

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
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

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#### EDITORIAL

In this 200th year since her birth, I recently had cause to reflect upon the faith of Emily Brontë, poet and author of Wuthering Heights, as one of my sisters was giving a talk about her at the Brontë Parsonage Museum at Haworth. Whilst Emily's father was an Anglican clergyman, she is difficult to pin down, since she regarded faith as a private thing and she had some misgivings about the Church. However, her poem "No Coward Soul is Mine" includes parts that could be interpreted as reaching out to the God who is behind and beyond all things and acknowledging the God within. In the poem she speaks of god, deity, spirit, being and breath, as well as addressing the subject of death (although it is not certain which of these were given a capital letter in her original handwritten version).

In spite of the poem, Emily's faith and the kind of God she may have believed in, remain something of a mystery. However, as we approach the celebration of Christmas, the good news is that God has freely allowed us to "pin Him down". The Christian belief that Jesus Christ is fully God and fully human, means that His birth in Bethlehem some 2000 years ago signals the introduction of God to us in a way that we might more easily comprehend. If we believe this, then we can more readily learn what God is like, as we reflect on the life, words and deeds of Christ.

During this autumn term, some will lament just how early the Christmas advertising begins but even here there is perhaps a reminder that a significant event lies behind the celebration and the accompanying season of giving. As Jesus Himself speaks of loving God and neighbour, so we might respond by striving for love and peace in the world, and increasingly there are opportunities to do this as part of our Christmas observance. There are some very good charitable activities to care for the homeless and there are organisations that offer gifts that will serve or help the poor in other parts of the world.

We warmly invite you to join us at St Mary's Church and or Tatsfield Primary School for our Christmas services, which are detailed in our Christmas card accompanying this issue of the Tatsfield Parish Magazine.

#### Dear Editor,

In July this year I was lucky enough to travel with my school to Ecuador. The trip was organised by Camps International. This organisation works in some of the poorest village

areas and in the Amazon to help improve and educate about health, hygiene and nutrition, and vitally to help combat deforestation.

We spent the first week in the Cloud Forest, just north of Quito, where we helped develop sustainable business in the area, such as coffee harvesting, tourism and tree conservation. Sadly, the spectacled bear didn't make an appearance, but we had some amazing views and saw all the different



birds and wildlife very close to the camp. Our work in the Amazon was quite similar, although we switched camps halfway through. In one place, we constructed a septic tank



and chicken house for an old woman in one of the tribes, and we began to lay the foundations for a community centre and water system in another. On top of this, we were educated about the threats to the rainforest and did some conservation work. One shocking threat to the Amazon is big businesses venturing in to exploit the people and the forest for resources. One such example is a huge road which a business created, intending to access a mine, but went in the wrong direction so simply bulldozed a kilometre of forest without repercussions. Whilst we did help to make some change in the Amazon, it is clear that a lot more needs to be done to preserve it.

The big physical challenge was five days of trekking. The first

two days took us to base camp and then on the each of the following three days we climbed a mountain.

- Day one Tolillas, 3995 metres high.
- Day two Cerro Negro 4245 metres high.
- Day three we were aiming for the summit of Fuya Fuya which is 4270 metres high. Unfortunately, we didn't make it to the top. At 4003 metres some of the girls in my team became very ill with altitude sickness and it was clear they had to be taken down the mountain immediately. With limited teaching support staff, the team could not be safely split and so the remainder of us were unable to continue the climb. However, this was an important lesson – our friends needed our support and the experience reinforced the importance of teamwork. Maybe one day I will get the chance to go back and complete the climb!



Tatsfield very kindly supported me, as I raised the funds to go on this trip. I was allowed to advertise my hand stencilled pillowcases in the Parish Magazine, and to sell them at the Horticultural Society Spring Show, the St Mary's Church Teas and the Tatsfield School Summer and Christmas fairs. Thank you to you all for helping me have this extraordinary experience. **Caitlin Barry** 



#### TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

I was honoured to be asked to lay a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council at the Remembrance Service in the village on Saturday, 10<sup>th</sup> November. Dave Bishop and the volunteers worked extremely hard to enable this event to take place and I would like to thank them on behalf of the village for all that they did and continue to do.

I am sure you will all be pleased to hear that we have, hopefully, found a solution for the pond. As you know, it has long been at the forefront of the Parish Council's mind. Urgent works have diverted funds and conflicting opinions have delayed proceedings. Towards the end of summer last year, the Parish Council contacted a highly recommended expert to conduct an ecological survey of the pond. However, due to seasonal timing, it was advised that the best time to carry out the survey would be May. The survey was undertaken on 9<sup>th</sup> May this year and should you wish to read it, a link can be found on the Parish Council website's homepage. In very exciting news, the Parish Council was approached over the summer by the owner of Tatsfield Aquatics who has volunteered to clear, re-line and replant the pond, subject to the Parish Council funding a new liner and underlays and the project to bring the runoff rainwater from the Village Club roof. The Parish Council has gratefully accepted Ian Hayman's generous offer and readily accepted to fund the liner and rainwater projects. By the time you read this, work should have begun. Replanting of the pond will take place next spring. Many thanks to all those who have been involved and will continue to be involved with the pond. We are all looking forward to seeing the pond renewed and resplendent as the centrepiece of the village.

Our District Councillor, Martin Allen, and I have, since the beginning of the year, been trying to find a solution to concerns about the gritting of roads. We have approached both Surrey County Council and The London Borough of Bromley to see if the route along Lusted Hall Lane and the circuit down Westmore Road along Crossways and back up Paynesfield Road could be added, if the additional costs were covered by the Parish Council. We have at last found out that, sadly, it's a negative from both. We are speaking to local farmers and very much hope that we will be able to agree a private contract to cover these routes over the winter period.

In the meantime, Surrey County Council should have filled all the grit bins by now. A gentle reminder please that the grit in the bins is not for private use and to be used only on pavements and roads. Please also use it sparingly as a little goes a long way. If you find that a bin near to you is empty please email the bin number to Samantha, our Clerk, and she will ask for it to be re-filled. Please be aware though that this cannot be carried out every day.

The Parish Council is also obtaining some additional grit to be used for the school car park and walkways around the Village Hall. We have a list of volunteers who come out to help clear snow, but we are always looking for more hands so if you are able to help please do let me know. If we all work as a team then, hopefully, we should be able to keep Tatsfield open this year.

On 1<sup>st</sup> December the Christmas tree lights will be turned on and I am looking forward to seeing many of you at the Parish Council sponsored Christmas Carol Service arranged by Dave Bishop on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> December.

On behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

#### **NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE**

As we come to the end of the year it is a good opportunity to reflect on our journey to produce a Neighbourhood Plan that sets out our vision for how we see Tatsfield developing over the next twenty years. An opportunity to set down clear policies about our built and natural



environment, local business, transport and infrastructure and community facilities.

The Parish Council, our District Councillor Martin Allen, and members of the Tatsfield Community formed the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group that meets regularly, and these meetings to public. А website are open the https://www.surreycommunity.info/tatsfieldneighbourhoodplan/ is set up so that the community can keep up to date with our progress and if you would like to comment or ask a question you can email us on tatsfield.plan@btinternet.com Those who wish to ask questions or contribute to the discussions may also contact Martin Allen (Chairman of the Steering Group) by telephone on 577201.

Each Topic Group has produced a draft report and these documents were made available in our public consultation sessions and more of these are planned. As a result of our consultations these reports are being revised and will be available on the website in the near future. In January we will be circulating more surveys and also a 'Call for Sites' that give landowners the opportunity to register their interests.

A vital factor in the development of our Neighbourhood Plan is to have evidence that the Steering Group has consulted the community and that the results of these consultations is incorporated in the final draft Neighbourhood Plan. An important part of this process was the circulation of a local Housing Needs Survey. **784** copies of the Survey were posted to all the households in Tatsfield and we are now in the process of analysing the results:

- 784 survey forms were posted to each household in Tatsfield
- To date we have received 271 completed forms
- The form offered the option of filling in the survey by logging on to <u>www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/Q8DSM5L</u> to date we have received 92 response
- Taken together we currently have almost a 50% return!
- It is not too late if you want to complete the Housing Needs Survey but please make sure you do so this month!

#### TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Since last month's report I attended Community Services, Community Infrastructure Levy, and Strategy and Resources Committee Meetings. A Finance workshop



meeting, a briefing on Caterham Masterplan, and finally a call over regarding the Community Waste Contract for 2019. I invited Peter Trowbridge Development manager (Housing) from TDC to the village and showed him around "possible housing areas" with Althea Davies.

There are still a large number of voting forms still outstanding and the next stage will be a knock on the door from Council Officers. To avoid this please send off your returns right now.

The Winter issue of Tandridge Magazine is due to be received from 12<sup>th</sup> November and I will be keeping an eye on the success or otherwise of the deliveries to Tatsfield as in has been poor at best in the past. If you have not received your copy by the time you read this then please contact me.

The new wheeled bin service was advised in last month's magazine, if you have not read please do so early so there is no confusion later even though it will not come in until Autumn 2019. And remember 56% of material residents put in their rubbish bins could be recycled and the Council is keen to encourage more homeowners to recycle more - full information is available at www.tandridge.gov.uk/recycling. More rubbish costs – more recycling saves it is any easy option.

#### **Biggin Hill Airport**

In the last month or so I have reported a further three over flying aircraft to the BHA Noise and Safety control committee in advance of my BHACC meeting on the 18<sup>th</sup> November and I have emailed the MD to seek the Tatsfield figures and what has been done about the proven overflys.

#### Matters closer to home.

**Fly tip** of cement in Ricketts Hill Road – it is regrettable that despite the photographs and a clear number plate being seen Tandridge were unable to pursue the owner of the vehicle to court as he simply denied being the driver at the time.

However, in October at Guildford Magistrates Court a Smallfield resident was convicted, fined £450 and order to pay £45 plus the Council's costs of £300; and an Edenbridge resident was fined £500 with £500 costs. The waste came from as far as Thames Ditton and Ealing.

There is no need to flytip in or from Tatsfield, the next Bulky Waste collection will be on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> December 2018. Usual time. Usual place.

Moorhouse – The Officers Applicant and both County Highways met in November and I and other local Councillors are awaiting an appointment to know the outcome of this meeting.

Offending of parking on the pavement in Westmore Road. I have received no further complaints since my last article, so I hope the situation has improved along this road. If not, I repeat, I would urge you on any matters like this are reported using the online reporting service via the Surrey police website or through calling 101.

At the time of writing the uncut area of Land at the Junction of LHL / RHR and the poorly completed section of the slurry work in Westmore Road. Have not been resolved but I expect them to have been completed by the time you read this, I will of course be checking.

The Parish Council Chairman and Clerk and I had an update meeting with Surrey County Council where we have set out a plan to pursue things such as yellow lines in the village and additional gritting routes for the village; we will continue to press for them for an additional service.

On the positive side Ship Hill was re-laid and I sent our thanks off to the Highways Team as I was advised the contractor proved very helpful and understanding over the access issues whilst the road was closed. And areas of Titsey Road were "filled in". There is a Speed Reduction Notice coming in force for Titsey Hill from 30<sup>th</sup> November due to the uneven road surface. If you use this road you know how bad the unevenness is, so please do stick to the speed limit for your own safety.

#### **Oxted Quarry**

I guess we have all run in to the monster lorries that come up Chalk Pit Lane to the quarry so there has been a small success by the Leader of the Council and our local MP to have the daily cap restricted 112 rather than 156. But this does not mean we can afford to drive without due care especially where the road narrows dangerously just off a bend. Please be safe out there.

Don't lose your voice – residents urged to check their voter registration details

Local residents are being warned they could lose their voice on matters which affect them if they don't check their annual canvass form as soon as possible.

If the form you received is still sitting on the "to do pile" then use this as a reminder to get it out and deal with.

This is the message that I sent out some two months ago and in response I received an enquiry from a parishioner as to why if someone has been in the same house for twenty years, and has had no change of circumstances, why is this necessary and must be an unnecessary cost. I did not know the answer, so I asked someone who I thought would know and here is the answer.

"These are interesting questions that are being discussed nationally with electoral services, the Cabinet Office and the Electoral Commission. They are planning to review the canvass over the next few years.

There is a legal requirement to conduct an electoral canvass each year in order to publish the electoral register on the 1<sup>st</sup> December.

The legislation states that every property must be sent a paper form which is prescribed. Electors can respond to the form by text, automated telephone or online to save money on postage for returns. We have seen an increase in the number of automated responses in the last few years and aim for this trend to continue.

The legislation also states that the Electoral Registration Officer cannot include other, non-electoral documents in the envelope, as they are being sent to the elector's name and address using information from the Register which is to be used only for specified (electoral) purposes. On that basis it would be wrong to send them out with the Tandridge magazinef or instance.

The cost of the annual canvass last year was £27690.48. We anticipate that the costs to be similar this year."

So again, a simple message from this - if we all sent the form back first time we would reduce the amount of money spent on this exercise.

I thought it would be interesting for you all to know this.

#### Oxted gasholder demolition starts January 2019

Work to demolish the gasholder in Oxted will begin in January 2019. This follows the decision of the High Court to refuse a judicial review claim from a resident, in relation to the Council's decision to grant permission for new housing to be built on the land at the gasholder and Johnsdale car park site.

St William Homes LLP has set a new start date and demolition will start in the New Year. Work to prepare the site including site surveys, ground investigations and hoarding installation began in November. In June 2018 the Council granted the developer permission for a planning scheme comprising 111 one, two and three-bedroom apartments, with landscaping and car parking. St William Homes LLP is committed to the purchase of Johnsdale car park from the Council and is expected to complete this in the next few weeks. St William Homes LLP will cover the costs of the remediation of the car park site, which forms part of the gasworks.

The demolition of the gasholder and its replacement with a high-quality housing scheme will enhance Oxted town centre and forms part of the Council's regeneration plans for the area. The Council will be working with key stakeholders to minimise disruption to the town centre, especially as the Ellice Road car park redevelopment will be taking place at the same time.

The Council will support the "Love Oxted Business Improvement District" by publicising a "*We're open for business*" initiative to encourage local people to continue to support the shops and businesses in Oxted while the building work takes place.

Councillor Martin Fisher, Leader of the Council, said: "The demolition of the gasholder has been a long-held ambition of the Council and we are pleased the project is back on track. It forms a key part of our RegenOxted programme which will help Oxted remain a vibrant and economically prosperous town for years to come."

#### POPPY APPEAL 2018 IN TATSFIELD



In his first year as Poppy Appeal organiser for Tatsfield, David Vale reports that the grand sum of £1658.85 has been collected in the village. This came from collection boxes which had been placed in Tatsfield School, the Bakery, Ye Old Ship, Park Wood Golf Club, the Grasshopper Inn, Aileen McHugo Building, St Mary's Church, the Village Club and the Village Hall. The sum includes the collection David made at the Remembrance service in the village centre on 10 November and the proceeds of the Buffet Meal at St Mary's Church on Remembrance Sunday (when £509.85 was raised). The funds raised are used by the Royal British Legion to support the welfare of the Armed Forces.

David is grateful to all the organisations where funds were raised and the village in turn thanks David for taking on this job.

#### MESSAGE FROM SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL

On Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> October the county council launched a series of resident consultations designed to help shape the future of a number of our services across Surrey. Our objective is to transform the support provided to residents and communities so that no one is left behind, in line with the shared community vision for 2030 that we spent the summer developing. To get there we'll need to take some very difficult decisions and transform the way we work with you and our other partners to put our services onto a sustainable footing. We are all very familiar with the challenges facing councils, especially the growing number of people who need support at a time of reducing funding for public services. In this series of consultations, we want to hear residents' views on changes to five areas:

- Children's Centres
- Concessionary fares on Surrey buses
- Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)
- Libraries
- Community Recycling Centres

With children's centres, the focus is on moving to a network of hubs and satellites, which will involve some closures, but with strengthened outreach and partnership work to support the most vulnerable families.

On concessionary bus fares, the proposal is for Surrey to align with the national scheme operated by most other areas.

With more people using our online services and fewer visiting libraries in person, we want to hear people's views on how to reshape library services – such as whether libraries could bring together a range of local services under one roof.

The SEND consultation is around shifting investment to strengthen early identification of needs and support closer to home for children and families, as well as plans to provide hundreds of more specialist school places next year.

The scale of the county council's financial challenge means we also have to re-visit proposals to close some of our less used recycling centres that process far less waste than other sites.

These proposals will provoke debate, but the county council as an organisation has to change the way we do things. I know, like me, you have your residents' best interests at heart, and I would like to thank you for your interest and support for the county council's transformation agenda.

Regarding pavement parking on Westmore Road, and previous mentions of it by myself and others in the magazine, I would say it has been quite a while since finding any vehicle offended by completely blocking, so the message I hope is 'getting through'. As long as larger vehicles like an ambulance and fire engine, as well as pedestrians, can all 'get through', we will all be quite happy. This will continue to be closely monitored, so please be sensible and considerate when parking there. Many thanks.

Lastly, a suspicious white Transit van has been seen snooping around the village, with males looking for scrap items to steal. If this vehicle, registration starting HG04 (or any vehicle) is seen acting suspiciously in the village, please call 999 immediately. Cheers!!

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE TANDRIDGE SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAM

Christmas is now only a few weeks away and each year finds a definite increase in opportunistic burglaries during this period. Here are just a few reminders from your Tandridge safer Neighbourhood team.

- Lock your doors and windows every time you leave the house, even when you
  are briefly outdoors, remembering to double-lock UPVC doors (lift handle and
  turn the key).
- Hide all keys, including car keys, out of sight and away from the letterbox (remember a device could be used to hook keys through the letterbox).
- Install a visual burglar alarm and good outside lighting.
- Ask a trusted neighbour to keep an eye on your property.
- Leave radios or lights in your house on a timer to make the property appear occupied.
- Make sure the fences around your land are in good condition.
- Secure bikes and smaller farm equipment, by locking them to an immoveable object inside a locked shed, barn or garage.
- Keep ladders and tools stored away; don't leave them where they could be used to break into your home.
- Ensure side gates are locked to prevent access to the rear of the property and rear fencing is in good repair.
- Improve natural surveillance at the front of your property i.e. trim high hedges
- Mark your property with postcode and house number and register your property for <u>Immobilise</u>.
- Consider\_joining or setting up a <u>Country Watch scheme</u>.
- Remove valuables from view of ground floor windows.

## NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA



On 10<sup>th</sup> November, we were delighted to welcome a capacity audience of more than 120 people, who came out on a horrible evening with torrential rain – there were no more seats available! To start the evening, which included a commemoration of the WW1 Armistice, they were treated to a most delicately played rendition of Vaughan Williams 'The Lark Ascending' by the astonishingly talented guest violinist Haru Ushigusa. Every note was played with exquisite sensitivity, and even the heathens among us (of which I am certainly one) were transported high into a beautiful blue summer sky. Those who truly love the work were not disappointed either and could only marvel at Haru's rendition of an all-time favourite. This followed on from

the ever-popular Vaughan Williams 'English Folk Song Suite', which includes 'Seventeen Come Sunday' and 'Folk Songs from Somerset'. The early Holst work 'Suite de Ballet'

completed the first half. Even though this is rarely played, it contains music that seems very familiar and received unanimous positive comment from the audience, who all agreed that it deserved much wider recognition.

The second half began with George Butterworth's 'A Shropshire Lad'. Although this was written before the first World War, with its atmosphere of desolation it foreshadows the conflict to come. The orchestra



accurately and sensitively described the themes of life, death and suicide in war depicted in AE Housman's Poems that included 'A Shropshire Lad', with some beautiful climaxes before the sombre ending. Butterworth himself was killed at the battle of the Somme, and a minute's silence was observed at the end of the piece to conclude the Armistice commemorations.

The mood was lifted by Coates 'Everyday London Suite', with well-known movements such as 'Covent Garden' and 'Knightsbridge' received with much head bobbing and toe tapping from the audience.

And how could you have a concert of English works without one by Elgar? The concert finished with his 'Pomp and Circumstance March No. 4', which was encored, to round off a thoroughly enjoyable evening.



An enthusiastic conductor and orchestra, a capacity audience, a varied programme of beautiful music – what's not to like? It was unfortunate that we could not find an independent reviewer for this concert. ## WORLD POLIO DAY

Oxted School Students on behalf of the Rotary Club of Oxted held a 'purple mufti day' for World Polio Day on 15<sup>th</sup> October. The colour purple was chosen because when children are immunized one of their fingers is marked with a purple dye.



A record sum of £1523.53 was raised, to which the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will add £3047.06, bringing the total they raised £4570.59.

The students dressed in purple, but the six-form students chose to wear their old school uniform. Since Rotary and its partners launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative thirty years ago, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases a year to just 22 cases in 2017. To sustain this progress, and protect all children from polio, Rotary has committed to raising US\$50 million per year in support of global polio eradication efforts. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will match Rotary's commitment 2:1. Without full funding and political commitment, this paralyzing disease could return to previously polio-free countries, putting children everywhere at risk.

## TATSFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



The Society's AGM on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm, was our final event of the year, with over seventy people attending. Thank you to everyone for coming, and especially to those of you who have attended at least one of our events during the year.

We have had another successful year and I ran through a calendar of events which will be printed in the 2019 Year Book.

The Treasurers report was read out by Martin Allen. The Society has donated £500 to S & SE in

Bloom again this year, £250 to the composting group for timber to build new bins, and a £25 donation to the Parish Magazine. Much of the Society's income comes from sales of the Year Book, donations from retired Members, and from Advertising carried in the Year Book. Not only do you receive a colourful Year Book, but you receive 10% off anything horticultural from Knights Garden Centres at Woldingham and Warlingham, plus an amazing 50% off Suttons Seeds and a further 15% off all other items in their catalogues. So, the £5.00 Membership fee would therefore be quickly recovered. We have the code for next year, and if you contact Christine she will pass on the code if you are already a Member. Our Accounts have been agreed and audited by Teresa Watts. A small presentation was made to Teresa with our thanks.

I then had the pleasure of nominating Angela Sawyers as a new Vice President. Angela has served on the committee since 2002 and became Show Secretary in 2009. Angela has worked tirelessly throughout and has been a committee committee member and officer. Her Show organisation skills work like clockwork and her lemon drizzle cakes legendary. We presented Angela with a special painting of a "Bowl of Cyclamen" by Carol and some garden vouchers.

Following on from the meeting the members were encouraged to top up their glasses and enjoy some picnic nibbles supplied by the committee.

Then it was time for our 'Big Talk' and we were in for a treat!

I welcomed Dr Simon Charlesworth from Downderry Lavender Nursery, near Hadlow. Simon began growing lavender in 1991 and this enterprise took over both his front and rear garden. He then moved to Downderry Nursery and has been instrumental in turning around the old-fashioned perceptions of growing lavender and now holds the National Collection. His slide presentation was one of the best we have ever had. He was very amusing, demonstrating at the beginning wearing different hats, to explain how lavender grows. He spoke about all the various plants in detail and where they originate from, going on to care and the most important tip was pruning back in August for some varieties and September for others. Never leave it later than the end of September, otherwise the ends don't seal and the cold wet water penetrate the plants during the winter and then they die. Simon has also grown and taken his plants to the Chelsea Flower Show on quite a few occasions and been awarded Gold medals. Simon and his wife Dawn had Lavender plants for sale along with bath foam, hand wash, hand cream, Lavender oils, soaps, and bunches of dried lavender. It was a superb talk and a very interesting and informative night.



This was my last evening as your Chairman. I am continuing on the committee as your Vice Chairman and our horticultural expert Jon Allbutt has kindly now taken over as your Chairman.

## THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN DECEMBER

At last the long period of dry weather has broken but as I write I can confirm that the soil in my garden is dry as a bone just 6" deep! October rainfall was only 49mm (average is 98mm); so far in November we have had 88mm (average is 89mm); on 10<sup>th</sup> November we had 20mm in just 24 hours! In 'old money' an inch of rain is approximately equal to 25mm. We had more ground frosts in October but only one air frost (when the temperature reaches zero). November so far is mild, but we are expecting drier conditions and colder weather in the second half of the month. As for December, forecasters are, as usual very cautious, but we can surely expect some cold spells, especially if the high pressure remains to the north and east of us.

What do you buy that person who is a keen gardener who has a shed full of tools and gadgets, and boasts a good knowledge of plants? A great idea would be to buy them membership of the Royal Horticultural Society (<u>www.rhs.org.uk</u>) a monthly magazine full of information, access to the RHS advisory services, early notice and special members deals on shows all over the country, free entry to gardens on members days – great value!

It is hard to resist those pots of lovely fresh herbs on offer in garden centres and the shops; nothing like fresh parsley, coriander, chives, sage, mint, thyme, basil and many others for real flavour but how do we keep them from going yellow and drooping over the edge of the pot? In nature they want to be cool with good light, so why not keep them outdoors in mild weather and bring them in when needed – even a day outside will make all the difference - great idea as a present for the keen cook.

Planting violas and pansies for winter and spring colour is a great idea especially if they are in a fairly sheltered sunny spot and free of a risk of waterlogging. They will try to make a lot of seed pods that will drain energy from the plant and that in turn will reduce the amount of flower; have a look at them each week and nip off all old flowers and remember to avoid any feeding until late March to give them that early boost to make a big spring show.

It has been a superb autumn, our local hedgerows and garden plants have provided an abundance of berries for our birds, but have you noticed that many of them are moving into our gardens now that they have eaten their fill? Please do not forget them over the next three months or so especially if the weather is cold. Why not buy a new bird table and feeders as a present; children love to watch the birds busy on window feeders or squabbling over peanuts and fat balls.



## THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – DECEMBER 2018

Of the bright evening planets that have been on view recently, only Mars remains though thanks to its increasing distance from us both its apparent size and brightness are diminishing. In the morning sky Venus now dazzles before dawn. At the start of the month it rises almost four hours before the Sun and by 7am it is over 20° in altitude in the south east. Jupiter has also recently passed the Sun and is now visible before dawn although it will be lower in the sky than Venus and less bright. It will become better placed by the end of December and into the New Year.

Whilst thinking of the New Year, what does it hold for us astronomically speaking? There is a total eclipse of the Moon on January 21<sup>st</sup> although unfortunately it occurs in the early hours of the morning. There is another chance to see a lunar eclipse on July 16<sup>th</sup>, and though this is a partial one it occurs in the evening starting at just after 9pm. Then there is a transit of Mercury on November 11<sup>th</sup> which begins soon after midday and continues until after the Sun has set as seen from the UK. Because Mercury is so small this is an event that needs a telescope to observe but requires extreme care if eyesight damage is to be prevented. We will discuss this more nearer the time.



Of course, 2019 brings the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the manned landing on the Moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts, Armstrong and Aldrin, when their capsule "Eagle" landed in the Sea of Tranquillity. It's hard to believe that it is now 46 years since man last walked on the surface of our satellite.

However, back to this year and the brilliant winter constellations are becoming more prominent in the east. By 9pm at the beginning of December Orion (the hunter) and a

number of his retinue, though not all, have risen. You can see from the map that once Orion has been found a number of other bright stars and hence constellations can easily be located. The only member of Orion's entourage that is still below the horizon is Sirius in Canis Major, but as the month wears on this bright group of constellations rises higher and higher until by 11pm on the last day of the year Orion lies due south on the meridian. By then Sirius, the brightest star in the night sky, is 20° high and can be found by extending a line through the stars in the hunter's belt and continuing it down towards the horizon. The line will pass close to Sirius.

The year's most active meteor shower, the Geminids, reaches its maximum on the morning of 14<sup>th</sup> December so it would be wise to watch on the nights of the 13<sup>th</sup>/14<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>/15<sup>th</sup>. Gemini is shown on the map, although it isn't necessary to look towards that area of sky to see any meteors as they travel over a wide area.

## **NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES**

#### Correspondence:

When writing with passion it is easy to make errors. Christine (Wareham), who wrote about the plight of Pheasants last month, has asked me to correct a couple of mistakes that appeared in her letter and may have made her whole message appear factually incorrect: Following the word 'Magpies' should be the words, **'deemed to be a threat to the Pheasants'**, and the number of birds of prey that are poisoned and trapped should read, **'hundreds'**, not 'thousands'. Thank you for these revisions, Christine.

Having experienced a dearth of news during the summer months I've suddenly received several outstanding emails and letters. The first of these arrived from Martin (Allen) and Julie (Jewell) in Paynesfield Road (15.10.18). It seems I wasn't the only person who noticed that our regular garden visitors had disappeared:

'Over the last few months we have not even seen our regular **Blackbirds** in the garden and the currants that we bought for them remained unopened. The sparrows that nested in our hedge and the eaves of the roof seem to have all disappeared at the same time. Our Nijer feeder and our sunflower seed holder, all which used to empty in a week, were never refilled in the last couple of months. The peanuts continued to disappear though because a **Wood Pidgeon** had found a way of standing on a branch and getting his head inside the outer bars. We did see **Magpies** regularly, other than that a real bird drought. However, I am now pleased to report that things are improving, even if in only a small way. A **Blackbird** and a **Robin** have returned, along with the **Sparrows**, although in smaller numbers. We have just recorded a **Nuthatch**, last seen in January, a couple of **Goldcrests** not seen since March, from our lounge window a **Red Kite** flying over the Westmore Road area, and a **Grey Heron** sitting atop the house across the road.

On Saturday at the Compost Site, those there at the time were lucky enough to see a low flying Red Kite, really majestic. I was told at the 'Garden Club' by Robert Kilby that they have recorded sightings of 13 of these beautiful birds around Cheverells Farm, along Limpsfield Road. One time we all used to marvel at the single sighting. The compost site has also seen some wildlife in and around the compost bins, including **shrews** and **frogs**. Let us hope this is a good sign for the sightings around the village and the reports start rolling back in. I will certainly let you know if/when we see the Redpoll and Siskins that were sighted last January and hope to see more Fieldfare in March.'

I've beaten you to the **Fieldfare** sighting, Martin! Two flew over this morning (11.11.18). There was no mistaking their characteristic call. Thanks for the update.

And now for some eagerly anticipated notes from Ruth (Yeeles) (07.11.18):

'For those of you that don't know, Hill Park is a designated local nature reserve, to the south of Chestnut Avenue, that is owned by Surrey County Council and managed on their behalf by Surrey Wildlife Trust (SWT). Jim and I do various practical conservation tasks

there and have recently been made Voluntary Wardens! We thought readers may appreciate an update of what's been happening there this year.

**Butterflies:** It's been a strange butterfly year. Plenty of hot weather. Numbers were up but we only saw 25 species. Worryingly, no **Grizzled Skipper** for the second year running and very few **Small Tortoiseshells**. The **Common Blue** had a fantastic year, though, so it's not all doom and gloom! We're ever hopeful that the **Brown Hairstreak** will turn up on the reserve soon. It's been spreading eastwards across Surrey for some years now. Eggs have been found near Biggin Hill and we have abundant **Blackthorn** locally. While we're talking Hairstreaks, here's a plea to your readers: Does anyone know of any remnants of **Elm** hanging on in the Parish? Unlikely, but if there is then we might be able to add White-letter Hairstreak to Tatsfield's list of butterflies.

**Reptiles and amphibians:** We didn't do as much monitoring of reptiles as last year due to the invasive scrub, but did record good numbers of **Slow Worms** and **Grass Snakes**. We were also pleased to find a few common **Toads**.

**Grazing:** Unfortunately, there hasn't been enough grazing pressure this year to hold back the scrub growth but, thankfully, the Trust's tractor paid a visit in October and two fields and the glade were cut. However, they didn't manage to remove any of the cuttings, so Jim has spent some time raking. (If it's not removed it puts nutrients back into the soil which isn't good for the chalk grassland.) The sheep will be back on the reserve soon.

**Wildlife:** We regularly see **Roe Deer** on the reserve and **Fallow Deer** are starting to become more common, usually in larger groups. We recently had a stand-off with a trio of Roe Deer that were on the main ride and had plenty of time to get a long-distance

photo. **Buzzards, Red Kites** and **Kestrels** continue to be almost daily visitors.

**The future:** The Trust is currently putting together a plan for long-term management of the grassland areas to combat the scrub levels. In the meantime, we will be spending the winter months maintaining the glade edges and woodland rides. Sadly, there are increasing signs of **Ash** die-back (Chalara) on the reserve and there is no doubt that our landscape is going to change. As our generation lost most of its Elm trees we can only hope that future generations will still be able to walk beneath healthy Ash trees.'



Many thanks, Ruth. And, of course, there's more news from you next month. Exciting news! But we won't tell our readers what it is; it would spoil the surprise!

It seems just a short while ago I was wishing you all a Very Merry Christmas and a Joyful New Year, and here we go again! <u>Have fun, play nicely, plan wisely.</u>

## FIVE MINUTES WITH.... THE CHARTWELL CANCER TRUST

Welcome to our article featuring a story of local interest. This month we spoke to Michael Douglas who has lived in Tatsfield for 25 years. Michael loves living in Tatsfield and agreed to talk about the charity he runs from the parish offices in Tatsfield, The Chartwell Cancer Trust.

I was first diagnosed with Leukaemia in 2003. I was treated In the Chartwell Unit in the Princess Royal Hospital in Farnborough, Kent. My treatment started with six sessions of chemotherapy; but when I presented for my second session, I had to wait for two hours to be set up. The nurse explained that she needed a Health Care Assistant to help with the set up and had been trying to find one for over two hours. I decided to use the experience I had gained from many years of serving on the committees of various charities, including The Teenage Cancer Trust and Young Epilepsy, to create a charity to provide financial support for the Unit.

The charity started in earnest in 2005. The first target was to fund a Health Care Assistant. We managed to do this fairly quickly and we have been supporting this post in the form of two job share Health Care Assistants since 2005.

#### How has the charity grown?

After funding the Health Care Assistant posts we were asked to help out with other staffing shortages and equipment which our cash strapped NHS simply doesn't have the funds to cover. We funded a Junior

Doctor (now a consultant) for two years and a senior haematologist for four clinics a week for three years. We also funded a raft of small requests like computers, wheel chairs and sometimes transport for patients who were often just too unwell to drive or use public transport.

We then agreed to fund the complete refurbishment of the Treatment Suite. This involved remodelling and the introduction of proper vanity screening and air conditioning and a "proper" coffee machine for patients and staff.

When Kings College announced the proposal to close the In Patients Ward in the Chartwell Unit, we mounted a successful campaign to get the decision reversed. We are now recognised by Kings College as Key Partners.

About three years ago we were approached by a group of parents who had young children undergoing treatment for cancer or leukaemia. They explained that after the



children's primary treatment, usually in Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital or the Royal Marsden they were transferred to a local hospital that had a Paediatric Oncology Shared Care Unit. Children in our area were mainly treated in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Woolwich. They explained that the facilities in Woolwich were shocking compared to the hospitals that their children had started their treatment in. Their main concern was that the Unit, known as the Tiger Ward, had no kitchen facility. This meant that when children had to be "blue lighted" in, and usually kept in overnight, they had nowhere to wash the children's clothes if they had had an accident, and nowhere to make a hot drink without leaving the child to go to a machine in the reception area, some 10 minutes away. They also told us that none of the televisions were working, there were very few toys and most of the beds were broken.

After visiting the hospital, we decided that we had to do something to help. We put a kitchen in immediately and agreed to fund a Health Care Assistant; we have fixed the beds and the televisions. We have funded everything on the staff's wish list: a Magic Floor; training courses for nurses; and all sorts of specialist equipment and toys, not just at Christmas and Easter, but on every appointment. The result - they now prefer the Tiger Ward to Great Ormond Street and the Royal Marsden.

Of course, cancer is brutal, and seems even more brutal for children. Our support is multifaceted, and we support families through our Oncology Groups. We now run and fund four groups who meet up each month to spend some normal time together. The group meetings are held in places suitable for immunocompromised children - children who are vulnerable to coughs and colds. We have over 100 families across the groups who meet in Bromley, Woolwich, Croydon and Brixton and they love every moment of the meetings.

Sadly, not all of the children recover. We lost fifteen from our area last year and this year is not looking much better either. We help out when families find themselves in dire financial circumstances, usually mortgage or rent and utility payments, last week a funeral.

We recently acquired a holiday home on the Isle of Wight. Initial funding was supplied by the Powell Family in memory of their daughter Sophie. The holiday home is a three bedroomed lodge on a beautiful site close to a sandy beach with every facility imaginable. The site is close to a hospital with a Paediatric Oncology Unit. This means that children, even terminal children, can holiday in conditions that are as safe as possible.

## Living with cancer

Children living with cancer are often in hospital or in isolation for much of their treatment. This has a dramatic effect on their education and ability to socialise at a critical time in their lives. We were recently introduced to a robot that can mitigate these problems. The robot sits on the absent child's desk and takes the place of the child in the classroom. The child accesses the robot with a tablet or mobile phone and controls the

robot remotely. The child can speak and listen through the robot, turn around and communicate with classmates and even go on trips!

Teacher Claire Smith reported back to us after seeing the robot in action, "it was a very special day yesterday, it was wonderful to see how excited the school staff were to see the robot working and the dawning of the possibilities. She can she speak to us? Wow, this is so cool! Not every day do



you get to see how you can change lives at a stroke. It's not only life changing for the patient; it was clear to me in such a vivid way that enabling her teacher, friends and classmates to interact with her has a huge and positive impact. It was very moving, I felt quite overwhelmed to be honest".

We have purchased twelve robots and intend to provide as many as we can in the months ahead.

#### Tell us about your current and future projects

We continue with all of the current projects for our patients and staff in the Chartwell Unit and our children in the Tiger Ward. We are growing quickly and now support other local hospitals. We have recently funded a Virtual Conferencing System that allows our consultants from Kings College, Guy's Hospital and St Thomas's Hospital to link with The Chartwell Unit without leaving their desks. We are also funding Dr Shireen Kassam's Brain Cancer Research Project in Kings College.

Going forward we have agreed to raise £350,000. towards the refurbishment and upgrading of the Endoscopy Unit in The PRU. We have made a good start to the New Integrated Paediatric Unit Campaign in Croydon University Hospital. We have agreed to contribute £750,000 to this project. Both campaigns are underway and the fundraising is going well.

#### How do you fundraise?

We have six staff in our Tatsfield Office and one volunteer helping to coordinate the vast range of events and activities that produce our funds. Our team, led by Trustee Natalie Reilly, organise a range of events that include Walks, Runs, Sky Dives, House of Commons Dinners, Dances,



Dragon Boat Races, Prosecco Parties, Coffee Mornings and much, much more!

We now have Charity Shops in Croydon and Brixton, a Coffee Bar, a Yoga Studio and much more planned! Please do look at our website for updates.

We are a Charity that you can reach out and touch, everything we do is for our local community and everything we do can be seen. Our fundraising target this year is £750,000 and we're well on our way. Our Trustees are all honorary.

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
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
