



EDITORIAL

Earlier this summer, I enjoyed watching a little of the FIFA Women's World Cup France 2019 and I was pleased that it played a part in raising the profile of women's football.

In the latter stages I was struck by the joyful exuberance of the eventual winners and the contrasting emotional distress of the losing finalists and semi-finalists. This, together with some more recent events has caused me to reflect a little upon the subject of competition which, like the proverbial curate's egg, could be seen as partly good and partly bad.

Competition is not restricted to sport alone. It seems to be all around us. For example, competition for scarce resources, whether it be school places, medical services or the purchase of a rare painting at auction. Equally, there is competition for the sales of goods and services in the business world, where success is a key contributor to profitability and failure is a source of vulnerability. Without making further comment, it also appears very evident in politics.

These and other areas all touch our lives to varying degrees but there is a personal level where we are all involved. That is the "competition" for the use of our time. Some of us feel this keenly with the external expectations that we experience but even if we had an empty diary, we might still need to weigh up the different choices before us as we live day to day and as we plan ahead, should we choose to do so.

With my forthcoming sabbatical, I've been very conscious of such processes – both in trying to put things in place for my absence from parish duties and in using the gift of three months out of the office (September–November) wisely. I look forward to sharing how it all went. During this period the life of St Mary's continues, with thanks to our volunteers and a variety of visiting leaders and speakers. All are welcome to our services and events, as usual. For any additional church matters that cannot wait until I return to work in December, the first contact will be our churchwardens, Chris and Marjory (details in St Mary's News pages). They in turn can arrange for the services of a minister from within our Limpsfield and Tatsfield Team of churches or beyond, if needed.

LETTERS

Dear Editors,

Like many Tatsfield & Titsey residents, it is a huge relief to hear that as of 25th July 2019, DPD has withdrawn its application to build a super depot at the Moorhouse site on the Westerham Road.

After four years of living with this threat, I am now drawn to wonder what might become of this site and what lessons can be learnt from the dedication of our community to oppose the proposed development and the active desire to protect our environment - and to ensure those in seats of power and influence can act responsibly for the future benefits for all.

At this juncture, I have asked myself what have I personally taken away from this experience. My biggest takeaway is the need to speak truth to power and to ensure that those in seats of influence make an in-depth and diligent assessment of any future plans. Whether it is our elected councillor, constituency MP, Council Planning Officer or local land owner – we all have voices and first-hand insights about what makes our environment, our community and the place we chose to live, special to us.

Whilst the May issue of this magazine clarified many of the inaccuracies in Cllr Allen's article from the April issue, the fact remains that our elected councillor chose to ignore numerous direct pleas from residents and voted in favour of the DPD proposal. Despite several gaps and incongruencies within the proposal, e.g. the supposed employment figures that the site would generate, and the simplistic traffic projections which allowed no provision for seasonal peaks – all were accepted at face-value.

Moreover, when I attended the TDC's Planning Review meeting on 7th March this year (which was one of TDC's largest publicly attended meetings), we heard emphasis being put on the visual scale of the development and the traffic assessment. The Planning Officer and Committee failed to show evidence of thorough consideration for the inevitable air, noise and light pollution - as well as the road safety risks associated with the site. I was reminded of the famous film quote: *"in space, no one can hear you scream"*. Simply because residents high-up on the ridge within Tatsfield village might not have had to bear the glaring view of the development, it doesn't mean that its negative effects would not be felt by many across the parish boundaries and beyond.

So what is next? Many local campaign groups have appealed directly to the land owner: Guy Innes of the Titsey Estate, its trustees, and agents at Strutt & Parker to build bridges with the local community and consider sustainable and responsible alternatives for this site. Indeed our MP, Sam Gymiah has indicated some positive engagement with the Titsey Estate. Furthermore, we all await the assessment of Oxted's Local Plan from the government Planning Inspector, Mr Philip Lewis on whether the site's status as Green Belt is changed – which now hangs in the balance. Whatever becomes of this site – I have learned that we have a community which cares deeply about this very special area, and I hope that it welcomes a development which will complement the values and ethos of its residents and neighbours.

The merged Built and Natural Environment topic groups have had two very productive meetings and are moving towards the final stages of their combined topic paper. The group would like to hear from you if

The recent Call for Sites invited local landowners to submit details of their sites that might be included within the Neighbourhood Plan as having potential for development in the future. In all some seventeen sites were offered and details of these are now being independently assessed. It is expected that a draft of the assessment report will be with the Steering Group in time for their meeting on 18th September and the final report is expected in October.

Well it will be early September by the time you read this, and the summer and holidays will start to become distant



memories, but I hope they were happy ones. Since the last time I wrote for the July/August edition. I wish I could say it has been busy interesting and rewarding but alas mostly just procedural matters being resolved as local government tends to go on holiday during August.

As part of the consequences of the different make-up of the Council I have attended my first Overview and Scrutiny meeting as Vice Chairman and believe from the mood of that meeting that at least this committee will have some good cross-party cooperation. As part of the year's programme we will have the following bought to this meeting so that all councillors can be briefed and updated on the following:

- Update on Customer First including a staff presentation.
- Review of Member/Officer protocol (how we work together).
- Quarter one delivery plan.
- Review of external audit process for 2018/19 accounts and assurance that 2019/20 programme is adequately planned.
- Annual Crime Summit (Police and Crime Commissioner).
- Strategic partnership working including with health partners.
- Quarter two delivery plan.
- Half year internal audit report.
- Quarter three Delivery Plan.
- Staff performance sickness review.
- Biggin Hill / Gatwick / Heathrow plans.
- End of year performance.
- Updating and reviewing whistle blowing policy.
- And a selection from: East Surrey rural transport; ESDAS (domestic abuse); East Surrey Clinical Commissioning Group; Closer working with Surrey; homelessness in the North of the district, East Surrey Outreach Services; Tourism; National Education Union for the South East Region; Surrey Wildlife; The Trussell Trust (Food Banks) - to name but a few...

The Council meeting of 18th July saw the clarification of the title of the OLRG and Independents Alliance as the Independent members believed they were able to be called Independent whilst being aligned to the OLRG; but a judicial review outlined the reasons why this could not happen and so the opposition within TDC are now known as Independents & OLRG Alliance. I have attended a Constitution meeting; done Speedwatch training; met with our neighbouring London Borough of Bromley councillors; met with the CEO over some outstanding Tatsfield matters; visited TDC with Parish Councillor Jason Syrett to review the Open Spaces policy; and David Pinchin and I had a meeting with the CEO of Biggin Hill Airport over the "overfly issue". In September Kim Jennings and I will meet with Dan Gutierrez and the Police and Crime Commissioner, so if you have any issues to raise then please let one of us know.

Trees in the Village and TPO

Having stressed to TDC our belief that we are losing trees in the village unnecessarily I have received the following in response. "I completely take your point regarding overall loss of trees, and I would very much like to see the Council set an agenda for the future which puts an emphasis on the environment, biodiversity and climate change, as well as much needed housing." Indeed, I see that SCC have recently declared a 'climate change emergency'. We are not quite there yet, but I would of course be extremely supportive of any initiative in that regard. So, this is something I will take up with the relevant director to make sure we get this moving quickly.

Vehicle Crime Warning

We have seen a sudden rise in theft of catalytic converters across Tandridge. Targeting a variety of vehicles, thieves are cutting off the catalytic converter from the exhaust pipe. Containing very small quantities of precious metals to help break down the pollutants they are attractive to thieves. Primarily larger vans and vehicles are at greater risk due to the increased ground height which may offer access. Any vehicle with a catalytic converter should consider the following crime prevention advice to reduce the risk of being targeted.

- Store your vehicle in a garage overnight
- If you do not have a garage park your vehicle in a well-lit area
- Park close to buildings
- Consider using CCTV or intruder notification CCTV covering your vehicle on the drive
- Use a Thatcham approved movement detector vehicle alarm
- Fit a security cage around the catalytic converter or permanent mark it using a stencil

Should you see any suspicious behaviour around your vehicle at any time please call Surrey Police.

Got grand designs? Do your duty and avoid a fine

Have you got grand designs this summer? Whether you're doing up your house, getting your dream kitchen or building an extension it pays to know the rules when it comes to your waste. Or you could risk a hefty fine. *If your*



builder takes the waste away and doesn't dispose of it properly, it's you who can be fined up to £400. To avoid being hit in the wallet, you need to do two things:

- Check your builder is a registered waste carrier.
- Obtain a receipt for the disposal of your waste.

If a builder doesn't dispose of your waste properly, it is flytipping. In Surrey there are serious consequences for flytippers, including fines of up to £50,000 or imprisonment for 12 months and with every flytipping court case in Surrey resulting in a guilty verdict, it's a risk not worth taking.

Don't lose your voice – make sure you're registered to vote

Residents should ensure they are registered to vote by completing and returning their Household Enquiry Form (HEF) as soon as possible.

Completing this form is essential as it helps us to ensure residents are able to vote in future elections. Each household should have received the form by e-mail or post, and it is important they are checked, completed and returned.

If residents' names are missing or if any other details need to be added or changed, they can be updated online or by amending the printed version and returning it in the post. Residents' e-mail addresses can be added which means they will receive future correspondence by e-mail, making the process more efficient. If someone new is added to the form, they must also complete an application to register to vote. The application can be completed online at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>.

Louise Round, Chief Executive at Tandridge District Council said: "Don't let something as simple as not being on the register stop you from having a vote and a voice. It's really important that everyone who is entitled to vote is able to. Once you've checked the form it's easy to go online and make amendments or confirm everything is correct. You can also respond by text, telephone or by returning the form in the post." Two hours free parking started at Ellice Road on 22 July

Since Monday 22 July, visitors to Oxted have been able to enjoy two hours of free parking in Ellice Road car park between 8am and 5pm on weekdays. Parking is free outside those hours and all day at the weekend and on bank holidays. In addition, free parking is available at the Council Offices, Oxted, after 6pm on weekdays and all day at weekends.

This is part of a drive to make visiting Oxted easier for shoppers, so they can take advantage of all the great things the town has to offer. It will also support local businesses during the construction of the apartments at the former gasholder site.

To take the pressure off Ellice Road, while the gasholder site is being redeveloped, the Council is looking at other options to provide more parking across the town, as there will be a high number of construction workers as work progresses.

Some business permit holders have already relocated to the Council Offices car park to free up spaces at Ellice Road.

The Council is working with the Love Oxted Business Improvement District (BID) to encourage residents to support local shops. The Oxted Open for Business campaign promotes what the town has to offer shoppers, visitors and other businesses.

The two hours will be in place until summer 2021, when the development is due to be finished.

SURREY COUNTY COUNCIL

I hope you have all had a very happy and relaxing summer. Now September is upon us I wanted to give you an update on my key actions, issues and progress at Surrey County Council with respect to Tatsfield and the things that affect you.

Highways

Repairs and surface works – Recently I drove round Tatsfield with the highways officers looking at road surfaces and considering road issues which were raised with me via the Parish Council, Martin Allen and residents. All pot holes identified have been repaired. There are a large number in Church Hill – I agree this road is in a bad state of repair – it is on the winter road programme to be reassessed later this year and I shall be pushing very hard for the officer team to undertake major works on it.

Highways fund - This year County Councillors have received a pot of money to spend locally on highways matters in their own division. Through consultation with your Parish Council I have prioritised the spend for Tatsfield as follows:

- Large "junction ahead" signs to be installed on Clarks Lane in both directions to indicate the turning to Approach Road. Many residents have commented on how hard it is to identify the turning, especially in the dark and fog, and also at the speed other drivers travel along Clarks Lane, and these signs will be a good safety addition.
- I would like to jointly fund pavement improvement works on the corner of Westmore and Crossways where the pavement is uneven and falling away.
- I have contributed funding, along with fellow County Councillors, to fund a highway maintenance gang (cutting back foliage at junctions, fixing signs etc). If you identify anything of this nature then please self-report it on the Surrey County Council website under "Report IT" and you will receive notification of when it is completed

Community Fund

I also have a community fund to spend in the division and I am very happy to be able to continue to support your Tatsfield Composting Centre with this money.

Additionally, I would like to invest some of the fund across the division in improving the rubbish bins in our local parks, areas of outstanding natural beauty etc, potentially supported by a poster campaign. Litter drifting around in our hedgerows and verges is an increasing problem and eyesore, and a timely and costly thing to clear up; either by fabulous groups such as the Tatsfield Litter Angels, or by the Street cleaning team at Tandridge Council. Increasing bin capacity and using bins with lids on will mean more litter in the bin rather than flowing over the top and being carried off in the wind. I will be working closely with your Parish Council and the Tatsfield Litter Angels to identify appropriate sites for improvement over the coming months.

Finally, I am supporting the looked after children in this area by contributing to a fund that will be used to provide them with opportunities to pursue hobbies and interests.

If you have any further ideas of how the fund could be spent, do please contact me.

Warlingham CRC

I wanted to give you a short update on the Warlingham CRC situation. I am on the Surrey Waste and Recycling Task Force with a remit to look at the CRCs and recycling in Surrey overall. We are part way through our investigations which will be reported in September, but I can share with you our thoughts so far:

- We will be recommending that Warlingham CRC remains open; and will be pursuing the ultimate aim of creating a large purpose-built recycling centre for the north of Tandridge to accommodate both the Warlingham and Caterham CRCs.
- That the Council should be making recycling and disposal of waste easy for the residents of Surrey; but that residents need to also take ownership for what happens to the waste they produce as a County everyone needs to do more to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle because annual waste tonnage is increasing dramatically in today's disposable society.
- That as a County we can make savings in Waste and Recycling by increasing recycling rates and participation in the food caddy scheme for example if everyone participated in the food caddy recycling then the Council would save on average another £3m per year (it is more expensive to dispose of food waste than convert it into energy).
- That SCC need to review policies on charging and items such as wood disposal.
- Personally, I am working hard to return some levels of service to Warlingham CRC so that what Surrey County Council offer there is fit for purpose.
- That all of this needs to be supported with a fact-based communication campaign.

Biggin Hill Consultation

I am working closely with experts at Surrey County Council, Martin Allen, TDC and your Parish Council on responding to the ongoing Biggin Hill consultations. Details are on their website or via your Parish Council.

Rethinking Transport

I recently listened to a presentation by the Rethinking Transport in Surrey project group. Without raising expectations, I am extremely optimistic about what this could mean for Tatsfield and surrounding rural villages. It is NOT a code for reducing local bus services but in fact looking at why, how and when most of the resident travel is carried out in Surrey. Interestingly most of it is health related (travelling to hospitals, doctors etc) and so ideas such as outreach doctors surgeries in villages are going to be considered which if successful will have a wonderful impact on villages such as Tatsfield. I will keep you posted on this.

TATSFIELD MARTIAL ARTS

It has been a busy few months for TMA. Here is a quick summary on what's been going on:

A New Judo Black Belt On Sunday 28th July, Kevin Ruggins (of Old Lane) attended a British Judo Association (BJA) black belt grading at Dartford judo club. The grading was a competitive one, meaning as well as a theory exam to pass, you have to fight for your grade. Only wins count, you get nothing for a draw or a loss. Kevin won his first two fights, which meant he had reached the line-up stage. A line-up is when you fight three opponents, one straight after the other with no rest in between. If you beat all three, you are promoted to black belt. Your opponents in the line-up will also gain points towards their black belt grading if they beat you, so no one is there to make it easy for you. Kevin weighed in at 79kg, his three line-up opponents weighed in at 86kg, 97kg and 102kg; however, Kevin beat all three with ippon (judo's knockout score). So, a total of five fights and five wins – and a new black belt at the club! Kevin is the second judo black belt the club has produced since opening; however, he is the first to take a BJA competitive grading (the BJA is the governing body for judo in the UK and BJA grades are recognised worldwide). I was actually lucky enough to be at the grading as one of the BJA Senior Examiners, so had the pleasure in watching 'one of our own' win his fights and pass his theory exam.

Woldingham School Self Defence Course During May and June myself and Sensei Patrick, who teaches the Friday night kids jujitsu class, provided self-defence classes on Wednesday evenings at Woldingham Girls School. This is the second time we have been asked to provide this course and this year it was very well received, with a number of boarders telling us it was the best evening course the school had arranged for a long time. On a self-defence course we teach simply yet effective techniques, that don't require months or years of training. However, the main focus is about awareness. Awareness of your surroundings, awareness of others and not making yourself a target.

Warlingham High School Summer Judo Course For the second year in a row I have been working with Warlingham School during the summer term providing a weekly judo course. The course is along the lines of an intervention course, aimed at students who are struggling with either their performance or behaviour in the classroom. The judo provides them with an outlet to blow off steam, helps build their confidence and self-esteem, whilst teaching them to respect others. To stay on the judo course the students must work hard and behave at school - if they don't, they are removed from the course. This year was a great success with a really nice bunch of year 7's, everyone lasted the course, and we have an awards day next week to which the parents are invited too. All the boys receive a course completion trophy plus there are a few extra awards handed out (most improved, best judoka and best team mate, to name a few).

Warlingham High School Activity Week On 8th and 9th July, myself and Sensei Patrick taught Japanese jujitsu sessions at the school as part of their end of term activity week.

Other companies were there providing sessions in dance and drama; the students get to try each activity via a round robin approach. This is the second year we have worked at the school during the activity week and with four groups a day as large as seventeen students at a time – we were certainly kept busy!



Jujitsu Grading On Sunday 23rd June we held a three-hour jujitsu grading for both our junior (children) and senior (adult) members. The grading consisted of a syllabus exam, sparring – both standing and ground – plus stamina exercises such as punch bag work. It was a tough, long grading but everyone worked hard and gave 100%, and I'm pleased to say everyone passed and received their new belts.

Judo Competition Success On Sunday 7th July, six of TMA judoka's entered the "Southern Area & London Area Combined Junior and Youth Championship" and brought home four medals. Thomas Alexander had a tough morning, fighting for the

first time in the U38kg category, losing in a close contest to the eventual bronze medallist. Sam Walsh did extremely well in only his third competition, placing 5th in a large U27kg category and narrowly missing out on a bronze medal. Kayden Plinston had one of those days where everything went right, fighting in the U42kg category for the first time, he defeated all his opponents in style, winning each of his four fights with ippon (judo's equivalent to a knockout) and securing the gold medal, including one fight that was over after four seconds! Seb Sanchez, also fighting in the U42kg category, won his first three fights with ippon – before facing Kayden in the final and picking up a silver medal. Kyan Abrams also won a gold in the U46kg category, winning all his fights with ippon as well. Finally, Bailey in this first competition, won a bronze in the U50kg, this was particular pleasing as Bailey has only been doing judo for two months and really entered the competition just to gain some experience.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN SEPTEMBER

My predictions for the weather in July/August period proved to be very near the mark! We were not quite up there with the record maximum temperature – due to our elevation – but we were very close with 34.4C on 5th July; rainfall of 76.4mm in July and 56.6mm in August were both way above the long-term average with most of it falling in very short periods; 23.3mm fell on 20th July and 12.5mm on 12^{th} August, in old money an inch of rain is approximately 25mm. These are challenging growing conditions for gardeners; it will be interesting to see how our experts have coped when they present their wares at the Autumn Show on 7th September at 3.00pm – *don't miss it!*



Rosemary is one of my favourite shrubs; it is very tolerant of soil and situation, it has lovely small blue flowers on the summer and best of all it is a superb herb picked fresh, finely chopped and added to other herbs to flavour stews and roasts – especially lamb! It was also a pest free plant, but the dreaded Rosemary Beetle has slowly spread from Southern Europe and is now in Tatsfield. As its name

suggests it mainly attacks Rosemary but it can also have a go at the shrubby Salvias, Thyme and Lavender too. The adult is about the size of a Ladybird and a similar shape with a very shiny body and purple and green stripes. The adult can be seen on plants throughout the year from June to September if the weather is warm and dry; however,

in mild winters the larvae can continue to feed causing further damage. The larvae are mobile soft pale grey/green bugs of a similar size to the adults. Both adults and larvae feed on the foliage throughout the summer leaving bare stalks as evidence of attack. A healthy Rosemary shrub can recover and make new foliage but over time the plant weakens and looks very scruffy.



A big problem with using the many insecticide sprays to control this pest is that the sprays will also kill the many beneficial insects that also love Rosemary. I have found that spraying the plant with a strong jet of water will wash off the pests and if repeated often enough will be effective. If you must use a spray then look for the natural mixture of fatty acids that is less harmful to beneficial insects.

Rosemary will respond well to hard pruning providing the pruning cuts are made back to a green shoot and not the brown stems.

The Royal Horticultural Society is currently running a survey to map the spread of Rosemary Beetle, details can be found at www.rhs.org.uk.

It was also interesting to see the statues outside in bare stone, which increased our awe of the spectacle of the night before. The information was in English so we learned a lot - particularly that The Pope wrote to the Kaiser to plead not to shell the cathedral.... and he didn't. We should be able to rebuild these over the "closed season" and start 2020 with a brand-new composting site!

As avid composters, I am sure you are all concerned about the environment. Climate change and CO₂ emissions are currently very much at the forefront of the news, so I want to go "off piste" for a moment and let you know about an organisation I came across recently. I read about it in the more serious end of the national press where it received high praise. It is called ClimateCare and the link is <u>www.climatecare.org</u>.

Cutting CO₂ emissions is obviously the best way forward but, failing that, the next best option is offsetting. ClimateCare calculates your carbon emissions and you can pay them to offset your carbon footprint. They invest the money into schemes globally which will reduce carbon emissions in line with your usage.

It was started by an Oxford University professor and looks like a pukka outfit to mesee what you think. I have just offset the return flight to Sardinia for two people. It only cost £6.74 (for both of us) which I thought was not in any way punitive. You can also use the calculator to offset car miles and energy usage.

Just a reminder – The last day for bringing waste up to the site is Saturday 28th September.

Hints and Tips for using the composting site:


- Please separate waste three-ways into soft green which doesn't need shredding, tough green for shredding and woody for shredding before you arrive.
- We will always try to take all your compostable waste but it helps us if you can try to limit it to no more than a large builder's bag or equivalent in any one week. If you have a larger amount please get in touch with me in advance. This will allow us to manage the waste more efficiently.
- Please keep any soil and especially stones out of any waste for shredding as these are both bad news for the shredders' blades.
- Using our compost will greatly improve your soil and helps us pay our bills!



THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – SEPTEMBER 2019

Jupiter and Saturn are both still visible low down in the sky with the latter being due south at 9pm around the beginning of the month. The Moon, which will be just past first quarter, will be between the two planets on the nights of the 6th and 7th. Jupiter looks close to the constellation of Scorpio (the scorpion) but is, in fact, in the faint and poorly defined group of Ophiuchus (the serpent bearer) which, despite the zodiac passing through it, is not one of the twelve constellations that make up the zodiac. Saturn is still ensconced within the boundaries of Sagittarius (the archer) part of whose shape resembles a "Teapot" which in astronomical terms is referred to as an "asterism".

Apart from the objects mentioned above I've also added on the map two other asterisms, the Summer Triangle and the Square of Pegasus. An asterism is a group of stars that form an everyday easy to identify object, in this case a triangle and a square whereas, in contrast, constellations usually bear no resemblance to whatever they are named after. The first of these two is made up of the brightest stars in three separate constellations, Deneb in Cygnus (the swan), Vega in Lyra (the lyre) and Altair in Aquila (the eagle). Interestingly, part of Cygnus is often referred to as the Northern Cross (also an asterism) and a glance at the map will show you why.



If you turn and look north you will see the Plough (an asterism that is part of Ursa Major) is making its way towards the horizon as it does every year during the late summer and early autumn. If you draw a line through the two stars at the front of the

"bucket" part of the Plough and continue it upwards you will come to the Pole Star, Polaris. You may be surprised, as many people are, that it isn't much brighter and more conspicuous given its importance in the night sky. However, the fact that Polaris is almost perfectly aligned with the Earth's axis of rotation is not only pure chance but also a temporary arrangement.

The Earth's axis has what is sometimes simplistically called a "wobble" which causes the axis to trace out a circle in the sky over a period of just less than 26,000 years. This is the same in both the northern and southern hemispheres and means that at different times in that period various stars assume the mantle of Pole Star. From south of the equator there is no star conveniently close to the required position at this time so there is currently no southern Pole Star.

The reason for this "wobble" (known as precession) is that as the Earth spins it bulges around the equator thanks to centrifugal force. The Sun and Moon both exert a gravitational pull on this bulge giving rise to precession. In 12,000 years the Pole Star will be a star I mentioned a little earlier, Vega in the constellation Lyra.

FIVE MINUTES WITH....MAUREEN'S MEMORIES

As a family, we found Tatsfield just over fifty years ago. My husband's work meant that we had to leave Cambridge and relocate close to West Wickham. We wanted a rural area for our lads to grow up in and a bungalow in Ricketts Hill Road proved to be perfect for us.

In those days, Ricketts Hill Road was a country lane. I can clearly remember the comment my mother-in-law made when she visited for the first time: "When does the next stage coach pass through?" It was safe to walk along; there was no bus, most families only had one car and children walked to school – so there was very little traffic. The Millennium Woods were enchanting, with numerous pathways and a bridle path running parallel to the road. We always took this woodland route to the village, avoiding the roads. I can remember there being eleven shops. Miss Knight, whose shop stood on the corner of Ship Hill and Old Lane, reserved my daily loaf.

It was sometime in the early seventies that my youngest son came home from school saying that I had to go to the Scout Hut that evening as the Cubs were re-forming. By eight o'clock that evening, I had become both the Treasurer and Baloo! They were great days, particularly weekend camps at Broadstone Warren, where the adult helpers had just as much fun as the Cubs. In 1975, when St Mary's Church was 900 years old, the Cubs invited other packs from the District to take part in "It's a Knockout" on Westmore Green. It was great fun.

Towards the end of 1975, my husband's work took us to the Middle East. We simply locked the house up, returning yearly. In 1978, we decided adventure was calling. We bought a Vauxhall Cavalier and a modest caravan and began a six-week overland journey from Tatsfield, England to Al Salmiya, Kuwait. The journey would be impossible now, but that's another story. It's an experience my sons still reflect on and something we will never forget.

In 1980, we returned to the UK and I involved myself with village life again. In 1987, the Big Storm saw many of the trees fall across the road. The men began the clear up, with bonfires in back gardens and jacket potatoes galore. We had no water for four days and no electricity for six weeks. Back then everyone knew their neighbours. Sadly, that's not the case anymore, partly because people don't tend to walk along the road these days as it's just too dangerous. Also, many people have moved over the years and I think I have seen all my neighbouring properties change hands, some more than once.

I have always been a member of St Mary's and have served on the PCC as both Secretary and Treasurer at various times. In 1997, it was agreed that the Church Hall should be built. Persuaded by Lesley Irving and the Souths, we formed a committee to help raise funds. We held regular quizzes, suppers, lunches, concerts and jumble sales. A lot of people got involved, especially with the building work. Upon its opening in 2000, we decided to name it the Millennium Hall. It has proved such a useful asset to the Church and is something I am proud to have been part of. A few years later, I accepted the role of Advertising Manager for the Parish Magazine. I really enjoyed this as it allowed me to meet many new people. Sadly, for medical reasons I had to give up the role last year.

When I think about all the happy memories I have, I realise how much I love Tatsfield. Much has changed over the years, but aren't we all so lucky to live in a village only twenty miles from London with green fields and wildlife all around us?
