Officer's Report

The clerk reported that the second precept payment had been received and we had also received a small Covid grant from TDC. The exterior works on the village hall will be carried out over several Saturdays. Starting before Christmas.

Planning

TA/2021/1701 Neville House, Edgar Road, TN16 2LL External alterations to include the insertion of roof lights and windows to the existing dwelling. *No Comment.*

TA/2021/1630 Parkwood, Rag Hill Road TN16 2LS Change of use from C3 (dwelling house) to residential supported living accommodation for children with associated extension of hardstanding to allow for additional parking spaces.

As there are no proposed extensions or external alterations, simply change of use and supported by a registered children's charity, there are no grounds for objection. *No comment.*

TA/2021/1792 Clarks Lane Farm, Clarks Lane, TN16 2JU Proposed replacement and roof to building including solar panels to roof. TPC supports the development of the Microbrewery. *No comment.*

APPEAL: APP/M3645/C/21/3281869. TA/ENF/2021/14 Russetts, Old Lane TN16 2LS Without planning permission, the erection of an extension to the garage. This matter has been under enforcement since 2018. *Members agreed that no further comment was needed.*

Platinum Jubilee

Jason Syrett reported that the Neighbourhood Plan Steering group is now up and running again after its break for COVID. The draft plan is now progressing and will soon be sent to TDC for comment. Following that it would be sent to PC for approval and then out for public consultation.

Westmore Green – Rose Cottage parking

The infringement of parking on Westmore Green has continued despite the PC interventions. A letter has now been sent to residents by TDC legal Department, to request that they desist parking on the green.

Grant payment to businesses affected by Covid Lockdowns

There is a final sum of £147,000 left from the Government grant systems that have been administered by the TDC and between Councillors and Officers we have decided that the fairest way of using up these funds is to administer a one-off top up payment to those micro-businesses and those occupying serviced offices who submitted an application under the summer scheme. This totals approximately 85 businesses across the district and will mean a one-off payment of approximately £1,500 per business.

The new Chief Executive of Tandridge District Council. Mr David Ford. accepted an invitation to visit Tatsfield and to see the village, to meet the Parish Council representatives, residents and some shop / business owners. This he did on the 11th November and he was welcomed by myself, The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Parish Council, Kim Jennings and David Pinchin along with Susan Smale, Ian Mitchell, Bob David and Dilogen de

Alwis. David joined us at 11am along with other villagers to lay a wreath and to commemorate Armistice Day with a twominute silence.

At the completion of this the Revd Vince Short gave a short blessing and then we all went off to the AMB for talks followed by a more informal lunch at The Ship. With thanks for the photos from David Bishop.

The shortfall in the TDC budget for 2022/23 is getting closer to a satisfactory conclusion and is looking more hopeful and final numbers will be presented to the Strategy & Resources meeting to be held in December.

Apart from attendances at my committees, in my role as group Leader I am now meeting with both officers and other group leaders separately to try and resolve the problems of the budget for the next five years which means a fundamental root and branch look at everything the Council does and how we do it.

There continues to be much correspondence between David Winstanley, David Pinchin and myself. There seems to be a clearer understanding that the 2nM turn and the extent of the NSA are no longer doing the job that was intended as there has been an increase of flights since its inception. The BHACC reported approximately a further 30 infringements of the NSA during the meeting David Pinchin and Lattended.

David and I will continue to monitor any breaches of the Noise Sensitive Area of Tatsfield.

I have been made aware that others like to see the Heritage Hangar aircraft and I want to confirm that I do as well, but I am merely asking them through due process to stay clear of the NSA of Tatsfield as was agreed back in 2018. If you have any comments on this, please do let me know.

Lastly and importantly for Tatsfield can I urge you to **support our local businesses** and **societies** in every way that you can. We rely on our local business so much and we need to show our support to them to ensure that they continue to operate through these hard times and prosper well into the future also.

And finally for 2021 may I wish you the best that is possible over this Christmas and the New Year.

If you'd like an independent view, I will be organising a Zoom event with Geoffrey Lean, our country's longest standing environmental journalist, where we will discuss the progress made at the Summit and what comes next. I also want to thank the 350 local residents who signed up to attend the Surrey-wide Virtual COP26 Climate Summit, which I hosted in late October. I was joined by a number of guests, such as Secretary of State Michael Gove and Sarah Jane Chimbwandira of the Surrey Wildlife Trust, to talk about the importance of biodiversity, the move to sustainable travel, and our local fight against climate change in Surrey.

An update - in the South East we will hopefully be receiving £495 million of funding for local roads maintenance - enough to fill over seven million potholes over the next three years - which after recent rain is all too needed!

It was a real delight to visit Pedrick's Zero Waste in Caterham Valley again recently, which was founded to help people reduce their plastic waste. TANDRIDGE NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Recently officers arrested a man and a woman on suspicion of deceiving an elderly victim, entering his home and stealing his property. The victim is now receiving support from the relevant agencies and the investigation is ongoing.

It is a good opportunity to remind people that it's always important to check and verify the identification of anyone

who comes to your house. If in doubt, contact the company they work for, a friend or relative to assist you or call the police if you think a crime is in progress. If you care for a family member or friend who may live alone, then I would encourage you to have this conversation with them.

We want to alert you to potential scammers. Please take some action to protect yourself and your loved one from becoming a victim of fraud.

Your bank or the police will never call you to ask you to verify your personal details or PIN by phone.

If you need to call your bank back to check, wait five minutes; fraudsters may stay on the line after you hang up. Alternatively, use a different line altogether to call your bank. Never share your PIN number, sort code or account number, or enter any of them onto a telephone keypad.

A genuine police officer will not be offended if you ask them to confirm their identity. Your debit or credit card is yours – don't let a stranger take it off you. You should only ever have to hand it over at your bank. If it's cancelled, you should destroy it yourself. Never transfer funds into a new account on the instruction of an unexpected caller – even if they tell you the account is in your name.

Please pass this prevention advice to your loved ones, especially those who are elderly or vulnerable.

In an emergency, ensure you are not in danger. If the danger is outside, stay inside (if it is safe to do so). If you or another person is in danger always call 999.

If you are asked to leave your home:

- Make sure you take your medication and, if possible, any medical equipment you need with you.
- Remember to tell family, friends and carers where you are going. If you are currently receiving visits from NHS or Social Care providers let them know where you have gone to.
- · Take your mobile phone and charger as well as key documents like ID and your purse/wallet.
- · Turn off your gas, electricity and water if it is safe to do so
- · Consider whether you need to take your pets with you.
- · Do any family and neighbours need help?
- · Do you have any family or friends you could stay with?

Tune in to local radio, TV and social media for advice and updates.

Returning home:

- Listen to advice from the emergency services and local authorities (e.g. advice about drinking water or power loss)
- · Contact your insurance company if needed
- Contact the relevant utility companies. If you turned off your gas it must be turned on again by a
 professional for safety reason

NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA CONCERT REVIEW 13TH NOVEMBER 2021

Having never seen the NDS before, I found myself eagerly anticipating this year's autumn concert - more so after reading what the orchestra had in store for us for the evening.

Full disclosure, I have a deep love of Shakespeare and was anxious to hear this rendition of Mendelssohn's "A Midsummer Night's Dream". Following a wondrous woodwind introduction to the overture, we found ourselves transported to Athens with the orchestra fervently guiding us through this fairyland, the untamed nature of which the

strings captured perfectly. Each sector wholly complimented one another and lead by their conductor Michael Hitchcock we were taken on a journey through this enchanted realm. The interplay between the orchestra in the overture and scherzo carried the pleasingly large audience until the very end.



France is our next stop with Gabriel Faure's "Masque et Bergamasques". In keeping with the theatrical theme, the NDS commanded us through Faure's re-worked masterpieceand I quite honestly didn't want it to end. Being largely unfamiliar with this piece I was apprehensive, but I can speak for everyone when I say that we were taken by this performance. From start to finish the orchestra effortlessly and readily carried each of the four movements of this piece. Michael demanded the best of each musician, and the best is what he was given - the strings came into their own with the woodwind supporting them all the way, maintaining a firm tempo which ensnared us until the last note was played.

Allowing us a brief interval we were all grateful for the tea (or wine) provided before settling into our last instalment of the evening; Haydn's symphony No. 104. This piece consisted of four movements and after a slow and teasing introduction, the orchestra descends into an organised chaos to exhibit this intense and rhythmic symphony. All instruments thrived during the performance of this piece, each given the opportunity to usurp the others. It was great to see the woodwind section break free of the strings and take precedence at times. Each musician noticeably enjoyed playing this piece and it was a pleasure to watch.

The dynamic of the NDS tonight was captivating and I thoroughly enjoyed being a part of it.

TATSFIELD MARTIAL ARTS

It's been a while since my last update, so we have a lot to tell you. We are now fully open following the restrictions imposed last year and earlier this year. We offer nine separate classes each week over three days, all at the Scout Hut (Thursdays to Saturdays). This is more classes than pre-Covid as we had to introduce additional childrens' judo classes on a Thursday to cope with the number of new starters.

JUDO

Most of our new starters have come from the U8 age group, and we run two U8 judo classes a week. These children all attended a grading back in September, for many it was their first grading, and all passed with flying colours and gained their shiny new belts.

Our O8 judo classes have been grading on an ad-hoc basis during classes. Since the return of judo, everyone has had one grading and some individuals have had two – with no judo for over a year, it is a case of playing catch up with the grades but without going too fast and over grading people.

Our adult judo class continues to grow. There are now fifteen on the register including five with black belts, plus we have several 14-year-old juniors who are starting to stay on with the adults – not every week, but slowly making the transition from junior to senior judo.

Outside of the club, we have continued with our strong relationship with Warlingham School and there are plans in place to start a regular judo session at the school.

I've also been busy regarding my own personal development. Just before lockdown one and after two years of training, assessments, and exams I qualified as a Senior Examiner for the BJA (British Judo Association). This means I can run black belt gradings and run technical development courses for other coaches / clubs on behalf of the BJA. I have also become Chairman for the Surrey County BJA Committee and fellow club coach, Andy Mumford, has taken on the role of Treasurer.

Finally, I'm pleased to say that our annual club competition will be starting back in February. This is a TMA organised competition that allows other clubs (clubs I have ties with) to also enter. Typically, we have between 70-80 children compete on the day. I'm really looking forward to this, one of my favourite club events.

JU-JITSU

The junior jujitsu class on a Friday evening has continued to grow and there are now 16 in the class. The senior class on a Thursday has twelve adults, most of who have been at the club for several years and are now higher graded students – some of which will be going for their black belts in 2022. Sunday 28th November is grading day for our jujitsu members; everyone has been working hard towards their next belts so I'm confident everyone will pass.

During November, we have been running a free beginner jujitsu course, the idea being that following the course people will join the regular classes – assuming they have

enjoyed it. We are presently halfway through the course and the numbers have been great and people have been returning, which can only be a good thing.

On Saturday 9th October, we ran a free self-defence seminar in the afternoon - around sixteen people attended. The feedback has been excellent, and this is definitely something we will be looking to do more of in 2022.

COMBAT FITNESS

Our Friday morning HIIT session has also grown in numbers, normally there are around eight of us ready to get a sweat on. No fighting or grading, just lots of pad work and martial art fitness-based drills to get ready for the weekend.



NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

For several years we had a gentleman coming in to the library (Oxted Public Library), normally about five minutes before closing, to photocopy various articles from our collection of daily newspapers. (These were the days when the Surrey Library Service could afford such luxuries.) He would rush off out several minutes after closing time, much to everyone's annoyance, leaving me wondering what it was that he felt the compulsion to copy and collect, and what he was doing with it. Well, having become that man in my own collecting habits, I now have answers. The only difference is that I cut or tear articles from publications (never books, I hasten to add) rather than photocopy them. And I don't inconvenience library staff at the end of their working day! The reason for this tearing and snipping is quite simple; there are frequently very informative and well-written articles to be found in disposable publications that would simply be lost if not gathered together by 'info-scavengers' such as myself. Not having any correspondence to review this month, I am devoting my allocated space to a few of these recent articles of interest. If you learn anything from this, let it be that, should you invite me into your home, it's probably best to hide your newspaper!

The bigger picture

While we wait for significant effects of global warming to become apparent, across the globe it's a reality. Lake Tuz, like other lakes in Turkey, has dried up as a consequence of climate induced drought, leading to the death of 5,000 flamingos. Meanwhile hundreds of fires have ripped through Siberia, fuelled by a heatwave and the worst draught in 150 years. "They have reached a catastrophic scale, offering a terrifying glimpse of a world ravaged by unchecked climate change". The largest in Russia's recorded history, the Siberian fires are bigger than all the other blazes in the world this year combined, burning an area larger than Portugal. The fires have pumped 800 million tonnes of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere since the start of June, which is more than the total annual emissions of Germany (Europe's biggest polluter). We seem to have reached a point where some aspects of global warming are simply beyond human control.

I have always thought that the British are basically a nation of animal lovers. I was shocked, therefore, to read a report about crowds hurling stones at a dying seal in Great Yarmouth. The police were called to protect it and to stop people taking selfies with the distressed animal. Meanwhile, across the planet, New Zealanders have been mourning the death of a lost whale calf. Specialists and hundreds of volunteers had tried to save the calf, but to no avail. Ian Angus from the Department of Conservation stated that, "Toa (the calf's given name) passed quickly, surrounded by love, with his last days made as comfortable as possible. This calf had captured hearts and no one wanted to believe that he didn't have a fighting chance. We will continue to treat Toa with the dignity and respect that he deserves." Shame on the Brits.

COP26 is over and once again world leaders, especially from richer, polluting nations, have failed to do enough to tackle the climate crisis. The U.N. blasted governments and businesses for utterly failing to meet their climate obligations The only reason we got

what little progress we did is because young people, Indigenous leaders, activists and countries on the climate frontline forced concessions that were grudgingly given. Fortunately, while the UK mainly talks about climate leadership, Costa Rica, Denmark and other nations are actually starting to take meaningful action. They've created the Beyond Oil and Gas Alliance; a coalition that commits to set an end date for oil and gas exploration and production in alignment with the Paris Agreement. What amazes me is that the 'obvious' isn't obvious to those in power. Or perhaps it is, but is simply being ignored. We need to be transitioning away from fossil fuels right now, but many of the richer nations, like the UK, are failing to take the necessary action. We are even planning to open a new coal mine! As mentioned last month, there were some terrific reports and programmes about alternative energies broadcast in the run-up to the COP Conference, including the experimental implementation of tidal generators. We are surrounded by tidal waters so let's get on and use this natural form of energy to at least provide some of our national power requirement. Meanwhile, as Boris pointed out, the clock is ticking. I wonder at what point the powers that be (and they are not all governmental) will realise that simply sitting back and watching the hands rotate is not going to save the planet. We need to cut emissions by around 45 percent below 2010 levels by 2030 to stay on track and limit the rise in temperature to below 1.5 degrees Celsius. Unfortunately, the timing of pledges to keep below 1.5 degrees is running out. "If we wait five years, 1.5 degrees Celsius is probably not achievable anymore," says Niklas Höhne, a partner at the New Climate Institute. "We have a huge task ahead of us, and that task has to start immediately after this conference." Thinking time is over – action time is now.

On the home front

There was a wonderful entry by Miriam Darlington in The Times', 'Nature Notebook', earlier this month. "A baritone hum was coming from the great oak tree by the river. Lit up in the sun, the green-gold branches shimmered with a miasma of strange insect life." (This is a reference to the European hornet; the docile, 'gentle-giant' of the wasp and bee clan whose sting is actually no worse than that of any other stinging insect.) "The loosely scattered veil of hornets shone where they caught the sun. I tipped my head back and marvelled, immersed in the tannin scent of the oak and the mesmerising buzz. Surrounded by the textures of whirring wings among bark, twig and leaf, the moment mingled its warm saffron with the honey rays through the leaves." Great, poetic writing, depicting the simple joys of being with nature.

A Merry Christmas to you all. I sincerely wish that 2022 proves to be a year of blossoming hope and renewed joy for us all. (And please remember to add, 'Contribute to Nature Notes', to your list of resolutions. You don't have to write as well as Miriam – I certainly don't, and I get away with it constantly!)

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – DECEMBER 2021

If, at the beginning of the month, you look towards the south and south west at around 5pm you will see three planets in a line quite close to the horizon. At that time in early December, the Sun will already have set and be 10° or thereabouts below the horizon which means we will be in the period known as nautical twilight. The sky will have darkened considerably by then and furthest from the horizon and due south at an altitude of 25° is the planet Jupiter. Now look more towards the south-west for a brilliant object that is even brighter than Jupiter but is just 10° high – this is Venus. If you draw a line between the two, then the considerably fainter object in the middle is Saturn. As the nights pass the three planets move generally westwards (to your right) until on the 21st/22nd Venus lies exactly in the south west, 7° high at 5pm. The diagram is drawn for the middle of the month and includes four bright stars named in italics. A crescent Moon is just to the south of the group on the 7th,8th and 9th providing a good photo opportunity.

By the last day of this year Mercury, the solar system's smallest planet, is beginning to put in an appearance close to Venus although it is much the fainter of the two.



I don't often discuss the daytime sky but it seems appropriate to mention briefly that the Sun is now awakening from what astronomers refer to as "solar minimum". The Sun's activity varies over an approximately eleven-year cycle with one of the most obvious signs of this being the variation in the number of sunspots visible in the layer of the Sun's atmosphere known as the photosphere.

On the 21st December the Earth reaches the winter solstice at precisely 3:59pm. That is the moment in time when the Sun is "lowest" in the sky. In this case we're not talking about its position with respect to the horizon when its rising or setting, were talking

about the Sun reaching its lowest "declination" of the year. All I'll say for now is that declination is the sky's equivalent of the Earth's latitude and that by the date of the winter solstice the Sun's declination will be -23%°. I'll cover celestial coordinates fully in a later article.

Although in the northern hemisphere the winter solstice brings the shortest day, in the southern hemisphere they will experience the longest day or to put it another way the most hours of daylight. If you happened to be on the Tropic of Capricorn, which crosses South America, Africa and Australia, on December 21st then the Sun would be exactly overhead.

To astronomers the winter solstice marks the first day of winter which ends on the day of the spring equinox which in 2022 will be March 20th. However, to a meteorologist the first day of winter is December 1st and the last day is the final day of February.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN DECEMBER

My weather station is still not fixed but I can confirm that by the middle of November we had only 7mm of rain, the long term average is 81mm, I think it is safe to predict a dry month with average temperatures. It is too early to forecast Christmas weather with any accuracy, at the moment the risk of snow on Christmas Day is very low, but it is early days yet!

I noticed that by late October there were large patches of moss on my lawn (my mini putting green), unusually early as moss prefers cool damp conditions to thrive. I was not surprised to discover that the underlying soil had become very compacted after a busy

year of use. I scarified the area three times – many barrow loads of moss and dead grass – and have now completed deep spiking it using a garden fork pushed all the way in, giving it a good wriggle and pulling it straight out again. I worked out that the area of around 50 square metres now has over 7,000 holes and has been thinly covered 25 bags of sharp sand. It has been thoroughly



raked and brushed several times a week and most of the sand has now disappeared down the holes; it will be interesting to see if the moss disappears.

I was contacted by a local gardener who was very distressed to discover that her lovely lawn had been turned into a ploughed field overnight! After much discussion and a thorough site inspection we deduced that the lawn was infested with leatherjackets (Daddy Long Legs). These soft, grey grubs about an inch long are commonly found in grass where they feed on the roots, but occasionally they occur in huge numbers. Badgers are experts at detecting the presence of grubs in grass and will bring the whole family for a feast and that is how her lawn was so badly damaged. No easy cure for this problem unfortunately; it is possible to buy a natural control called Nemasys – a sachet full of naturally occurring microscopic eelworms that attack grubs in the soil. The challenge when using this cure is to water them on when the soil is warm, around 10C and that means getting it into the soil in October.

What Christmas present to buy for a keen gardener? How about a composting box made of interlocking pieces of wood or recycled plastic that can be used again and again, available in garden centres or websites. Surprise them with a pot or two of the lovely garden perennial Christmas Rose (Helleborus), in flower and now available in our local garden centres (Coblands in Sundridge or one of the Knights Garden Centres). They are very happy in most soils, they love a bit of shade but also happy with a bit of sun; they also grow very well in Tatsfield soils.

We are working on this and will be announcing when our first 'social litterpick' will take place. If you have not registered your interest and would like to take part, please contact me. For those who help by picking up litter throughout the year, I will be in the village centre most Saturday mornings from 10.00am should you need any bags.

Many thanks to all the volunteers who have helped with the autumn planting.

We are continuing our work sessions on Saturday mornings and we would be very grateful for any help. Please come and join us at 10.00am on the Bakery lawn.

TATSFIELD A CENTURY AGO

At first sight, the record of life in Tatsfield in December 1921 suggests that the preoccupations of our predecessors were not all that different from ours a hundred years later. Housing, crime.



the roads – they all cropped up in the local papers. It's the scale of things and the subjects that matter that are different.

A mains water supply was a novelty in many parts of the village. The parish council was told that the cost of extending the supply from Paynesfield Road and down Johns Road to Old Lane would be £335 – that's £17,000 in today's money. This was judged to be too much. The rent for the new houses being built by the rural district council was announced at 12/9d a week – about £33 in today's money.

By 1921, the post-war boom was over and unemployment rising fast. One way of providing work for the unemployed was on the roads. 'School Corner', the junction of Ship Hill, Old Lane, Church Hill and Rag Hill Road, was given a hard surface. There was a district council scheme to widen the Approach Road. This was welcomed by Tatsfield's representative who pointed out that there was 'neither inlet nor outlet at Tatsfield as there ought to be, and unless the scheme as proposed was carried out Tatsfield would not develop'. Another member believed that 'Tatsfield would become an important place if what was contemplated were carried out'.

One big difference between then and now is the fact that Tatsfield had a resident policeman, but for the parish council that wasn't enough. There was disappointment when the local superintendent ruled that our population was too low to justify a second officer for the village. As it happened, at the end of the month, a Tatsfield crime made a headline. There was a robbery at a house in Maesmaur Road in which gold and silver jewellery and savings bank books were stolen. As the result of a successful investigation by a sergeant from Oxted, a prolific thief was arrested in Golders Green.

The former headmaster of Tatsfield School, Mr Adams, who had retired in March 1921, was in court at Oxted for failing to send his own child to school. He was now working at a school in London and his 11-year-old son was being taught at home by his mother, who was also a qualified teacher. This was not good enough for the county council, which decided that 'the mother having domestic duties to attend to could not devote sufficient time at regular intervals to the education of the child'.

Also in court was a local farmer accused of allowing his cattle to stray onto the highway in Tatsfield, despite strict controls on movement in and around Sevenoaks because of a post-war outbreak of foot and mouth disease.

Today's rivalry between Tatsfield and Limpsfield competing in South East in Bloom had its more traditional equivalent a century ago – football. Limpsfield came up to Tatsfield just before Christmas to suffer a 10-1 defeat and a few days later, Tatsfield beat Warlingham 5-0!

The month had begun on a positive note with a 'review in two acts' at the Village Hall. The Westerham Herald described 'splendid scenic effects', covering themes such as 'Tokyo', 'the Zuider Zee', the 'Old Bran Pie' from Canada, the 'Opium Den, Limehouse', a sketch entitled 'the Bathroom Door' and songs such as 'the Gypsy's Warning', 'Drake goes to Sea' and 'Oh By Jingo!'. On the next evening, an entirely different show was performed by the same team. It seems to have been a busy month for Tatsfielders.
