 was written in 1786, which is when his great opera '*The Marriage of Figaro'* was premiered. Mariela will also be playing a work by Gerald Finzi, his '*Eclogue for Piano and Strings'*. An Eclogue is a poem on a pastoral theme, and the work was only named and performed after his death in 1956, although it was written in the 1920's.

The second half of the concert will be Beethoven's 'Symphony No 1 in C', composed in 1800. His teacher at this time was Franz Joseph Haydn, and his influence is obvious, but in the end the symphony is typically Beethoven. He introduced himself with this work uniquely and boldly as an advancing symphonic composer and stood true to this statement throughout his compositional life. The concert will be conducted by Bryn Clarke, who has taken 3 previous concerts for us.

Surrey councils join together to tackle Child Sexual Exploitation

To mark National Child Sexual Exploitation Awareness Day, which was on 18 March, Surrey councils are highlighting the work they are doing to protect and identify children or vulnerable adults at risk in the county.

Surrey councils are working towards setting up a new policy, which will require taxi and private hire drivers to complete Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and safeguarding awareness training. Existing licensed drivers will have 12 months to complete the training and new applicants will be required to complete it before being granted a licence. All 11 district and borough councils across Surrey have either approved the policy or are in the process of doing so, to take a consistent and countywide approach.

Surrey County Council is also going to require drivers involved in the transport of children to complete the training. This training will mean drivers are more able to spot the signs of CSE when they have children as passengers and will know how to report it.

ST MARY'S CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL 2018-19

The Church Electoral Roll is your parish church's register of electors - it is the list of those entitled to attend and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting where the elections take place for:

- (a) the parochial church council;
- (b) the parish representatives on the deanery synod.

Any person entitled to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting may raise any question of parochial or general church interest.

Revision of the Electoral Roll takes place from Sunday 25th March to Sunday 8th April 2018. Under the Church Representation Rules any persons are entitled to have their names entered on the roll if they:

- are baptised and aged 16 or over;
- have signed a form of application for enrolment;

and either:

• are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment;

or:

• are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves also to be members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

On Tuesday March 13th we were blessed to have our own Ken Dodd of Tatty Tatsfield entertaining us in the WI Hall. A fitting tribute to one of the last great entertainers who had sadly recently passed away.

Bryan was full of enthusiasm and tutored us all by demonstrating how to display daffodils at our Forthcoming Spring Show on April 14th as he is coming to Tatsfield to judge the horticultural sections. He called on three



volunteers to have a go using moss to arrange the daffodil flowers. Bryan went on to explain when to pick the flowers, how to prepare the blooms using make up brushes or cotton wool buds essential to ensure perfection by removing loose pollen or blemishes. Thank goodness we are not top grade professionals in Tatsfield, but it gave us an insight in to how serious the real professionals are sometimes spending as much as £50 on a single bulb! There is no prize money to be won at these top British National Shows, so the prize is just knowing that you have beaten your fellow horticulturists giving yourself extra street cred and a red rosette and large trophy.

The volunteers all made a grand job and then Bryan was kind in his judging results. Bryan also brought along lots of dahlia tubers and gave us a demonstration in how to take cuttings - which do need hormone rooting powder, before being placed in multi purpose compost; whereas the chrysanthemums just need pinching off last years plants using your nails and placing them in multi purpose compost. So easy!!!

Bryan then spoke about how to grow various vegetables including potatoes, onions, including onion sets, leeks and parsnips to name but a few. Big tip....Never use old parsnip seed. New unopened packets if you wish to get good germination.

Homemade fruit cake followed washed down with copious mugs of tea and coffee and lots of village chatter. After the refreshment break Bryan gave us a quick lesson in growing sweet peas before everyone was invited to ask questions.

These evenings are informative, enjoyable and very social and with Bryan hysterical at times! He had us in stitches and no one was exempt from his banter as he walked about the floor asking everyone about their own gardens as well. A truly fabulous evening with a record number of attendees totalling over 40 villagers. Thank you Bryan for your generosity in sending us home with bunches of daffodils, pots of sweet peas, onion sets, dahlia tubers, chrysanthemum cuttings and I'm sure lots more as the plants kept coming from behind the curtain! Let's all thank Bryan by displaying our daffodils at the show and show him we didn't fall asleep....well we had no chance of that! Well done. COMPOSTER'S CHRONICLE

Another composting season arrives! The site will be open to receive green waste each Saturday morning between 10:00am and noon from 7th April to 29th September inclusive. **Just a reminder that you must be a member of the Tatsfield Horticultural Society to use the facility**. (Join up at the site – benefits include 10% discount at Knights Garden Centre!)

All being well, by the time you read this article, we will have completed rebuilding the first third of our compost bins. A lot of thought and work has gone into this so I thought you might like to know what we have done, why we have done it and how we have tried to maintain the highest organic standards for our future compost production.

The existing bins were made from old pallets and started receiving green waste in 2013. There is one good thing about pallets – they are a waste product and therefore free (or at least cheap, if you have to pay someone to transport them) and re-use is the best form of recycling. Unfortunately, just about everything else about them is problematic.

They come in all shapes, sizes and construction styles which makes it very difficult to form a regular, sturdy structure. They are nailed together and removing just one slat to modify them requires a surprising amount of time and effort. They are not always available and, when they are, often come in large quantities and take up storage space until needed. We had to start repairing/replacing some of them this year and it became apparent that the time and effort involved would be unsustainable for us as the site aged. The whole site was built in one go and would most likely all start to collapse at the same time.

The decision to buy new timber was taken. We have used treated softwood for the three fixed sides and untreated hardwood for the removeable fronts. The treated softwood was the only real option for the bulk of the construction in terms of durability and cost. Some organic gardening websites don't recommend using treated wood for compost bins but "The Royal Horticultural Society" seems quite happy for it to be used for growing plants in raised beds – let alone compost bins – and doesn't make any distinction between edible and non-edible plants. Apparently, all the really nasty chemicals were banned by the EU in 2004 (which included arsenic, would you believe?) and the only real no-no these days is old railway sleepers which are contaminated with creosote. However, being a bit of a chemicalphobe myself and to remove any risk of our coveted compost being tainted either by reputation or chemicals, we are lining the treated sides with black polythene to avoid contact between the wood and the compost. Martin Allen managed to get the untreated hardwood to make the fronts at very reasonable cost. Thanks for that, Martin.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN APRIL

The cold spell of weather last month would have caused a lot of problems for gardeners had is persisted, but despite temperatures a low as -11C and a nasty East wind there are no signs of any serious damage. However, with conifers and some evergreens it will be later this month before we can be sure that they are not suffering from 'wind burn'. You may notice that some soft shoots that developed on your roses and other plants have been damaged by the frost and cold winds, don't worry they will recover.

Sowing vegetable and flower seeds direct into the soil might be a bit delayed on our heavy wet soil. Be patient, you will gain nothing by sowing too early, wait for the soil to dry out and warm up, you will be surprised by how fast the young seedlings will grow and catch up.

The good news is that the above average rainfall (and snow) from December onwards has resulted in the low levels of water in our reservoirs and chalk aquifers are now recovering and, fingers crossed, we should make it through this summer without any water restrictions that were being talked about last autumn.

The not so good news is that all this wet weather and dull conditions has seen the growth of moss and algae especially in our lawns. They thrive in damp conditions especially where there is shade from large plants, trees and buildings. Treating moss in lawns with proprietary moss killers may deal with the immediate problem but not the underlying causes. If you can, it is a good idea to prune back overhanging branches to improve the light and air around the lawn. Improving the aeration and drainage of the surface is also a good idea using a fork or spiker – good exercise for the back and legs!! Comb out the moss using a wire rake or hire in a scarifier but be ready for a large volume of moss and thatch (dead grass).

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – APRIL 2018

Recently all the planetary action has been taking place in the morning skies and has favoured early risers who have been able to follow the gradual changes in the positions of Mars, Jupiter and Saturn. However, subtly, the balance is shifting and soon the casual sky watcher who prefers the sociability of evening observing will be rewarded with the presence of bright planets once more.

If you look low down and due west the bright object you can see there is Venus. It's often referred to as the "Evening Star" although as it spends an equal amount of time in the pre-dawn skies it has just as much right to be called the "Morning Star".

On January 9th the Earth, Venus and the Sun were all in line with the Sun in the middle, a situation that is referred to as Venus being at "superior conjunction". After this Venus moves gradually further and further east of the Sun so it becomes visible in the evening sky. The further Venus is from the Sun, the easier it is to see. At the beginning of April it is still relatively close although as the days pass the gap between the two bodies opens up so that by the end of this month Venus is twenty-two degrees high in the west as soon as the Sun has set. If you remember, the horizon to the overhead point is ninety degrees, so Venus will be one quarter of that distance in altitude. If you are tempted to "sweep" with binoculars to find Venus you must **wait until after sunset** or you risk blindness if you accidentally look at the Sun.

Later in the evening, around 11pm at the start of April, the planet Jupiter can be seen rising in the South East. As the month progresses the planet rises slightly earlier each day until by the end of the month it has cleared the horizon by 9pm. It will be at its very best around May 9th when it will be closest to Earth and therefore at it's brightest.

Women in Astronomy – Vera Rubin (Part 5)

Told by scientists to "go away and look at more galaxies" that was exactly what she did although the results were the same despite examining over two hundred of them. The stars on the outer edges of galaxies were rotating around their (galactic) cores far more quickly than expected. In fact their speed was too great for them to be held in place by the gravity caused by the stars that we could see. These results forced astronomers to ask themselves what the "glue" was that held galaxies together and stopped them flying apart. The answer, it seemed, was some kind of mysterious unseen matter – material that had mass and therefore a gravitational effect but didn't emit any light, hence the name "dark matter" was coined. Vera's calculations showed that an average galaxy would be made up of 10% visible mass and 90% dark matter in order for their behaviour to be explained.

Vera made many acerbic quotations in her time, and in one she says "In a spiral galaxy, the ratio of dark-to-light matter is about a factor of ten. That's probably a good number for the ratio of our ignorance-to-knowledge". She knew that in the 1930's Fritz Zwicky had observed groups of galaxies and that he had realised that for them to act as a group in the way they did meant that something visible was missing. Vera had found

the proof for the existence of dark matter and realised that most of the universe was in fact invisible.

However, the obvious question to ask is "What is this dark matter whose influence we can see but is itself unseen by us?" Sadly this remains as yet unanswered though some of the brightest astronomical minds, with some of the very latest technology at their command, are focussed upon it.

Had she been a man Vera would very likely have been the recipient of the Nobel Prize, though she was awarded the National Medal of Science in 1993 by President Bill Clinton and held four Honorary Doctorates. She was someone who never sought personal acclaim or gain; her satisfaction came from scientific study and advancement. She once said "I'm sorry I know so little. I'm sorry we all know so little. But that's kind of fun isn't it?"

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

Correspondence:

We have had plenty of Red Kite reports lately. These have, of course, been spotted frequently over the past few years, but it's always an exciting sight. Here's a review of your most recent observations of Kites and other birds:

Nicola (Reeves) (06.02.18): 'Yesterday @ 3pm there was a **Red Kite** circling low over the middle part of Westmore Road. I know they've been around the Botley area for a few years and we've had the occasional one down here, but this was the closest one to the village centre I've seen.'

Liz (Armitage) (07.02.18): '*Red Kite* spotted Monday, wheeling high up over our garden in the snow. The **Blue Tits** are already inspecting our new bird box. We also have the *Grey Wagtail* back again. Even more exciting, the beautiful coral **Bullfinch** came back briefly – it's a couple of years since we saw him last, but hoping he will be a regular. It was quite early morning, but I shouted to Alan to come and look - I said, "This is worth getting out of bed for"... and he did! So twice as amazing!!!'

Martin (Allen) and Julie (Jewell) (12.02.18): 'Looking out of our kitchen window this morning (it faces towards Rickett Hill Road direction) we saw for the first time this side of the village a **Red Kite** flying over what could have been Maesmaur or Borough Road before it was mobbed by a [Carrion] **Crow** and made to flee off to the north over the village centre.'

(01.03.18) 'Hello from snowy No.38 (01.03.18). The one good thing about being cold here is that it is colder elsewhere and sends the European birds over to us. Delighted to say we have another first to record. A **Fieldfare** on our small privet tree (rather than a hedge). Saw it once and then it returned, strangely staying in the privet rather than taking any of the seeds that were on the ground. The most recent **Red Kite** sighting of a few days ago was whilst we were walking down Greenway as it flew off over the roof tops.'

(02.03.18) 'The numbers and sightings are going up by the hour. A total of six, yes <u>six</u>, **Fieldfare** were feeding off what looked like to us to be little black berries on the privet hedge/tree. We were then surprised by six, yes <u>six</u>, **Long-tailed Tits** feeding off the fat balls and peanuts. There were flocks (5-10) of both [House] **Sparrows** and **Chaffinches** along with **Greenfinch**, **Goldfinch**, **Robin** and **Blackbirds**. And finally a handsome looking **Song Thrush** was seen in the garden, and at one time was sitting amongst the Fieldfare. We are away for the weekend, subject of course to the weather, so may not see the return of the Fieldfare before they strip the berries completely.'

Thanks, Nicola, Liz, Martin and Julie. Strangely enough, I was recently thinking that with this cold and wintry weather blowing from the east, I should have had reports of Fieldfares, as in previous years. But no, I've heard nothing - until now. Well spotted!

We've had numerous reports of a solitary Kite over different parts of the village, including Westmore Green. I think the main challenge now is to see who can encourage one to come down and feed in their garden. Keep your cameras at the ready!

Next, a message from Louis and Sandy Philibert (27.02.18): 'Thought we'd let you know we have had a **Goldcrest** feeding on a Coronilla (still in flower) this morning. Not sure whether it is eating new buds but it spent a good 5-10 minutes working its way around. At the same time Goldfinches have been eating the Niger seed on the bird table.'

Thanks, Sandy. I now have to look up 'Coronilla' to see what it looks like! Okay, found it: Vita Sackville-West described Coronilla as, 'flowering continuously between those two great feasts of the Church - a sort of hyphen between the Birth and the Resurrection', and praised it for its 'persistence throughout the dreary months'. Let's hope it wasn't the buds the Goldcrest was eating or you may be enduring much dreariness!

Now, you may remember that last month I asked for your deer observations. Well, just as I was thinking all of our resident deer must have fled elsewhere, Tracey (one of our magazine editors) sent a last-minute email from along Ricketts Hill Road (15.03.18): 'In your March notes you asked for sightings of deer in the village. We have a lovely family of three that spend a lot of time in our garden. I'm not sure they are going to be so popular if they start eating our seedlings in the new veggie patch, though!!'

Mmm – veggies or deer? A difficult choice. Is wire netting the answer? Tracey kindly forwarded a photograph of the deer on her driveway and from that it has been possible to identify them as **Roe deer**. Well spotted, Tracey, and thanks for your report.

I do enjoy a display of determination. Here's a further note from Steve (Gaskell). Carol has recently allowed him back out on his bike for good behaviour (15.03.18): 'Hi Nigel, 2x Brimstones @ French St yesterday (14th). Wrong side of the M25?'

Good try, Steve, but as French Street cuts across Hosey Common, south of Westerham,



your brilliant observation is officially, 'Out Of Bounds'! Better luck next time (perhaps).

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO THIS MONTH

A century ago, many Tatsfield families were waiting anxiously for news from the front.

Among them was Mrs Wallis-Taylor of Paynesfield Road who had given birth to a son soon after her husband had been called up. Driver Forbes of Grove Road had been serving with the Canadians in France but was now in hospital in England. His brother Walter was in hospital in France. Private Blake of the Royal Fusiliers had been wounded and the Westerham Herald reported that Private George Standing of Maesmaur Road serving in the Royal West Kent Regiment - was also a casualty with leg and arm wounds.

For the parish council, the preoccupation was the supply of food for the population at home. Four tons of seed potatoes ordered by the council had now been delivered and were ready for distribution from 'the Institute' in Borough Road.

The community spirit was strong as the war continued well into its fourth year and there was time for a group photo outside Mr Potter's tearooms, now the Bakery restaurant.



One consequence of the war was that the village's street lamps and posts had not been used and were not likely to be for some time to come. The parish council decided to sell them!

FIVE MINUTES WITH.... JANE KELLS

Welcome to our third article featuring local residents with a story to share. This month we are talking to Jane Kells (nee Standing).

How long have you live in Tatsfield?

I am the fourth generation of Standings living in Tatsfield and am delighted to say that my son and his wife, together with their two children, will carry on the tradition.

My Dad did leave Tatsfield to join the Metropolitan Police but when he retired in 1977 we returned to Tatsfield. That is when my parents bought the 'old' Post Office and hopefully most people will remember Jo and Brian – especially on Christmas Eve when mum served



her homemade mince pies with a glass of sherry! We had great fun living there for many years until ill health forced them to retire.

I had two young children during this time, so worked at Tatsfield Primary (the old one!) as a teaching assistant and then moved to Oxted County as Matron with Abi Collins.

What are your favourite memories of Tatsfield?

The weather has been pretty miserable lately but still not as much snow as in the 'old days'. I remember a particularly bad winter, it must be about thirty odd years ago now – Church Lane was completely filled with snow and you had to walk on top of the hedges! We were also on the news as an army helicopter dropped supplies to the farm on Clarks Lane. There was a great atmosphere as people congregated in The Ship or Working Men's Club – everybody chatted and had a story to tell.

I'm very proud to be part of the Tatsfield community but also a Standing as they were one of the original families in the village. On Remembrance Day the names of men lost in the First and Second World War are read out and there are two Standings amongst



them – it's very strange that all these years later my family is still here.

What do you do now?

After our children had grown up and moved on with their lives, Kim Jennings and I felt we needed a project! Kim thought a lingerie shop was just the thing Westerham needed and so we became partners and in 2005 we opened the first Entre Nous Lingerie shop in Westerham. We trained at Rigby and Peller – that's where we learned NOT to use a tape measure! We also went on mastectomy courses – beginners and advanced.

We had the shop for ten years until our lease expired. Kim thought this would be a good opportunity to try something different but I wanted to carry on in the lingerie business. So in September 2015 Entre Nous (2) was born with my new business partner Kate Frost.

Why do you love it so much, why is it so important?

We love what we do and try to accommodate everyone. There have been a few features about lingerie on ITV's 'This Morning' talking about the importance of being measured regularly because our bodies change so much especially after a certain age!

It's not what size you are it's the fit; nobody is the same size in every make - especially if you wear a larger cup the wrong bra size can give you back ache, shoulder pain and bad posture.

I had a young lady in for a fitting yesterday and she was a 32FF in one make and a 34E in another, BUT she had been measured as a 38B in a certain high street store!! This is why we don't use tape measures - they don't work! We measure by the eye.



A lot of people like to come to a small independent shop as it's more relaxed, especially for young teenagers who need their first bra. For a lot of young girls the thought of having a fitting is the most embarrassing thing ever! But we try to make it as simple and easy as possible so please tell your daughters not to worry we understand that they are very shy at this age.

I often see people at keep fit and jogging along the road obviously not wearing a sports bra – this is probably one of the biggest mistakes you could make and damages your breast tissue.

We cater for larger cups and mastectomy ladies and try to have a range of prices. We always try to help people as much as we can - for instance I'm going on a home visit to help a 92-year-old lady as she can't get to the shop and wants some help with fitting.

Tatsfield is a great place to live and I would love to thank our Tatsfield ladies who come and support us in these hard economic times!
