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

Dear Friends, as I sit in the Rectory kitchen the leaves on the trees outside my window are turning a beautiful shade of deep red and the evenings are beginning to draw in. Autumn has always been my favourite season.

Harvest is a time to thank God for his rich provision; a time to thank God for his gifts to us; a time also to reach out in prayer and with harvest-gifts. In our own area we can see first-hand the grace of God, of land being ploughed, the seed sown, of warmth and water supporting the growth, until we see the harvest. But let us not forget that even in an age where there is a plethora of food variety on supermarket shelves, we are still dependent on the harvest being safely gathered in. My prayer for us this harvest is that God will raise up enough workers that the seeds of God love will be planted far and wide, for without the seed there can of course be no harvest! With my love and prayers, Rev. Helen

TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Monday 9th October. I chaired the meeting in the absence of Kim Jennings to whom we sent our very best wishes. It was a relatively short agenda with no members of the public attending.

Planning

TA/2023/994/TPO 70, Paynesfield Road. Minor works to existing chestnut trees, set well back from Paynesfield Road. **No comment**

TA/2023/1061 and TA/2023/1074 Clacket Lane Motorway Service Area North. Landscaping and single storey building extension/modifications to construct a drive-through McDonalds. Erection of free-standing totem sign and wall-mounted sign. This involves the loss of several semi-mature trees and habitat directly adjacent to Clacket Woods. **Objection:** Based on the loss of a significant number of semi-mature trees and a significant area of established wildlife habitat that is a naturalised continuation of Clacket Woods to which it is adjacent. Clacket Woods is a designated Ancient Woodland and a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSS). The proposals would cause loss of important wildlife habitat and impact on the openness of the Green Belt.

TA/2023/1134 Kingswood, Goatsfield Road. Retention of existing small timber shed, open lean-to shed and greenhouse. Retrospective. **Objection:** This planning application is for the retrospective retention of three outbuildings that should not have been built as a result of planning restrictions placed on the property when it was constructed under TA/2014/980. Also, Rose Cottage, a former building on the site that was required to be demolished under the same planning consent, remains on the site in a partially derelict state. And a utility room with cloakroom appears to have been added to the back of the new house without planning consent. The Parish Council requests that TDC investigate potential planning enforcement issues on this property.

TA/2023/1157/NH Newlyns, Ricketts Hill Road. Erection of first-floor extension to form house with internal alterations and reduction of existing side and rear roof. Located in the Green Belt outside the defined village. **Objection:** On the grounds of over-development and harm being caused to the Green Belt. The existing 3-bed bungalow was previously extended through permission granted in 1991. This proposal to add a further storey (making it into a 6-bedroom house) would more than double its volume prior to the 1991 extension. It also represents a disproportionate addition to the existing building.

Further details about these planning applications together with responses by interested parties can be seen on the planning portal of Tandridge District Council's website.

Speed Management Following on from the previous Parish Council meeting when the village "Speedwatch" initiative regrettably had to be discontinued, discussions have taken place regarding the possibility of additional speed humps in the village centre. The VAS (vehicle activated sign) records indicate many instances of speeding, so we are now going to seek a speed data recorder from Surrey Police with a view to arguing the case with SCC for at least two additional humps.

Remembrance Service Arrangements are well under way for our annual remembrance service. Everybody is welcome to attend at the memorial from 10.40am on Saturday 11th November. Two minutes silence will be held at 11am.

Christmas Carols The Christmas Carol Singalong this year will be held in the garden of Ye Olde Ship pub on the evening of Friday 15th December.

TATSFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Finally, the Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan has been properly and fully reviewed by the Local Planning Authority officers from



Tandridge District Council under the process, this part is known as Regulation 15.

The committee has met twice since the last report, and we have been through the officers comments (these can be found on the Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan website) and have taken much of the comments on board; but some we have disagree with and have explained why as we feel the differences would just amount to a "difference of opinion". At the time of writing this we have returned a third and we hope final draft version and an updated SEA/HRA document which you can also find on the website, so please let me know if you have any comments once you have read the Council's response and our submitted copy. I will be sending an updated Consultation document within the next week and by the time you read this you will also be able to find this document on the website. We hope to progress the plan quite quickly now requiring an inspector to review, with the plan coming to referendum in May of 2024.

TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

My report is a bit light for this month as having spent a lot of September out of the country I admit to being a little behind with Council business, but I will catch up quickly I assure you.

Before going away the Parish Council and I hosted three senior officers from TDC and we took the opportunity to discuss much what we believe is going awry between the District Council and the Parish Council. One of the main areas of concern remains Planning and Enforcement. Strictly that is two concerns, but they are under the senior wing of the new Chief Planning Officer. This officer will be visiting the village again before the end of October so we will be seeking an update on the outstanding matters that have accrued.

I missed the Audit & Scrutiny committee, of which I am the Vice Chair but caught up with much of the procedure in the review meeting after I was back. There was more financial bad news within this meeting as the auditors currently undertaking our 2021/2022 audit and who are due to undertake our audit of the 2022/2023 year have put in an increase in fees way above the standard rate and for which I,my fellow councillors and the Finance Officers strenuously object to.

Tandridge District Council – Local Plan You are probably aware that the Inspector has offered the Council two options none of which are positive. One option is for the Inspector to write a report concluding that the planning unsound and that it is not adopted; and the second option is for the Council to withdraw the plan. There are implications to both outcomes. The decision as to which option to take will be discussed and agreed at the full council meeting on Thursday 19th October.

Household Support Grant Phase 4 - to provide financial support to vulnerable households The first round was launched on 18th September but it has closed as available funds have been fully utilised. The second round will be launched on 11th December using all of the same media channels, including in the September magazine so ensure you apply before the final £211,000 are also used up.

Autumn leaf clearing – a reminder The autumn leaf fall presents a significant challenge for our street cleaning team to clear whilst trying to maintain the cleanliness in our streets. Please help by not clearing any leaves on your property by sweeping or blowing them into the street. They will build up in the gutter and block drains, will disguise the edge of the road and so may cause trips, falls or damage to vehicles, and are likely to create a slippery surface. To deliberately blow, and therefore deposit, leaf matter or debris onto the highway is an offence, pursuant to section 148 of the Highways Act 1980. An offender risks prosecution and possibly a civil action for damages should an accident occur due to their actions. (Prosecution would be a matter for Police or the Highway Authority.) We are unable to alter the cleaning schedule to deal with accumulations of leaves created in this way, and your road will not be visited until the next scheduled visit. If you employ a gardener, a clear instruction to them **NOT to do this** would make things easier for us all and will help you avoid prosecution.

Government's cost of living payment schedule Since 31st October eligible households have been automatically receiving the DWP second cost of living payment. Eligible pensioners will also receive a further £300 payment later this year as an addition to the Winter Fuel Payment. More information at: helpforhouseholds.campaign.gov.uk.

Collection vehicle fire caused by lithium battery Please do not to put batteries in your rubbish or recycling bin. Recently, a lithium battery in one of the collection vehicles caused a fire, prompting the fire services to respond and affecting our collection service. The cost to repair the vehicle, which is still in the garage, is over £17,000. Batteries, as well as gas canisters and helium tanks can explode and cause a fire inside the vehicle. This also creates a risk to the safety of the crew and the fire service.

To dispose of:

- Batteries, including e-cigarette batteries put them in a small, tied sandwich bag **next** to your bin on your collection day. Your local <u>community recycling centre</u> and supermarkets also accept them.
- Small electrical appliances and power tool batteries put them in a tied carrier bag next to your bin on your collection day.
- Gas canisters and helium tanks make sure it is completely empty and contact the shop or supplier you bought it from to find out if they will take it back or take it to your community recycling centre.

Support local businesses Importantly for Tatsfield, please can I urge you to **support our local businesses** and **societies** in every way that you can. We rely on our local business so much and we need to show our support to them to ensure that they continue to operate through these hard times and prosper well into the future also. Also remember to help Tatsfield Good causes by buying your Tandridge Together lottery tickets.

Unclaimed Child Trust Fund HMRC is encouraging 18-21 year olds to check whether they have claimed their Child Trust Fund, worth an average of £2,000. Young adults and parents can search to find out where their Child Trust Fund account is held by visiting: **www.gov.uk**

Are you a charity or voluntary group? Charities and voluntary groups can apply for a grant of up to £2000 from the Tandridge Together Community Fund, if the work you do improves the health and wellbeing of people living in the district. Applications can be made on www.tandridge.gov.uk and must be submitted by **Thursday 30th November**. The grant allocations will be decided by the Tandridge Health and Wellbeing Board in January 2024.

CLAIRE COUTINHO MP

My work in Westminster has never been busier, but I continue to work on the issues that matter most to you. In my surgeries I continue to hear from parents that they are struggling to get updates on education, health and care plans, for their children with SEND, so I organised a meeting with Clare Curran and Jim Nunns from Surrey County Council's SEND team. When I was the Minister responsible for SEND, I used the experience of families in my surgeries to implement reforms to fix some of the most common problems families face. In the short term, there are a number of procedural changes that Surrey can make to smooth things over for families, including making sure that caseworkers have their out-of-office replies turned on and provide regular updates to families, even when there is no progress. I am grateful that Clare agreed to implement some of these changes at our meeting and look into the specific cases I raised from my surgeries. If you have any issues you would like me to take up on your behalf, please

don't hesitate to get in touch – this month I have solved problems for residents having trouble with family visas, social care, HMRC, housing benefit and more.

I also wanted to update you on my work as Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, which I know many of you are incredibly passionate about. Since the Prime Minister's speech on Net Zero at the end of September, I have had one key message: I am deeply committed to tackling climate change and achieving Net Zero, but we must take people with us. We've seen in other countries what happens when people feel that the green transition is something that will make them worse off or reduce their quality of life; you risk undermining public support for the cause altogether. We must take a pragmatic and proportionate approach, while building on our genuinely world-leading record in reducing our emissions.

Many of you have told me, for example, that you are worried about solar farms covering the countryside that we all cherish. That is why I announced that we are working to reduce pressure on rural communities by making it easier for solar panels to be installed on industrial rooftops, warehouses, car parks and factories – saving firms £3 billion a year in the process.

And if we are to protect our environment for our children and grandchildren, we must continue our fantastic record in transitioning to cleaner sources of energy. At the start of October, I announced the six companies which have been shortlisted to build small modular nuclear reactors, one of which is Rolls Royce. This iconic British company powered the Spitfires which took off from Kenley Aerodrome 80 years ago, and in a few years' time they may be powering a significant part of our nation's electricity supply.

SURREY POLICE

We are currently seeing a rise in tool thefts from vans and vehicles across the county. There has been a rise in vans parked at hotels being targeted overnight. Local Safer Neighbourhoods Teams have been working to help reduce thefts across the county by patrolling hotspot areas and engaging with local businesses to help increase security measures. NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA

Our concert on Saturday November 11th, at 7.30 in the Village Hall, is one not to be missed! Tchaikovsky wrote his acclaimed Violin Concerto in 1878, shortly after separating from his wife of only nine weeks after a disastrous marriage in 1877, which brought him close to mental collapse. He composed it in Switzerland, where he had gone to recover after falling into deep depression at the failure of his marriage. It was at first declared unplayable because of its technical difficulty, and was not well received at its first performance, but has since become a firm favourite in the orchestral repertoire. It will be played by Haru Ushigusa, who has played brilliantly with the orchestra before, with 'The Lark Ascending' and the Beethoven Violin Concerto. Those who have heard her play before will not want to miss this!

Also being played are the Beethoven 'Nameday' Overture, one of his lesser known, but still beautiful works, and Schubert's Symphony No 4, 'The Tragic', which was written in 1816 (when Schubert was 19) but only had its first performance in 1849, more than two decades after his early death.

THE JOGLE

Thank you Tatsfield for all the support, encouragement and sponsorship for my Jogle (John O'Groats to Land's End) bike ride raising funds for Jan Akhtar's charity wagon (funds for Dementia UK, Alzheimer's UK and Alzheimer's Research)



After sixteen days cycling, trying (unsuccessfully) to dodge hurricanes Lee and Nigel that barrelled their

way across the Atlantic and dumped biblical amounts of torrential, monsoon like rain on me with fierce 45mph headwinds - I arrived in Land's End on Tuesday 26th September just before Hurricane Agnes (with more torrential rain and 70-80mph winds) hit the south west....this after the ride started at John O'Groats in benign conditions but within a day had morphed into 35mph headwinds that meant I had to cycle even going down 10% gradient hills!



Lots of money was raised for the three wonderful charities Jan Akhtar's charity wagon supports - Dementia UK, Alzheimers UK and Alzheimers Research (a total of £1,270 was raised and we are still counting as more money comes in and goes straight to the charities). 1,034 miles cycled and 17,500 meters of climbing hills (the Scottish Highlands, Devon and Cornwall were really tough); meeting loads of wonderful people along the way; riding through the beautiful English and Scottish countryside (the Highlands - even

in the drizzle and wind are just wonderful - especially around Dunkeld); six punctures (the roads and cycle paths in England and Scotland are sometimes wonderful and sometimes poor for cyclists). But kept the pace up to cycle between 65 and 90 miles a day.

An special mention for the Cure Leukaemia charity folk - after my third puncture of the day in Scotland, I was in the middle of nowhere (30 miles off Dumfries on a 90 mile ride from Edinburgh), it was late afternoon, chucking it down with rain and I was trying to repair my rear inner tube with my puncture repair kit. After five minutes and out of

nowhere eight of their riders and two support vehicles appeared (they were also on a charity bike ride around Northern Ireland and Scotland) provided new inner tubes, repaired and got me going again. When your luck's in...

A big thanks to the always wonderful **Fiona Pendleton** who came with me for the first eleven days, meeting me with my stuff in the evening and then at Land's End - was unfailingly loving, cheerful and supportive as I collapsed at the end of each day into the shower and bed. For anyone considering doing it - a beautiful ride through the wonderful English and Scottish countryside – it's exhilarating and to be highly recommended! **Mike Pendleton**

We have an exciting new calendar for 2023/24 broken down into ten projects. Our second project, entitled 'Birds on a Wire' was lino cutting with the brilliant Jane O'Keefe. Many of us had experienced lino cutting in our youth but nothing as detailed as the ones Jane inspired us to attempt. Both workshops were fun and



surprisingly relaxing.

Project three is on Monday 6th November starting at 7pm, Hannah Franklin will lead this workshop entitled '*Photo Development*'.

Project four will be two workshops on 13th and 20th November with Pippa Doig entitled 'Seedpods and Succulents'. Pippa plans to use plants, cactus and other organic materials such as seed heads and dried flowers and possibly some fruit as stimuli to create some mixed media studies and simple printmaking. The inspiration is mainly coming from artists such as Angie Lewin perhaps with a nod to the more tropical colours of Frida Kahlo. Week one: Direct observational studies, drawing in a simple concertina sketchbook (which Pippa will supply) from the still life objects. These studies will combine both figurative and abstract concerns and will explore different ways of drawing and responding to the stimuli. This session will end with an introduction to simple collagraph techniques that can then be created and prepared as independent work between the sessions, to print from in week two. Week Two: Printing from collagraphs. Working from earlier sketchbook studies or creating new experimental studies to explore simple printing techniques and develop ideas for a mixed media artwork. Pippa is hoping to show Gelli printing and/or cyanotype techniques. If not, then we will be using mark making and mono-printing techniques, working in layers to simplify and abstract some of the forms. In terms of equipment bring the following basic equipment: watercolours; acrylic inks/ ink pens; different sized paintbrushes; old book pages (Pippa can supply some of these); oil pastels and coloured pencils; also interesting seed casings or dried flower heads, house plant/cacti that could be easily transported.

At present TAG's paintings are on display and available to buy in Sheree's Tea Rooms and Ye Old Ship Pub. Being a member of TAG includes all tutors, entry to display your work at our annual exhibition, access to our store cupboard of equipment and refreshments at all our sessions. We meet Mondays at 7pm until 9.30pm in the Village Hall during term times. Our Annual Fee is still only £150 which breaks down to less than £5.50 a session. Cost for non-members - Demos £10, workshops £15.

Our summer planting of Begonias, Nemesia, Ivy Leaf Geraniums with a



spiky Cordyline in the middle, have thrived since we planted them in June, thanks to the kind weather (!), the volunteers on the watering rota

and those who tended them on Saturday mornings. In fact, we have looked after them so well that they are still looking beautiful as you can see from the photos.

However, with the first frosts now upon us in the middle of October, we anticipate that we will be planting up the containers

with our Autumn/Spring flowers quite soon. We have already tried out two on the front

of the Bakery already with Pansies, Violas and Trailing Pansies in lovely colours. There are also Tete-a-Tete daffodil bulbs in them as well saved from last year.

I need to make a plea for extra help now that the leaves have started to fall. We have lost quite a few of our stronger volunteers over the past few years and if more people are not willing to come and help





us, we will not be able to keep the village centre free from slipping hazards during the coming months.

Please come and join us on a Saturday morning at 10.00am when we can guarantee meeting up with a small but lively group of volunteers and a cup of coffee afterwards.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN NOVEMBER

As I write these notes (16th October) we have already had our second ground frost! Although it is not unusual to have our first ground frost by the end of October, I think this is a record! What does it mean? Folklore would suggest that early frost combined with such a big crop of wild fruit in our hedgerows indicates a hard winter ahead. There is no science to support this of course but who knows how our winter will turn out?

Once again I am being asked whether dahlias planted in garden soil should be lifted and stored over winter, or can they be left in situ, and if they survive, will they flower earlier? Any perennial plant with soft fleshy roots/tubers left in the soil over winter is vulnerable to attack by slugs and rotting diseases especially if it is a wet winter. Our heavy Tatsfield soil holds moisture and that increases the chances of damage. If we have a series of hard frosts and the soil freezes, that will also cause damage to soft fleshy roots. What are the chances of Tatsfield having a mild dry winter? I wouldn't bet on it!



I will be taking up and bringing into the greenhouse my dahlias, brugmansias (datura) fuchsias, cannas, begonias and abutilon, and putting them in trays, or pots, and covering them in old compost from my mangers and hanging baskets (if you do this make sure to check old compost for the dreaded vine weevil grubs). I will trim the tops and collect leaves as they fall off; I will mix sulphur powder into the compost and dust it over the tops of the plants. Over the winter months I will keep the compost dryish and regularly check for signs of damage or rotting applying more sulphur as needed.

Another garden query is, should roses be pruned back now? Vigorous roses can be trimmed back by half as part of the autumn garden tidy up, buddleias can also be trimmed back where they are hanging over borders or paths. This is not pruning! Cutting these plants hard back now could promote growth that can be damaged by winter frosts. Bear in mind that it is not a great idea to be too tidy as many plants are carrying a lot of seed that is a vital source of food for birds.

Then there is the question, can I stop mowing now? No, keep on mowing as long as the grass is growing! But make sure to mow the grass lightly, that is leaving it longer that you would in the summer months, it looks better and will not grow back so vigorously.

If you have planted violas and pansies make sure to check them weekly and remove the seed pods, this promotes flower buds in the milder periods over winter. Producing seed pods take a huge amount of energy and this is what inhibits the production of flower buds.

A final autumn tip is to get your bulbs planted now to make sure they root properly and make sturdy growth as soon as the weather improves in early spring.



THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – NOVEMBER 2023

As astronomers know only too well, planets are a bit like buses, you can wait for ages and then four come along at once. Both planets that are the so-called gas giants are now visible in the evening skies though Jupiter is very much brighter than Saturn. By coincidence both planets that we refer to as ice giants, Uranus and Neptune, are also evening objects but sadly are too faint to be seen without a telescope from our light polluted skies. From a dark site Uranus should be visible which begs the question of why it was never recorded as a "wandering star" by the ancients who knew very well about the other five solar system bodies Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn.

Jupiter is the brightest and largest of the four (indeed the largest of all the planets) and is well known for its bands of clouds and its Great Red Spot. This is an anticyclonic storm that is thought to have existed for possibly 350 years although there is some confusion about whether early astronomers were looking at an altogether different spot. The planet is mostly composed of hydrogen and helium gas, hence the nickname, but has a small core of rock and ice. Unbeknown to most people it has a faint ring system but unlike Saturn the three rings of Jupiter (there may possibly be four) are made up of dust rather than of ice particles. The four brightest moons, named the Galilean moons after Galileo who first recorded them, can be seen with small telescopes and binoculars although binoculars either need to be mounted on a tripod or supported in some other way.

Saturn is a little smaller than Jupiter and the cloud belts are far more subtle than its larger neighbour. However, that is more than compensated for by the impressive ring system that makes the planet a favourite with seasoned astronomers and casual observers alike. It has a vast selection of Moons with the largest being Titan which is easy to observe and photograph with a modest telescope and a regular DSLR or mirrorless camera.



So where can you find Jupiter and Saturn in the evening sky? The map is drawn for midmonth at 7:30pm. The planets move very little with relation to the stars during the month, so the map is valid throughout November. What you will have to be aware

of is that the gradual rotation of the sky carries everything (or nearly everything) towards the west (the right if looking south) so you will need to make an allowance if you view earlier or later in the month.

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

Back in July, Jon (Allbutt) sent me a sound recording of an unknown bird, asking whether I thought it was a **Ring-necked parakeet**. Was I able to help? Unfortunately not, although I did agree that he may well be right with his identification. A couple of weeks later I received confirmation:

'Nigel, I have sorted it! On the advice of the Yeeles', I downloaded the Merlin Bird ID App and straightaway it identified it as a single parakeet calling the group, probably an adult male. The *****s have damaged my latest, very expensive, six port feeder holding sunflower hearts for goldfinches!'

Whoops – I'm guessing you're not a fan of Ring-necked parakeets, Jon! Strangely, as previously mentioned, although only a few hundred feet from your garden (as the rook flies), I rarely see them. Send a few over, I could do with some colour in the garden.

In August, Mary (Smith) spotted an unusual butterfly. A rarity, perhaps, blown over from European shores on warm continental air? (05.09.23):

'I went out to see a very strange looking butterfly which had settled on a flower in the garden. It was unlike anything I had seen before and I had to identify it from the 'Oxford Book of Insects'. It turned out to be a **Cream-spot tiger** moth. In the book, admittedly over 40 years old, it said they are common in southern England and fly in late May and June at night. This one was flying at midday in the third week of August!'

Moths are so underrated. I guess it's because they flutter around while we are all in the land of nod. This makes them all the more interesting when they <u>do</u> appear during daylight. I was also very excited to see a beautiful, unknown moth this summer and like you, Mary, went diving into a book to discover what I'd seen. It turned out to be a **Large yellow underwing**. The problem with generalist identification guides, like mine, is that they show a representative selection of species; the ones most likely to be seen. In my book this tallies around 140. Quite a lot, you may think. But, to my amazement, I have recently discovered that there are over <u>2,500</u> species of moth to be found in our United Kingdom! I find that Incredible, particularly when, within my lifetime, I've probably only ever seen a dozen or so species. Perhaps, as village naturalists, we should pay more attention to moths? We spend a lot of time talking about butterflies (of which there are 59 species seen regularly in the UK) so perhaps now is the time to redress the balance? Let's have more moth news. Send in reports of any sightings and we'll form a village register. (Photos are nice but written or oral reports are good enough.)

In September, both Ian and Doris (Mitchell) got in touch, forwarding more video recordings (26 – 27.09.23). Doris thought the captured images might be of a Nightingale. It was at around 7.15 in the evening. The image was not in colour. Could it be the evasive Nightingale, previously unseen in Tatsfield? Identification was not straightforward but the more I looked at the recording, the surer I was that it was a Robin. Why? Although in monochrome, the brown (grey in the video) colouration on the bird's back and head was above the eye and clear of the beak. This is true for a Robin. A Nightingale has a brown

back that extends across the eye to the bill, covering the upper head. I think the white chest and underbody was simply how the camera recorded the colours in poor light conditions. During daylight I felt sure that the red of the breast would have been apparent, albeit a different shade of grey. That was my opinion. Doris soon responded:

'I guess you are right. It might well be a Robin. Nightingales should have gone south by now anyway. At night the Robin's front should be light in colour in the infrared light of the camera, which our bird is, unlike the picture in the attachment. That photo is simply a colour photo turned black and white. Basically I agree with you. It would have been nice if it were a Nightingale. I have never seen one or knowingly heard one.'

If you should happen to see or hear a Nightingale, Doris, please contact me immediately and I will come running!

Doris (Mitchell) was back in October (01.10.23):

'Reading about starlings in your Parish Magazine article reminded of the ones that come visiting here every day this summer/autumn. We have this old butler's sink in the garden, which was there when we bought the house more than 40 years ago. In July I put a few of the clips from the camera there together into a short video, low resolution so I can send it by email. I particularly like the starling's scene, about 1.25 minutes in, where a pushy youngster gets ticked off by an adult!'



Great video, Doris! I didn't expect such a variety of subjects. (I'm sure that Doris would be happy to forward the video to any interested readers.)

It's mushroom/toadstool/fungi time and I'm hoping we'll receive a few photos of interesting specimens found locally. We had a photo taken <u>last</u> November by Kathleen Grant and forwarded to us via Martin Allen. It was of a **Fly agaric** found on Westmore Green. Its name comes from its historic use as a natural form of pest control. Chunks of the mushroom would be chopped up, then crushed and steeped in a bowl of milk to form a tasty but deadly trap for flies and other insects. (And for unknowing humans. **You've been warned!**)

TATSFIELD A CENTURY AGO



If you leaf through local newspapers from a century ago it is easy to forget that Tatsfield's population was less than half today's size, but village organisations were just as busy as they are now.

On one Wednesday evening in November 1923, for instance, the Choral Society gave a performance of the one-act opera, Cavalleria Rusticana. Two dozen singers performed with full stage and scenic effects. The Westerham Herald concluded that the "beautiful scenery painted and arranged by society members, together with the picturesque costumes of the singers made a delightful picture as viewed from the back of the hall". The whole performance was repeated in the village hall four days later.

In the 1920s, as well as the Church School in Tatsfield, there was also a preparatory school in Ricketts Hill Road, run by Frederick Meakin. An advertisement in the Westerham Herald said it had accommodation for weekly boarders. This was clearly a successful enterprise for within a few years the school – now known as Rosedene – was being promoted as changing from being a preparatory into a private co-educational secondary school with boys and girls remaining there until the end of their school days. Teaching was run on 'modern lines' with examinations each term set by the "Parents' National Education Union", an organisation set up in late Victorian times to provide resources and support for teachers and for parents teaching their children at home.

There is also mention in our archives of a school called Etheldene in the same part of Tatsfield. Maybe this was an earlier – or later name for Rosedene. Once again, we'd be delighted to hear from anyone whose family records can provide more information.
