Sheree's Store: Sheree and her team will make up food packages and get them delivered to your door 7 days a week. You can phone the shop on **01959 928181** or phone/message Sheree direct on **07727 418968** with your orders. Sheree and Simon are keeping the store fully stocked with bread, milk, tinned food, paracetamol and other basic medicines, toilet rolls, soaps, newspapers and all your basic needs. They take payments over the phone so no need to panic about needing cash available.

Post Office: If you have a parcel or Letter delivered to the Post Office which you cannot collect, please phone them on **01959 575549** and they will arrange to get it delivered to your door.

Check your neighbours: Could we please ask the residents of Tatsfield to look out for each other during these difficult times. If you have a neighbour who lives alone, please check on them or make the Parish Council or Sheree aware so we can get in contact and provide assistance.

Dear Editors,

The Titsey Estate – Titsey Hill, March 2020

The Titsey Estate as part of its Woodland Management Plan, approved by the Forestry Commission, is carrying out woodland operations in and around Titsey Hill. This is mainly due to a large number of ash trees that are suffering from Ash Dieback (Chalara) and an aging row of Beech trees that require remedial works. These trees are becoming increasingly dangerous and, in particular, they must be made safe within falling distance of the road.

These works will take place over the coming weeks and are being carried out to UK Forestry Standards. The works are part of a wider plan to regenerate the woodlands and promote biodiversity through habitat restoration, as well as supplying timber for local markets.

Members of the public are urged to be cautious and to follow any signage advising them to keep clear of certain areas, particularly around Titsey Hill. There will be an emergency road and footpath closure during this time to ensure safety of members of the public, and Titsey Hill may be closed for a number of days. We are unsure of timings at present because of the weather but please keep an eye out for signs and advanced warning notices of closure.

TATSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Monday 9th March. At least on this occasion the weather had improved after all the recent storms and incessant rain.

Kim Jennings our Chairman had reluctantly given her apologies so, as in February, I again chaired the meeting. Regrettably, I had the unenviable task of opening the meeting by referring to two really sad events. After reporting the sad death of Wendy Maddison at the previous meeting, on this occasion it was the sad passing of Carol Jordan and Tina Miles. Both had been long-standing friends to many people in Tatsfield. Carol had been a Parish Councillor, a school governor, a Trustee of Citizens Advice and founding member and Secretary of the Village Hall Management Committee. She was also a leading light of the Food and Wine Society as well as the Book Club. Tina was one of Kim's very best friends, a life-long member of the Tatsfield Club and a founder member of Tatty Knitters. Sincere condolences were expressed to their families and friends; both Carol and Tina will be sorely missed.

Planning

The Parish Council considered six planning applications in February:

TA/2020/167 and TA/2020/202 – Clacket Lane Motorway Services TN16 2ER. Erection of two digital advertising boards one on either side of the motorway between the parking areas and the service station entrances. Screens to be above head height, neither to be visible from the motorway or Clacket Lane. The PC had no comment.

TA/2020/265 – Westwood Farm Barn, Clacket Lane TN16 2EP. Change of use of a small timber barn into office accommodation without changing the form or character of the existing building. The PC had no comment.

TA/2020/283 – 47 Paynesfield Road TN16 2BG. Replacement of existing single-storey conservatory with larger conservatory. Same width and distance from boundary but longer into the back garden. The PC had no comment.

TA/2019/359 – 29 Westmore Road TN16 2BD. Conversion of existing garage to study and bedroom within the defined village. A previous application to replace the garage had been refused. The PC had no comment.

TA/2019/1711 – 50 Crossways TN16 2BW. Appeal against previous decision of TPC and TDC to refuse the erection of fencing. The PC continues to oppose these plans and will ask the Inspector to dismiss this appeal. The proposed fencing is out of context in a rural setting on a prominent street corner. Furthermore, the sleepers laid down 2 years ago encroached on the public highway narrowing the road and causing obstruction, also causing the loss of the grass verge. The PC agreed to raise this encroachment issue again with SCC to seek enforcement of the replacement of the grass verge.

Tatsfield in Bloom

I am sure that everybody will be pleased to hear that the situation regarding insurance for our worthy band of volunteers has been resolved after a period of real uncertainty. As most of you will know it transpired that, unbeknown to us all, the presumed insurance covering Tatsfield in Bloom (TIB) volunteers did not exist after all. After a huge amount of work to get to the bottom of this, mainly by Sam our TPC clerk, and several hastilycalled meetings involving TIB and TPC representatives, TIB insurance is now in place. Massive thanks to Stephen Mittens for arranging what is now a separate TIB policy. TPC has agreed to fund this year's premium. For clarity, it has now been established that TIB is a volunteer group that carries out horticultural activities within the Parish with the gratitude and grant-based financial support of the Parish Council but are NOT employees of the council. Many thanks to John Allbutt, Bob David and Pam Bishop for helping us get this matter resolved and of course to the volunteer team for all the hard work that they continue to do to keep our village looking the way it does. See you all on Saturday....

Tatsfield Beer Festival

TPC were delighted once again to agree to plans submitted for the Annual Beer Festival on Westmore Green which will be held this year on Saturday 12th September. It will follow the same format as in previous years and subject to the same conditions. Advertising will be displayed for two weeks prior to the event. Please put the date in your diaries now...and let us hope for similar weather to last year!

Fairtrade

Jason Syrett got all our taste buds going when reporting on the Fairtrade Group's recent Chocolate Morning in the Village Hall. He particularly highlighted the inspirational talk given by a lady called Rosine Bekoin from the Cote D'Ivoire about her drive and passion to establish her own cocoa farm. A brilliant morning for all those lucky enough to attend.

Closure of Ricketts Hill Road (RHR)

A member of the public expressed real concern about the wholly inadequate arrangements for the closure of Ricketts Hill Road on Monday 9th March, extending possibly to the end of that week. He quoted some appalling examples of traffic problems that had ensued that day, most of which could have been avoided with better planning, including the bus having to turn round in RHR, congestion in Lusted Hall Lane and diversions all the way to Westerham. Cllr Becky Rush, our Surrey CC colleague was in attendance and promised to take the matter up with Highways.

Policies

A number of policies were finalised and approved including, most importantly, a revised TPC Emergency Plan which will be circulated to all those involved. Most recently, of course, and since our TPC meeting, coronavirus has affected all of our thinking and support for all those in the village who may need it in the coming weeks and months will be crucial. Thanks to several councillors and others, we have now published a document headed Coronavirus: Community Support Advice which appears in full elsewhere in this edition of the Parish Magazine. It will also be delivered to residents. We have had

tremendous support from Sheree's store and the Post Office so nobody should go short. Do please look out for friends and neighbours who may need support. There will regular updates on Tatsfield Talk.

TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

The Local Government Association is continuing to work with the Council on Governance and Strategic Planning to ensure better transparency and trust in the future.



Unfortunately, due to the Coronavirus situation a working group that was due to be held on 13th March was postponed so we have had to put this part of the improvement strategy on hold.

An emergency staffing meeting with CEO of TDC was held as part of a Group Leaders' Update on the Wednesday 11th and it was good news that the structure of the Council was being remodelled and new appointments and structures will return the council to a responsible working model again.

A Housing Meeting that was due on 12th March was completed and some important strategy in regard to Housing in the district was agreed going forward.

Council tax bills have recently arrived and included inside was a Leaflet from the Police and Crime Commissioner/Police in which it was confirmed that the promise the PCC made about increased staffing within the Police service in Surrey as a result of last year's increase has been made and further promises regrading increasing in staff will come in to effect during this tax year. Good news for us all.

I attended Kemsley Copse with Thames Water and TDC regarding the on-going flooding issue down in the unmade part of Westmore Road. Thames Water has agreed to come back with their response and a set of actions going forward.

I am pleased to advise that a good working and financial arrangement has been agreed between Tatsfield Parish, Surrey County, Tandridge District and your District councillor which has seen the Corner of Crossways and Westmore Green be reinstated and is now much safer for pedestrians walking along here and some good and positive reports have already been received.

Also pleasing to see that Old Lane has finally been repaired to some level although I have asked our current County Councillor to check what they previously had



said in that these roads have a ten year guarantee and should be repaired an no cost to the council tax payers - we will see what the response is shortly.

I am still receiving reports of multiple "overflying" which I am checking. Cllr Pinchin and I are meeting with the CEO of Biggin Hill Airport in April and will pursue this issue further.

On 3rd March the Appeal Notice on the Appeal Ref: APP/M3645/W/19/3232423 Land between Downalong and The Retreat, Kemsley Road, Tatsfield, Surrey TN16 2BH was announced and the Inspector dismissed the appeal. It was therefore pleasing to see that the inspector had taken the view to protect the Green Belt around the village.

The Tandridge magazine will have arrived by the time I write this and it contains lots of helpful and council related issues - especially about what can go in which bin. I am still seeing many plastic bags being left out and they will definitely not be collected so please read all of the guidelines within the magazine.

POLICING

Hello Tatsfield, nice to see the village in full bloom. Hopefully by the time these words are read, we will all still be allowed out and not in lockdown or self-isolating.

In these uncertain times, we on the local team will do our utmost to keep law and order on a week-to-week basis, whilst trying to stay safe ourselves in order to serve you.

On the crime front in the village, things currently have been good, dare I say - quiet. Back in February, a storage area to the rear of The Village Club was deliberately set alight. CCTV footage and local knowledge confirmed a local youngster was responsible and was named. Thankfully the matter has been resolved with the club internally and quickly.

In March a local resident called in reporting a number of scrambler bikes racing with each other with riders without helmets on Chestnut Avenue. They were seen twice on the same day.

If any residents see anything similar, please call in immediately with the location and any description of riders and bikes. Hopefully this was a one-off sighting that day.

Finally, a vehicle was stopped by a police vehicle on patrol outside the parish church on Church Hill, with the driver receiving a fine for cannabis possession.

Following a series of recent shed/garage breaks in the Caterham area, please keep your own locked and secured at all times, with serialised equipment registered on Immobilise.com.

So, not too much happening recently (hope that becomes a trend). Please conduct welfare checks on any elderly neighbours, in these worrying and unpredictable times.

KIDS: I know you've heard it a million times before, but......PLEASE wash your hands after doing anything that may make them unclean, and always before eating. Well Done!!

Catalytic converters

There have been a continuing series of catalytic converter thefts in our

area. There have been ongoing incidents in surrounding Surrey Boroughs and across the border in Kent and Sussex. We do not have resources available to use decoy vehicles and covert surveillance for this type of crime as some people have suggested but we are taking steps to track down the offenders. A specific tasking has been created for the Area Patrol Team and unmarked patrol cars are operating in our area. The vehicles these offenders use are driven on stolen index plates which are frequently switched.

You can assist us by reporting all such crimes so that we can maintain a comprehensive log of where they are taking place. Ring 999 immediately if you see a theft in progress in order to give us a chance to deploy officers. In addition, the more people who help us to combat index plate theft by fitting tamper proof plates to their vehicles the better. We were recently able to give a supply away free across Tandridge and now have a few more to distribute. However, they are sold on-line and at motor accessory stores like Halfords for around £1.99 per pack. They are well worth fitting.

Rest assured we are taking these issues seriously and my officers are working hard to do all they can to catch the people involved.

A BUSY FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT AT TATSFIELD SCHOOL

Whole school display showing COCOA'S journey from BEAN to BAR

The children at Tatsfield School did lots of learning about Cocoa farming and Living Incomes during Fairtrade Fortnight and at an assembly on 6th March the children shared all they had learned.

Children in Wren class designed their own chocolate bars and made Fairtrade chocolate crispy cakes.

Robins found out how chocolate is made while Kingfishers read a story about 'Guardians of the Rainforest' based on a Fairtrade film of the same name. Kestrels made electronic board games with questions about Fairtrade.



Woodpeckers looked at the journey of cocoa from bean to bar and cooked Fairtrade cakes and biscuits which they then served at a Family Afternoon Tea.

The children in Eagle class looked at the nature and impact of power imbalances in the cocoa supply chain. They illustrated this by dividing up a non-Fairtrade chocolate bar to show who gets what in the cocoa supply chain.



one square (5%) the farmer.

four squares (15%) the company who produces cocoa butter from the cocoa beans.

ten squares (40%) the chocolate bar manufacturer.

eight squares (35%) the retailer.

The children then shared that they had watched a video which explained how Fairtrade is working towards improving the amount of money the cocoa farmers receive and how improving conditions for the women farmers has a positive impact on the whole community.

Beethoven 250 – A Celebration: The concert has been postponed due to the current global situation. We will of course advise you when it has been rescheduled.

Ludwig van Beethoven was the greatest composer of his era, perhaps of all time. He died when he was 57, but 2020 marks the 250th anniversary of his birth, so it is only right that NDS should mark this auspicious date with a concert celebrating his works. The concert will start with his 'Creatures of Prometheus' overture. Although the rest of the music from this, his only ballet, is rarely played, the overture has remained popular, an oft-played piece of easier, lighter Beethoven.

Haydn wrote his 99th symphony (one of the twelve 'London' symphonies, so called because he wrote them following an invitation by the impresario Salomon to visit London, which he did twice, to great acclaim) whilst he was tutoring Beethoven, an uneasy relationship for both great men. It features clarinets for the first time – they had only just been invented – and the result is a masterpiece.

The second half consists of Beethoven's great masterpiece, the violin concerto. It has become recognised as one of the greatest of all violin concertos. The soloist is Haru Ushigusa, who played the 'Lark Ascending' in the English concert of November 2018. If you miss this, you will miss a treat! Haru's musicality and virtuosity has won her many prizes, including the entrance scholarship to the Royal Academy of Music and the Foundation Award. She has also had masterclass opportunities with the violin greats Maxim Vengerov and Tasmin Little.

The concert will be conducted by Francis Griffin, who often conducts the orchestra.

Recycling Walking and Personal Aids

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO THIS MONTH



In last October's magazine, I described the work of the mental health reformer, Dr Caesar Dudley Sherrard of Lusted Hall Farm. It was in 1919 that he had put his farm on the market. Six months later, at the end of April 1920, he died at the age of 67. Born in Cork and graduate of Dublin University, he was described as a famous 'alienist' - the name given to the 19th century specialists in the early days of psychoanalysis as they studied 'mental alienation' or illness. Over nearly a quarter of a century he became more and more part of the Tatsfield community. Here he is pictured as President of the Working Men's Club.

He developed Lusted Hall as a 'farm colony', where patients experienced a totally different environment from the institutions to which most were assigned in those days.

Lusted Hall Farm straddles the border between Surrey and what was then Kent. So it was that in 1904 Dr Sherrard fell foul of the law on swine fever when he was fine £3 for moving a pig from one county to another without a licence!

Another 'sign of the times' in April 1920 was a court appearance by another Tatsfield resident. He, like so many parents in those days, was fined for not sending his child to school. Although state education had been free for a generation, some expense was necessarily involved and children were often needed to help at home.



Surrey County Council's History Centre in Woking is the ultimate custodian of historic documents and archives in the county. Just published is the result of Surrey Heritage's project, *Surrey in the Great War: A County Remembers.* This illustrated book explores the wartime stories of Surrey's people and places and chronicles the project's discoveries, telling the stories of the mobilisation of Surrey men, the training of foreign troops in the county, objection to military service, defence against invasion, voluntary work and fundraising, the experiences of women and children, shortages, industrial supply to the armed forces and the commemoration of Surrey's dead.

UNWRAPPING A STORY FROM AFRICA

On Saturday 29th February Tatsfield Fairtrade organised a wonderful Fairtrade Chocolate Brunch in the Village Hall. We feasted on bananas, banana bread, waffles and chocolate sauce,

hot chocolate and teas and coffees. A wide range of Fairtrade chocolate bars were both on display and available to enjoy, and later on Alizon Mooney reminded us of these delicious treats, and how we can so easily choose to buy them instead of non-Fairtrade chocolate. But the greatest treat was listening to Rosine Bekoin, a cocoa farmer from Cote d'Ivoire. Hilary Harber introduced Rosine, and from then on, we sat back and listened.....

'I am here to tell you my story,' she began.

With the excellent translation skills of Sam Platt, from the Fairtrade Foundation's campaigns team, we bore witness to Rosine's journey towards Fairtrade.

It all began with Rosine's grandmother who - most unusual for West African society - owned some land and wanted to hand it onto her granddaughter. The grandmother was the eldest daughter of her father, and she was determined that Rosine should inherit this land. A plot of 2.5 hectares.

This displeased Rosine's partner. Men have been the traditional landowners in Cote d'Ivoire. There were many struggles at home as tradition was being challenged.

None of her grandmother's brothers or sisters wanted Rosine to have this land, either. But eventually, a certificate from the Government was awarded enabling her to inherit the land.

In the 1980s, she had learnt from her grandmother how to grow cassava, manioc, bananas and cocoa when she was a schoolgirl. In 2010, Rosine was called in to see her grandmother who told her that she was giving her the cocoa plantation. So, Rosine started cultivating cocoa and selling it to anyone who would buy the cocoa pods. This was not making her any real income.

In 2015, she discovered the co-operative CAYAT, which advised her to join them as they belonged to Fairtrade. Where before, she had produced 450 kilos of cocoa, she was increasing her yield to 1.5 tonnes per year; due to improved agricultural techniques taught by CAYAT and healthy fertilisers. Plus, she was receiving the Fairtrade premium which she re-invested into local community projects.

Life was not easy with her partner. But Rosine made it very clear how much she loved him, and with their five children, she was determined to make the cocoa plantation a success, despite his misgivings.





CAYAT asked her to attend training sessions and then one day its director called on her to ask her to attend the Fairtrade Africa women's school of leadership. Rosine spoke no French at this time and was very ashamed of this and felt she could not fit in at such a grand place, far from her rural plantation in the south of Cote d'Ivoire. Her partner was not keen either! But she went, and it changed her: it empowered her, taught her self esteem and self confidence and that women have equal rights with men. She had grown up in a culture where women were subservient to men, not even speaking in front of them.

CAYAT had seen in Rosine a force for change, and she had taken up their call. She came home with her books from the women's school of leadership and showed them to her partner, and he began to see that what Rosine was doing was really important. He changed and really supported her now. He encouraged her to complete her diploma in leadership, which she did, and she returned to her village ready to lead other women. Rosine created a women's association in CAYAT, and she was elected its general secretary.

With the Fairtrade premium, the local school has had its roof mended; an hydraulic pump has been installed to save on the long walks to fetch water and a school canteen built providing lunch for the pupils instead of them walking back the 3km to their homes in the middle of the day to eat.

Plus, the premium has really helped local women with training in agriculture and in making them more independent. Fairtrade has completely changed Rosine's and other women's lives. Were it not for Fairtrade, she would not be here in the UK. Someone from the Fairtrade Foundation had visited her home in her village last year inviting her to come to England in order to speak about her life. But her visa did not arrive in time, so she had had to wait until now, 2020!

She spoke with such joy and passion about the real difference Fairtrade has made to her and her family's life. She was clearly delighted to be able to speak to us, and in French! She laughed as her story drew to its close. Her partner, she told us, had been worried that she might never return to Cote d'Ivoire if she visited England! So, twenty-five years after they had first met, he asked her to marry him!

Rosine, full of smiles, thus ended her tale, by saying she had Fairtrade to thank for her marriage! Lastly, she implored all of us to buy, buy, buy Fairtrade! And so, her story ends. But it continues all over the world, with Fairtrade trying to help farmers get a minimum fair price for their produce and a premium to re-invest back into their communities. The story is ours to tell, and we can make it bolder, and stronger by choosing to buy Fairtrade foods. By us paying a little more for these goods, farmers can be propelled onto a basic and fair payment for their produce. We as consumers can force this tale onwards by retelling it to others who may not realise how incredibly powerful the Fairtrade story is and needs to be.

After Rosine's words, Tandridge District Council chairman Jeremy Pursehouse spoke followed by Kim Jennings for the Parish Council. Barbara Hester, who orchestrated the whole event, was thanked and applauded by all of us. Plus, the amazing Fairtrade team who make these events so welcoming for us all. We had the final treat of browsing the

beautiful array of Fairtrade gifts that Moyna Bridge always brings to these gatherings. So, we did indeed end the story as Rosine had hoped - we did buy, buy, and buy.

Thank you to Barbara and all the Tatsfield Fairtrade team. Each and every one of you made the morning delicious! Eating ethically is very easy to do; we make the choices in what we buy, and how we write our own stories.

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – APRIL 2020

If you're an early riser you might want to look towards the south east around 5.30am to see three planets in close proximity. Jupiter is the brightest and the furthest west (to your right). Then comes Saturn followed by Mars as we look slightly further east, although on the 1st of April Mars and Saturn are just 1° apart which is two Moon diameters. Mars, being the closest to Earth of the three, is the fastest moving, a fact that becomes obvious after watching for a number of days. A waning crescent Moon joins the party on the 15th and 16th.

In the evening skies the brilliant Venus still dominates the west as we see the winter constellations like Orion and his retinue preparing to take their leave for another year.

The Apollo Story (Part 7)

When President Kennedy issued his famous challenge to America in May 1961 it was clear that nobody knew in any detail how they would go about "landing a man on the Moon and returning him safely to Earth".

Naturally political superiority was one of the key drivers with the USA having been beaten by Russia when they launched the first satellite and subsequently the first human into space. The first man on the Moon was an aspiration that the USA had to meet. That aside technological advancement must surely be where Apollo provided the most enduring legacy. It has been suggested that more than 6,000 technologies which influence our lives today were pioneered by the NASA program.

A computer was needed for the spacecraft but they filled entire rooms in those days so something smaller was needed. A company called Fairchild Semiconductor was experimenting with integrated circuits (so called micro-chips) and NASA ordered one million of them. Two of the company's employees would later go on to form Intel now famous for their processors amongst other things. CAT scanners that are used in cancer detection where first used to find faults in components made for the spacecraft. The joystick, so beloved by computer gamers, was first used to control the Lunar Rover. Scratch resistant coatings for astronaut's visors now appear on the lenses of our glasses. So the list goes on: water filters, smoke alarms, solar cells, freeze dried food and shoe insoles – all products of the technological race to the Moon.

It ought to be said though that several myths still exist about inventions that came about because of the space program. The most notable are Teflon and Velcro. The former was invented in the late 1930's in the USA and the latter in the 1940's in Switzerland although both were later used by NASA.

Of course it's both incorrect and impossible to measure the influence on the USA, and beyond, of a project with the complexity of Apollo by simply counting dollar bills. The photo "Earthrise" as seen by the Apollo 8 astronauts was the first time in human history that the Earth and Moon had been seen together in such a way with the pristine Earth "hovering over the pitted wreck that was the lunar landscape". And the now famous Apollo 17 image of the "blue marble" though it is still unclear who took it. Eugene Cernan summed it up later when he said "...and you can watch it turn and there's no strings holding it up, and it's moving in a blackness that is almost beyond conception." Surely viewing the Earth from space allowed us a new perspective on how fragile is the planet upon which we live.

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

Most of us are gardeners. We spend countless hours tending our plots, attempting to keep everything under control and looking 'nice'. We may even garden with wildlife in mind. But how many of us think of the *village* as a managed wildlife environment?

Acting locally to create positive change

As a newly-qualified primary school teacher I recall moving in to my very first classroom and displaying on the wall in two feet high, brightly coloured letters, the slogan - 'THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY'. I was energetic, keen and determined that my urban-dwelling class would become aware of the world they inhabited and how they, both individually and collectively, could make a difference. You don't like something? Okay; what are you going to do about it? It's so easy to find reasons not to do anything, to believe that change simply isn't possible. Fortunately, children are particularly good at resisting these negative beliefs. As we have seen in recent months, young people really do care about the world: *their* world. They are happy to march, they are happy to protest, they are happy to demand change. My young charges may not have marched but they were keen to create a garden outside the classroom window and cared passionately for the variety of living things we had around the room (lizards, gerbils, slugs!). Even the playground fighters agreed a truce and dug a shallow pond on an unused piece of land for the birds to bathe in. All they needed to become motivated was the initial spark. From that point onwards they took ownership of the idea. They organised themselves, scrounged materials, worked as a team, completed the project and cared for it. Of course, within a week they were back fighting, but their achievement was ongoing for all to enjoy and, most importantly, was a clear demonstration that they cared about wildlife and their local environment. How does all this relate to our village? Well, we also have areas of land, common land, that are unused; or rather, underused. The communal trees are cared for, the grassland is managed, the hedgerows are trimmed and for that we need to thank our Parish Council who organise and oversee such operations. But is it enough to simply manage? Perhaps we need to innovate?

Let us focus on and identify the various communal areas of grassland. We are fortunate enough to have numerous areas of grassed common land within our village: the Tatsfield Greens (along Ricketts Hill Road), The Square (along Paynesfield Road) and Westmore Green, which is effectively two greens divided by the approach road. The Tatsfield Greens constitute two areas of well-managed grassland, much of which is left uncut, and an area of mowed grass that hosts our Royal Oak. The Square is mown and traditionally used as a children's play area. The larger of the Westmore Greens incorporates the village pond, the formal children's playground and is regularly used for village events as well as games, picnics and general relaxation. The smaller green, alongside Approach Road and opposite the allotments, is mown grass and is rarely used apart from serving as an overflow car park during the Tatsfield Beer Festival. Let us now consider the possibility of improving this area of underused land.

I know a man who has the spark of an idea that hasn't yet lit the fire. Alongside others, I have been asked to contribute opinions and ideas on a number of occasions regarding the care and development of the village's natural environment. One idea that recurs and sticks in my mind is the development of a wildflower meadow; an idea initiated by Jon Allbutt. As we know, Jon is a passionate plantsman and conservationist. He must weep every time he looks onto that 'wasted' area of Westmore Green. What a fantastic site that would be for a wildflower meadow. Would the task be complex, requiring specialist knowledge? Undoubtedly. But the specialists are available. Would this involve great expense? Would the labour and material costs be prohibitive? Certainly not. In fact, according to Patrick Greenfield in The Guardian: 'The process is simple: cut infrequently, ideally just twice a year, in spring and then late summer once plants have bloomed and seeded; remove clippings to stop them turning to mulch, thereby gradually reducing the fertility of the soil; repeat, wait, and enjoy the resurgent wildlife.' Strange as it may seem, as soil fertility declines, the biodiversity increases. Fertility simply favours a few native plant species that then dominate and prevent others from emerging. In Dorset where this system of management has been widely introduced along verges and roadsides, butterflies and other invertebrates have returned in their droves. The seven hectares of verges along the Weymouth relief road sown with Kidney Vetch seeds have attracted more than half of the species of butterfly known to inhabit Britain. As Giles Nicholson (Dorset council's countryside and green space manager) points out, 'If you think about the species of butterfly that the Weymouth relief road supports on seven hectares, what would it be like on 100 hectares?' Tatsfield may not have 100 hectares to utilise, or even seven, but we could make a small difference; a small vet significant contribution towards the conservation of our native fauna and flora. As I mentioned in a previous paragraph, it's easy to find reasons *not* to do something, to believe that change simply isn't possible. But change on a local scale is possible. It's whether we have the interest and resolve to take action that is the vital question.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN APRIL

In early March I did manage to mow the lawn for the first time since November, I would normally have given it a cut once a month over the winter. Leaving it for such a long time without a cut will encourage the more vigorous coarse leaved grasses to dominate. The marathon of deep spiking with a garden fork last year has really paid off and the surface was quite firm underfoot, I will treat the moss (the worst for years), scarify it out after two weeks and then give it a light top dressing with sharp sand (drainage). After all that work the surface will look awful for a few weeks as the green sward re-establishes, and regular mowing commences.

The seemingly endless rain has been quite a topic of conversation but just how much rain did we have? Here is the summary of what happened in Tatsfield. The average long-term total rainfall from October to the end of February for our area is 409mm (nearly 16"), in Tatsfield we actually had 648mm (about 25")!! The average for March is 58mm and so far in Tatsfield we have already had 40mm. The long term total average annual rainfall for our area is 821mm; with 688mm already fallen, that leaves around 133mm left to fall between April and September that is not a lot of rain – (the long term average rainfall from April to September is 349mm), I wonder if this is the year that long term averages will have to be radically recalculated! All of our local reservoirs and groundwater aquifers are full now, but we will have to wait and see how this strange year of weather works out.

I have been asked to look at and advise on what to do about some very old apple trees in Tatsfield. Some are leaning badly; others may have a lot of decay in the trunk and main branches and also heavy crowns of tangled branches. These old trees will continue to grow and produce heavy crops of fruit but can suffer serious damage where the weight of top growth becomes too much for the weakened trunk and main branches. To reduce the risks of damage here are two steps to take – use heavy wooden posts to prop up the leaning trunk – in late summer reduce the top growth by up to 50%; I know this will result in loss of ripening fruit but doing it at this time of the year will reduce the amount of young growth that will follow heavy pruning. Over the next couple of years continue to thin out the young shoots to keep the top of the tree from re-growing a heavy crown.

This has been an excellent year for Primroses, Foxgloves and Cowslips in Tatsfield, I am seeing more and more in new locations including our gardens. If you want to encourage more of these lovely wildflowers, please do not cut them down after they have finished flowering. They need to develop their seed cases on the end of the old flower stalks, these will turn brown and split open to let the very fine seeds fall around the area – this process should be completed by the end of June. The seed will germinate, and the tiny seedlings will grow slowly, they can take up to two years to make a plant large enough to flower. If you want to start a new colony elsewhere then gather the seed heads in May, put them in a paper bag and leave in a warm place. Check them regularly and as soon as the seed cases have split open you can sow them in their new position.

Your Composting Site Needs You!

The composting site will be accepting green waste starting Saturday 4th April. However, we are starting the year seriously depleted in terms of the number of volunteers we have.

Last year Barry Bull had to hang up his composting hat due to health reasons. Barry has worked at the site since its inception in 2002 - an amazing contribution to this community project - and he deserves a huge vote of thanks from us all.

Three other volunteers who have also done long

years of service are carrying on gallantly but, obviously, can't go on forever and another key player will be unable to start this year until much later in the season.

So, the long and the short of it is, if we want this amazing local facility to continue, we will need more people to help. I can't believe in this day and age, with all the talk of climate change and the need for sustainability, the people of Tatsfield will let the composting site wither on the vine. A tremendous amount of time, effort and money has been spent rebuilding the site for the future and it has been designed to be easily maintained for years to come.

If you have ever thought of helping out (and many people have said to me that they would be willing) now is the time to turn words into deeds. *See contact details below.*

Hints and Tips for using the composting site:

- Please separate waste three-ways into soft green which doesn't need shredding, tough green for shredding and woody for shredding before you arrive.
- We will always try to take all your compostable waste but it helps us if you can try to limit it to no more than a large builder's bag or equivalent in any one week. If you have a larger amount please get in touch with me in advance. This will allow us to manage the waste more efficiently.
- Please keep any soil and especially stones out of any waste for shredding as these are both bad news for the shredders' blades.
- Using our compost will greatly improve your soil and helps us pay our bills!

Finally, if any young people are looking for a **Duke of Edinburgh volunteering opportunity** the composting site would be happy to have them along.

The film's story opens on 6 April 1917, with Lance Corporal Blake and Lance Corporal Schofield, British soldiers stationed in France, receiving new orders. They are to deliver a message to troops at the front line who are getting ready for an assault on the Germans, who have retreated. The British command, however, believes that the German withdrawal is a trap, an operational Trojan horse. The two messengers need to carry the dispatch ordering the waiting British troops to stand down, thereby saving countless lives (including Blake's own brother).

The film is directed by the highly regarded Sam Mendes and it is partly based on an account told to him by his paternal grandfather, Alfred Mendes. The film is unusual in that it appears to have been taken as a single continuous shot. It is very realistic and some may find it hard to take some scenes. The two main parts are played by actors whose names you may not be familiar with – George MacKay and Dean-Charles Chapman – but there are plenty of familiar names in the rest of the cast, including Colin Firth, Benedict Cumberbatch and Mark Strong.

TATSFIELD PARISH MAGAZINE – 25th ANNIVERSARY

Prior to April 1995 the Parish Magazine was published by the churches of the village. It went into about 300 of Tatsfield's 670 homes, detailing information about a wide range of village and church activities. It cost 30p. The Village Appraisal recommended that the magazine should be expanded into a village magazine, with the aim of achieving comprehensive coverage of village activities, regular monthly publication and the widest possible distribution. A group chaired by Colin Corke, the Parish Priest, was assembled to bring about this change. The members of the group – Bob David, Geoff Groom, Les Jackson, Pam Jay, Ken Munday, David Myers, Eileen Pearse and Rosemary Petrie oversaw the regeneration of the Magazine. The aim was that:

- The magazine would comprehensively cover village news, events and activities.
- It would be delivered free to every household in the village each month, with extra copies available to buy.
- Guaranteed 100% village distribution would encourage regular contributions from village organisations, external sources and individuals.
- Every village organization would benefit from the spread of information about their events and activities.
- The churches would continue to have overall responsibility, but the team to manage and produce it would be drawn from the village as a whole.
- The name Tatsfield Parish Magazine would be retained.

Producing the first issue was a mammoth task, but the group's efforts brought it to fruition in April 1995 – 56 pages, including 17 pages of advertising. By April 2005 each issue had 84 pages, including 31 pages of advertising. Twenty five years on, the magazine, now in colour, moves between 84-88 pages with 39 pages of advertising. Production is one thing (and so much easier these days with enhanced technology), but distribution is another. Without the scores of people who form the network that each month distribute and deliver the magazine, the aims could not have been achieved.

This month, April 2020, we had hoped to celebrate 25 years of the Tatsfield Parish Magazine. However global events have overtaken us, our planned celebrations are on hold and this issue is not the all singing, all dancing one we would have liked to present!

However, starting this month we will present a snapshot of what was happening in Tatsfield 25 years ago each month. We are also including a few cartoons drawn by David Myers over the years (in a later issue we will hopefully include a feature about David and his brilliant drawings). As you will see, not much has changed! Clubs and societies started, stopped, are still here. Concern for the village, its shops and, most importantly, its residents of all ages have been continuing themes. That wish to care for all members of the village community is as apparent this month as it was 25 years ago.

We would like to thank all those who have for years produced the Magazine. It has informed, entertained, allowed debate and we hope it will continue to do so. For now, we hope you enjoy reminiscing with us....
