To recall hearing on Wednesday, February 6th 1952 that the King had died, you now have at least to be in your mid-seventies. You may also remember being called into the school hall to hear the news on the wireless.

some object which would be associated in future with the Coronation'. Just after the 1953 Whitsun holiday, schools were closed again for the festivities. In Tatsfield there was a bonfire and fireworks on Westmore Green and a 'meat tea in Church Hall' for the over-65s. The following weekend came children's sports and a fancy-dress parade, as well as dancing round the maypole. Funds were raised for a Coronation memorial – the predecessor of today's village sign on the Tatol bed.

For the Silver Jubilee in 1977, there was a pram race, five-a-side football, gymnastics displays, a tug-of-war in fancy dress as well as a pub-versus-church cricket match. For the Golden Jubilee in 2002, residents joined a '*Toast to Her Majesty*' in the Village Hall, where members of the Tatsfield Art Group were also displaying their work.

Over the 70 years of the Queen's reign there have been significant changes in Tatsfield. At the beginning in 1952 there was still a regular bus service to Croydon and Sevenoaks. You could also go to Aylesbury on the Green Line bus which on its way provided direct links to central London. It was oil lamps and stoves at St Mary's. Electricity didn't come to the church until 1959. Since then, the church has undergone a major refurbishment. Tatsfield's population has almost doubled. Crossways Court, Shipfield Close, Valley Mushroom Farm, the Square and countless other developments have been built since. We now have a Millennium Hall and a new school.

Tatsfield has certainly changed much during the Queen's long reign but it continues to mark its jubilees as it did those of Queen Victoria in 1887 and 1897 and George the Fifth's Silver Jubilee in 1935: adherence to tradition and a token of stability in our way of life.

It was a sad start to our May meeting as I began by giving the sad news of the passing of Stephen Mittins. Stephen was a highly valued, dedicated former member of the Parish Council and a good friend to all his colleagues. He will be sadly missed and our condolences go to Gillian and Family.

Our May meeting was also our AGM and when elections for office take place . I can report that I (Kim Jennings) was elected as Chairman and David Pinchin as Vice Chair for the year. The agreement for Roles and Responsibilities was also decided with only minor changes. Our newly appointed member John Rand was appointed to THS Liaison, John will also be undertaking training to join the team dealing with Legionella Monitoring/Fire Alarm Testing/Emergency Lighting Testing and Fire Risk Assessment.

We also have a Finance Committee lead as Chair by Alex Davies; also sitting on this committee are Jason Syrett, Kim Jennings and David Pinchin.

Planning TA/2022/482 Sixpenny House, 105 Paynesfield Road, Tatsfield TN16 2BQ. Erection of a replacement porch and replacement decking to the side and rear of property. The property is located inside the settlement area. This plan is for minor alterations to improve insulation through the addition of a new porch and replacing the decking which is starting to rot. No comment.

The Clerk reported that the PC had received a payment of £463.97 from Tandridge Council for CIL payment.

Neighbourhood Plan Jason Syrett gave a short report on progress so far. Further details can be found in the Neighbourhood Plan report in this magazine.

Village Hall Some exterior decorating maintenance works will be undertaken during the next few weeks.

Airport David Pinchin reported that the Airport consultative committee had met on the 28th April. (His report can be seen on the Village Website under Minutes of this meeting after our June meeting.)

Furze Corner Playing Field The Parish Council is in touch with the Tatsfield PFA (who currently lease Furze Corner playing field) and Tandridge District Council (who are the freeholders) with a view to potentially taking over the lease of the sports ground. The proposal being to try to secure a long-term lease then submit funding applications with Tandridge and Surrey to secure funds to rebuild the Cricket Pavilion and rejuvenate club sports at Furze Corner. We will keep you informed of progress.

Aileen McHugo Building We continue with our refurbishment of the Parish Rooms. In April we had the toilets and reception room decorated. A new electric fuse board is being fitted in May and the kitchen is being refurbished in early June .

Little Acorns Preschool The Parish Council had received a request to extend the outside area at the Village Hall to provide a reading hub and toy store. Members were supportive of this proposal and gave agreement in principle, subject to approval from the VHMC.

Jubilee Celebrations Hopefully you will have all received the Programme of Events planned in the village to mark this special occasion. The planning of all these events has been fully supported by our local village businesses and we are very grateful for the time given to assist in the organisation. The Tatsfield in Bloom team have done an amazing job again making our village fit for a Queen and all the bunting makes us smile. Let's all hope to have an amazing time Celebrating this 70 year reign of our Monarch.

District Council Elections

Before I go on to report the outcome, I will repeat my own position again for clarity, next year will be my 8th and final year and I will be up for re-election, so as I have done previously I wanted to give anyone who may be interested in taking on the role of the District Councillor for Tatsfield and Titsey the opportunity to come forward in plenty of time and find out about the role. **If that is you then please contact me.**

So, of the fourteen seats that were up for re-election there were some changes. The Conservatives lost four seats - two to the I&OLRGAlliance and two to the Liberal Democrats. The outcome of this is that of the 42 seats: the Independents and OLRG Alliance hold 18; the Liberal Democrats hold 11; the Conservatives hold 10; and the Independent Group hold 3.

TATSFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN IMPORTANT UPDATE FOR <u>ALL</u> RESIDENTS

The public consultation of the Tatsfield Draft Neighbourhood Plan has now finished.



The committee are now processing all of the responses and comments from the Public, Tandridge District Council and the statutory Consultees, they were numerous.

There had been 27 responses in total from the Consultation meetings and from the online system.

21 Supported the proposed plan 4 did not and 2 declared themselves unsure.

The main areas brought up on the responses were: Local Transport, particularly buses, Pastiche Design, Light Pollution (Dark Night Sky) and Shops (Local Economy)

All the comments had been read and where concerns had been raised these would be looked at specifically if they had not already been addressed in the plan. If accepted the Neighbourhood Plan will be changed or it would be explained why there would not be a change. CONSERVATION GRAZING AT HILL PARK

Ten-acre field is the south facing scarp slope opposite Tatsfield Court Farm as you head towards Westerham. It is subdivided by hedgerows into three separate grazing compartments and has recently been home to a dozen yearling Belted Galloway cows, courtesy of Surrey Wildlife Trust.



It's been a few years since we've had any grazing in these compartments and when we did have sheep on the slopes there was never enough grazing pressure to remove the course grasses, so this experiment with the 'Belties' is most welcome.

This hardy breed originates from the lowlands of Scotland and has a proven track record in grazing both heathland and chalk grassland and are now a familiar sight across much of Surrey. They have a calm temperament and are selected because many of the Trust sites have public access.

The aim is to create diversity of structure within the chalk grassland - a mosaic of grazed patches with un-grazed tussocks around small scrub. We may also allow some scrub blocks to



The grazing will help to lower the nutrient levels and hopefully reduce the rank species such as Thistles, Dock



and Nettle and increase the range of wildflowers and invertebrates that make chalk grassland so special.

The grassland will be monitored to ensure that the

calcareous grassland attributes are maintained and future management can be adjusted if we pick up any potential problems.

By the time you read this article 'the girls' will have completed their task at Hill Park and have moved on to fresh pasture at another Trust reserve to continue their valuable work.

We look forward to welcoming them back in the future and very much hope that this trial will start to reverse the decline of recent years and have a positive effect on the flora and fauna of ten-acre field.

Southern Area Inter Counties On Sunday 8th May, myself and other TMA coaches, led the Surrey Teams into battle against teams from Sussex, Kent and Hampshire in the SA Inter counties championships. Each county provided the following teams: Boys U12; Girls U12; Boys U16; Girls U16; Senior mixed – coloured belts; Senior mixed – black belts.

Our U12's did extremely well, both the boys and girls team came 1st and won the Inter Counties cups. The future looks strong for team Surrey!



In the U16 teams, TMA had four members competing. Lizzie Merredew fought in the u44kg group, winning 1 fight and losing 2. Bella Mumford fought in the u57kg group, winning 2 and losing 1. NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

We begin this month with a (delayed) garden report from Martin Allen (27.03.22):

'John Rosenbaum's listing is mighty impressive. I can only recall noting 28 visiting species from his list in our garden. [Re: John's 2021 observations.] It has been pretty quiet in the garden recently where the 20+ flocks of **House Sparrows** and Chaffinches we used to get have never returned. But lately it has been a pleasure to see both **Chaffinch** and **Goldfinch** returning. Although in small numbers, it is much better than the number 0 that was the case for so long. We have had a visit from a solitary **Brambling** over winter. At least that one is absent from John's list!'

It looks as though Martin may have made a Brambling observation some time before the rest of us. The <u>last</u> sighting in my garden, incidentally, was just two days after submitting May's 'Nature Notes' – April 19th. Hopefully, having found a good winter home, they will return to us at the end of the year. Right now, however, it's time to keep a lookout for <u>summer</u> visitors and I'm going to get in straight away with a fantastic sighting of... a **Tree Pipit**! Having never seen one before it was immediately apparent that this was



something out of the ordinary. Extraordinary, in fact! I was eating breakfast, looking out of the window, as usual, when what I thought was probably an immature sparrow or finch flew down from the acer tree on to the fence. It's mostly true what people say about small brown birds all looking alike from a distance. This one, however, then flew towards the house and settled on the wall of the raised bed, just the other side of the patio, about ten feet from my

cereal bowl. And there it sat, for about a minute, giving me ample time to observe and mentally record various features. As you are doubtless aware, to have a bird sit so obligingly for this length of time at such close quarter is a heaven-sent opportunity. The striated breast was the most obvious feature. Alongside this were the markings and colour of the crown, cheeks, eye-stripe, wing and tail feathers, legs and beak, and, of course, the general shape, posture and size. To be honest, on this occasion, I was glad <u>not</u> to have a camera to hand. If I had, I would probably have been concentrating too much on achieving a decent photograph rather than mentally recording and fully appreciating what I was seeing. Once the bird had flown, the immediate task was to confirm, through various book and computer illustrations and descriptions, that this was indeed the bird species I believed it to be. Not having heard its call or song, and by apprearance alone, it could easily have been a Meadow Pipit. However, the fact that it was perfectly content perching in a tree, in a garden, and not favouring an extensive area of grassland (meadow) makes this, for me, a certainty. It also makes me a very fortunate and happy man!

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – JUNE 2022

It's amazing to think that the summer solstice is with us already – it only seems like yesterday when we were admiring the brilliant winter constellations. This year the solstice occurs on June 21st at 10:13am which is the moment in time when the Sun is as far above the celestial equator as it can possibly get. The celestial equator is the Earth's equator projected out into space and onto the imaginary celestial sphere. On that date, from our latitude, the Sun rises at 4:43am (at its furthest around the horizon towards the north-east) and sets at 9:21pm. To astronomers the day of the summer solstice marks the first day of summer whereas to the meteorologist it is June 1st. This is because astronomers use the dates of the solstices and equinoxes as indicators of when seasons change, whereas meteorologists use the 1st day of the month when these events occur. For example, an astronomer will tell you that autumn this year begins on September 23rd (the date of the autumnal equinox) but a meteorologist will say it's on September 1st.

The planets remain very much rooted in the morning skies at the moment, strung out as they are from east to west along the line of the ecliptic. The ecliptic is the *apparent* passage of the Sun through the constellations over the course of a year. It does not refer to its daily rising and setting. Alternatively, the ecliptic can be considered as the plane of the Earth's passage around the Sun – both are equally correct and amount to the same thing but seen from a different perspective. All the other 7 planet's planes of rotation around the Sun are very similar to the Earth's which means that all those bodies can be seen in a fairly narrow band across the sky. This band is called the Zodiac which is itself centred on the ecliptic. If you do happen to look out around 4:15am in the middle of the month the planets you will see, starting in the north-north-east, are Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and lastly towards the south, Saturn. Uranus is also there, close to Venus, but is too faint to be seen by the naked eye. The problem is, at this time of year, the Sun rises very early. It's worth noting that sunrise is not earliest on the day of the summer solstice: it usually varies by a few days. This is due to something called the equation of time as well as your location on the Earth's surface.

Not only does the Sun rise early and set late, but the sky is never properly dark in the summer because the Sun is never very far below the horizon. In the middle of June at midnight (GMT) or 1am (BST) the Sun is only 15° below the northern horizon which is why the sky looks lighter in that direction. For the sky to be classed as astronomically dark the centre of the Sun must be at least 18° below the horizon.

The saying that "What goes around comes around" is as true in astronomy as it is in anything else and if you have the patience, the brightest planets will be evening objects in late August and September when they can be observed at a far more sociable hour. Saturn is closest to Earth (at opposition in astronomical terminology) in August, Jupiter in September and Mars in December so the best is yet to come. Plus, we have a partial eclipse of the Sun to look forward to in October.

TATSFIELD IN BLOOM

As I am writing this the summer bedding plants have just arrived from Coblands and the petunias in purple, white and yellow are looking beautiful. We are intending to plant these in the week beginning 16th May so that they



can become established by the Jubilee weekend. A watering rota is also being drawn up for the summer and we hope that as many people as possible have volunteered to take on this task. If you would like to help please contact me.

After planting the summer flowering plants in the village containers, one of the challenges the Tatsfield in Bloom team face is to ensure that there is a constant supply of moisture in the compost that ensures the plants can continue to grow without suffering drought stress. A shortage of moisture will cause a plant to stop growing and wilt; watering dry compost is very difficult and wilting causes damage to the internal water conducting tissues inside the plant.

Although our volunteers are watering daily, we have had to learn some 'tricks of the trade' that avoid the compost drying out:

- we avoid watering in the heat of the day when up to 50% of the water can be lost in a short space of time;
- we use water retaining granules that can be bought from local garden centres under various names such as 'Swell Gel', when the white granules are mixed into the planting compost the soak up water and turning to blobs of clear jelly, as the compost dries, they release their water acting like hundreds of mini reservoirs;
- we use large plastic bottles cut in half, we cut thin slits into the bottom and invert them into the compost, when filled with water they release the water slowly as the compost dries out.

We are also purchasing some perennials and shrubs to make a new bed under the new parish noticeboard on Westmore Green which will be completed by the Jubilee weekend.

A very big thank you to all those who put donations into our yellow pots in Sheree's, The Old Ship, The Village Club and The Bakery and to those who have donated direct.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN JUNE

Those folk who have been admiring our spring displays of Pansies and Violas in the manger baskets on our front wall by the garage might be puzzled to notice that the left side basket is now full of dry withered plants hanging over the edge while the right hand basket continues to flourish. Two weeks ago I was standing close to this basket with the watering can when there was a blur of wings that brushed my hair! Using a two-step, I carefully climbed up and peeked in amongst the plants and found buried deep in the compost at the back of the basket a nest with five eggs laid by mummy Robin. I stopped watering, the plants wilted removing the cover over the nest but mummy Robin

continued to sit on her eggs and is now feeding very hungry babies. We were very pleased that our resident Blackbird has once again set up home in our log store, one brood is on the wing and we are expecting her to start a second brood soon. We also have Dunnocks, and more, in our hedge at the back.

This is a critical time for nesting birds and our gardens are one big maternity ward, be careful out there gardeners!

June is the ideal time to prune and reshape those shrubs that flowered early in the year eg Forsythia, Lilac and many more. Pruning now will allow them time to make and mature the growth needed to produce flower buds vital for a good show of flower next year. Remember that if these plants are happy in their space and not encroaching on paths, patios, or other plants then leave them be.

It is wonderful to see and hear about the many initiatives to plant more trees. But I am very worried at the lack of emphasis on the importance of watering these plants in the first year or two of life. There are reports of large numbers of trees that have died already in the very dry start to the growing season. If you have new trees and shrubs in your garden please take care to give them enough water; please give them a bucket, or watering can, full per plant during warm dry periods and use a thick layer of compost around the base as a mulch to hold the moisture in the soil.

TATSFIELD'S VILLAGE CLUB

I came to live in the village in the early 1950's and spent two years living next door to the Working Men's Club at Number 1 Pond Cottage. I had previously trained as an electrician and I was asked to re-wire the whole club. I found that every surface I touched was covered in slimy and smelly nicotine as most of the male members smoked a pipe or cigarettes. The place was dark and (I thought) not very nice and I never really wanted to become a member. Scroll forward some 67 years and recently I was invited by the new club secretary - Pete Bath, to come and have a look at the place and find out what was going on.

My word how different it all is now - so warm, bright and inviting. I received a friendly welcome from the many people I recognised. Two small group meetings were being held, a large TV screen had a football game going on with the sound level just right set that people could talk to each other without shouting. It was explained to me that swearing was not tolerated and if it did happen, the annoying person would receive a written letter prior to disciplinary notice by the mixed members committee. I was shown a large outside area at the end of the club especially for the members who like a quiet drink and a smoke in the fresh air. Here again the fenced in privacy was great with nice tables and chairs uniformly placed around to use. I was informed that there was a full-sized snooker/billiards table upstairs that was well used by many keen players.

There are plenty of things going on at the club on different days including a poker card school, Mondays are for big bingo nights with the local woodworker David Bacon as caller with Fridays being the meat raffle draw (tickets are a pound a strip) with Pete Bath in charge. The club's diary is filled with bags of cracking bands booked for future entertainment.

Presently there are some 300 members on the clubs books and the opening times are: Monday to Thursday, 3pm – 11pm, Friday 12 midday to 11.30pm, Saturday and Sunday 12 midday to 11pm.

As an aside - a bit of background info was received from Tatsfield's village historian Ian Mitchell, that the club was a completed new building in October 1931 and the nine gentlemen committee members ages totalled 701 years.

After taking pictures of the management and staff members I was offered a drink to which I declined as I am a non-drinker and smoker and immediately the question was

put "would you like a cup of tea?" Now that's what I call a proper club.
