



LIN SAINES

As many of you will know my dear Lin passed away on 19th March this year.

For ten years she looked after our village horse trough and over the same period wrote articles on culinary herbs for the Parish Magazine and through this become well known and much loved by the villagers. She also did many talks on herbs



and medieval history to our WI group. More recently, she did talks to West Kent's Women's Institute meetings on the same subjects. At the same time, she maintained at Rye Castle a Medieval Garden, set up a stillroom there and wrote a booklet entitled "The Garden Beyond the Tower".

Lin was born and bought up in Lambeth, London by her parents Bill and Mary, also helped by her Aunt Margaret and her husband Fred. In between her school life, she worked at Dulwich Horse Riding School and worked her way up to become an Advanced Instructress awarded by the British Horse Society.

Lin went on to go to Cornwall where she set up her own horse-riding school for two years near Newquay. Later she returned to London where she met me in a meat importers office near Smithfield Market. We eventually got married and have been for 45 years. In her early married life, she worked for a building firm, an estate agent, a travel agency, a fashion designer and ended up running her own craft business called Madrigal for 10 years. Since then, her love for Cornwall never waned and we returned there often and spent loads of happy times together there.

Lin was a very knowledgeable and creative lady and had so much information to impart on many subjects. She was a giving person - preferring to give rather than receive. Her interests ranged from Medieval History to creating Herb Gardens. With all this knowledge she left me standing on many an occasion. These interests included cooking, gardening, walking, reading, photography and writing. She also planned and assisted me with many functions in the City of London with Taurus Lodge, the masonic Lodge of the Worshipful Company of Butchers. She was also a big animal lover and donated to various charities over the years.

Also, she had an article published in Cornwall Today on Tristan and Isolde, a love story from Cornwall. Sadly, Covid and her deteriorating health prevented her from carrying on with these activities. Lin is now in the hands of God relieving her from the indignity and pain of her cancer.

Lin was a very special person, she was my constant companion and friend, we shared everything together. We will all remember her with much love and affection.



TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

The makeup of **Tandridge District Council Committees** The Independent Group, of which I am the Leader retained seats on the Housing Committee where Jeremy is Chairman and Strategy & Resources - both important committees. I was asked to retain my role as Vice Chair of the Audit & Scrutiny Committee; and I also remain on the Community Services Committee; and I will represent Tandridge District Council on two outside (incl. BHACC) committee's and one internal committee. Judy Moore our third Independent from Felbridge remains on Planning Policy and will also represent her Ward on Working Group for the CIL and Gatwick Airport 2nd Runway application.

So, the Independents and the I&OLRG Alliance remain strong across the district - albeit as two separate groups.

The new Chief Executive David Ford now starting his second year is starting to put together a Management Team that he believes will see us through and over the dark periods of the past and will add strength and resilience to the Council for the future. We have unfortunately lost some senior and experienced staff but nonetheless continue to employ new staff that will not be burdened by the ravages of the past Customer First programme that was meant to "do good" but did not achieve this! But green shoots of recovery now seem to be in place.

I continue to attend and represent the interest of the villagers of Tatsfield and Titsey in the policy committees of the council and continue to stress to the new administration that the rural areas of the district are just as important as the Oxted, Caterham and Warlingham.

I continue to report and communicate with the CEO of Biggin Hill Airport regarding the "flying over the Noise Sensitive Area" of Tatsfield and will continue to report them until the incidents are few and far between.

Could you save on childcare costs? Tax-free childcare provides thousands of eligible working families with vital financial support towards the cost of their childcare with the government paying £240 million annually in top-up payments to families using the scheme. Parents and carers should check their eligibility and register for tax-free childcare via GOV.UK website.

Support for cost of living The government announced further help for people to deal with rising costs, especially around energy bills. Here we explain what the new support is, who will receive it, which organisation the payments are coming from and when:

- A one-off £650 payment to households which receive certain benefits, such as universal credit. The Department of Work and Pensions will pay it in two lump sums directly into the claimant's bank accounts in July and in the autumn.
- Increasing the energy bill payment from £200 to £400, which no longer has to be repaid. This will show as a credit on your monthly electricity bills starting from October. Customers with pre-payment meters will have the money applied to their meter or paid via a voucher.
- An additional £300 winter fuel payment for pensioners which will be paid as part of the annual winter fuel payment in November to December.
- An additional £150 disability cost of living payment will be paid directly to eligible people from September.

This support is in addition to the £150 council tax energy rebate we are paying to eligible households living in properties which are in council tax bands A to D. Currently, we have paid all eligible households who pay their council tax by direct debit. We are now arranging to pay non-direct debit payers who will shortly be receiving a letter from us.

Millions more households should be claiming benefits Government figures show up to seven and a half million households are missing out on £15 billion a year of means-tested benefits. Please remember benefits are not just for the unemployed. With the cost of living rising, make sure you're not missing out on benefits you may be entitled to. There is a benefits calculator on www.moneysavingsexpert.com which will show you what you might qualify for and how much you could get.

Do you need financial, health and welfare support? Residents who might be struggling to make ends meet can <u>visit the Surrey Crisis Fund webpage</u> to see if they can access emergency assistance for a variety of reasons. The community helpline and online hub can also provide advice over the phone and / or direct you to appropriate support.

- The <u>online hub</u> is available 24/7.
- The community helpline is **0300 2001008** and is open from 9am to 5pm on Monday to Friday, excluding bank holidays.

Reduce your food waste and save money If you're looking at ways to save money, why not start in the kitchen? It is estimated a staggering one in five bags of food shopping goes to waste each week! This is a substantial amount of food and money being wasted every day. There are some small, easy changes we can make to our daily habits that could make a big difference to your food bill and the planet too. For hints and tips visit the Surrey Environment Partnership website: www.surreyep.org.uk.

Are you over state pension age, or know someone who is? If you are you may be eligible to claim Pension Credit, even if you own your home or have savings. The government estimates up to one million pensioner households may be entitled to pension credit, but do not claim it. People who claim pension credit may also be able to get help with heating costs; help with rent and council tax; a free TV licence for those aged 75 or over; help with the cost of NHS services, such as NHS dentist treatment, glasses and transport costs for hospital appointments. Don't miss out, check your eligibility online, or call 0800 99 1234. Claiming pension credit is not complicated, but if you would like help, consider contacting Citizens Advice and Age UK.

Our local businesses need you I hear from the feedback from the Jubilee celebrations in the village over the weekend of 4th and 5th June that the support we gave to the businesses was outstanding so please continue to support our businesses through the normal times as well.

Supporting Ukrainian nationals We are working hard to support hosts and Ukrainian guests as well as working with faith, charity and community groups. There are currently 112 homes in the district matched with hosting 275 Ukrainian guests. So far, 148 guests have arrived, with 103 visas approved. There is a lot of information, support and guidance on our website. If you are organising an event, don't forget to add it, for free to our events listing.

Save the date On Ukrainian Independence Day Wednesday 24 August there will be an event for Ukrainian nationals and their hosts at Priory Park in Reigate. We will let you know more details once they are finalised.

Helping residents and Ukrainians find work The Oxted Job Club is supporting local residents and Ukrainians who have recently arrived into the district to find a suitable job (jobcluboxteddistrict@gmail.com). The support they provide includes: helping with CVs and job applications; preparing for interviews; deciding career objectives; and finding suitable companies.



North Tandridge Vehicle Thefts We are aware of a rise in vehicle thefts across the North of Tandridge. Please be assured that we are taking steps to tackle this by increasing patrols and are actively targeting those responsible. These crimes include but are not limited to: theft of motor vehicles (primarily high value makes such as Audi, BMW and Range Rover); theft from motor vehicles (valuables and tools

from work vans); theft of number plates – these are used by the offenders and rotated frequently. Suspects can be involved in organised crime and may use violence if approached. *Please do not approach them - make sure you're a safe distance from the suspects and call 999*. Give us as many details as possible about the suspects and their vehicle. This will give officers the best chance of tracking them down if they leave the area.

There are a few steps that can be taken to attempt to minimise the risk to your vehicles:

- Ensure your vehicle is locked and secured and do not leave any valuables/tools inside (and certainly not on show).
- If you own a keyless car, then store the keys in a Faraday Pouch.
- Purchase a steering wheel lock. Yes, these can be cut, however the majority of these crimes are committed because they can be done quickly and quietly, a lock takes away both of these advantages.
- If your vehicle is fitted with a tracker, make sure you know how to use it, or who to contact if you may need it.
- Report any suspicious activity to us immediately. Don't wait until you get home, call us on 999 if a crime is in progress.

Proposal to bring Gatwick Airport's northern runway into use Gatwick Airport is seeking the views of residents and the local community on its proposal to bring its existing northern runway into regular use. Gatwick began a six-week public consultation on Tuesday 14th June and it will end on Wednesday 27th July.

This consultation is focusing on the updated proposals following feedback from last year's consultation and further assessment work which has been carried out, such as:

- Design changes to planned highway improvements.
- Plans for office buildings, hotels and car parking, flood alleviation and airport layout.
- Updates on environmental impacts, such as carbon and noise.

Ethical Coffee Guide

There are so many coffee shops in every high street offering us more



and more choice when we seek a coffee to go or to share a moment with a friend. If, like me, you are keen to find an ethical option that is sustainable to people and planet, it can seem hard to make an informed decision. The Ethical Consumer Organisation has recently published a summary of their extensive research. They have taken into account many factors including how farmers are treated, how the land is farmed, transportation, use of plastics and the sustainability of the milk offered. They suggest you should:

- 1. Look for Fairtrade, Rainforest Alliance and Organic certification, or find places using direct trade models.
- 2. Look for coffee shops encouraging the use of reusable cups.
- 3. Look for organic milk.

When choosing a café there are tips for what to avoid if you are seeking a more ethical choice:

- 1. Does the company employ extensive tax avoidance schemes?
- 2. Try to avoid the large chains which often have complex supply chains and ownership, making it more difficult for you to know where your food and drink is coming from and where your money is going.
- 3. Does the café charge extra for going vegan?



TATSFIELD MARTIAL ARTS

It's been a busy few weeks for TMA. As well as running self-defence and personal protection classes at both Weald of Kent Grammar School and Bensham Manor School, we have had a number of club events taking place.

JU-JITSU GRADING On Saturday 18th June we held our first jujitsu grading for this week and saw over 70 students turn up and take their next steps towards their blacks. It was a hot day, but that didn't stop anyone from giving 100%. Aside from the technical examination based on our



grading syllabus, everyone was put through their pacing with loads of randori (sparring), bag work and nage komi (throwing practise). I am pleased to say that everyone passed and received their shiny new belts!

JUDO INTERCLUB COMPETITION On Sunday 26th June, we held our third interclub competition – our first since returning from lockdowns. This is my favourite club event of the year, and this year was our biggest one yet. We had 100 children taking part from six different judo clubs (all clubs I have ties with). The children are put into pools based on weight and age – everyone wins a medal. However, the colour of the medal depends on how well they perform (ie gold, silver or bronze). The objective of the club competition is to allow the children to experience competitive judo, but in a more relaxed environment. Competitive judo is tough and not for everyone and for many of the children our club competition will be their first experience of it, so it's important to make it a good one – with small pools, medals for all, familiar faces (coaches) etc. Everyone seemed to enjoy the event based on the feedback provided and TMA kids did the club proud, a great effort from every single one of them.

JU-JITSU BLACK BELT GRADING On Sunday 23rd July we are holding a black belt grading for two of our brown belts, Kevin Ruggins and Stewart Apps. A ju-jitsu black belt grading is extremely tough and will last around three hours, after which you will be black and blue for about a week. You are required to demonstrate every single technique in the grading syllabus and take part in full contact sparring – both standing and ground fighting. The sparring will be via a line up, meaning you fight one person straight after another with no resting in between – to put this into context, in my black belt line up I had 18 people (all brown and black belts), so that was 34 contests (18x standing then 18x groundwork) one straight after the other. You are not expected to win all the fights, but you are expected to get through the line up showing spirit and determination from start to finish. No one in the line up will take it easy on you, most have been through it themselves and want to make sure you receive the same treatment as they did! Kevin lives in the village and was a founding member of TMA, there on the very first day we opened in 2015. In 2019, Kevin gained his black belt in judo – so, he could hold multiple black belts in different martial arts which is quite a rare achievement. Update to come.

TATSFIELD SINGERS CONCERT 3RD JUNE 2022

What a cornucopia of song we were treated to on Saturday 3rd June, in celebration of Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. Under the skilful hands of their conductor Sarah Fryer the Tatsfield Singers gave us a bravura musical performance ranging from Finlandia to Waltzing Matilda.

The first half opened the evening with *Sing* which was specially written for the Silver Jubilee and apparently much liked by Her Majesty.

Then we were treated to a virtuoso violin performance by Eleanor Harber, after which the Singers gave us an a cappella rendition of the hymn *Be Still My Soul* from Sibelius' Finlandia which, for me, was very impressive.

A joyful interpretation of *Gonna Rise Up Singing* quite clearly showed that this was one that the Singers really enjoyed and then a complete change of tempo for *As Long As I Have Music* and *For The Love Of Music*.

But that wasn't all, not by a long chalk.

On came four of the Singers with their ukuleles to help play out the first half with *I'd Like To Teach the World to Sing*. What talent we have in Tatsfield and where on earth did they find the time to learn to play the uke and do the singing all at the same time!!



During the interval we were regaled with excellent sausage rolls and bubbly which comfortably settled us down to a second half of songs from the Commonwealth, starting with the specially composed Jubilee Song *Rise Up And Serve*.

This was followed by that quintessential favourite *Waltzing Matilda*. Amazingly, three ancient Swagmen, wearing their traditional bush hats complete with corks (no flies on them, then) were flown in from Australia at considerable expense and appeared on stage, replacing the three basses for this traditional Aussie song. For this particular

number the baton was handed to Alex Davies, a true Australian and former musical Director of the Singers. Welcome back, Alex.

In all there are 54 member countries of the Commonwealth, so it would have been impossible to include a song from each of them within the allowed time span. 

NIGEL'S NATURE NOTES

Steve Gaskell reports seeing an Eyed Hawk-moth at Springfield Cottage, (Westmore Rd):



(20.06.22) 'Father's Day present nestling in the herb patch (chives?) at midday. Very obliging photo model. Released later. Lifetime first for me, made my weekend.'

Well spotted, Steve. This is a great time of year to see moths. What will be next?

For quite some time now, the daily chirruping outside the kitchen has been telling me that **House Sparrows** are around. What I didn't realise was that,

after an absence of at least four decades, they were nesting in a gap between some tiles above the back door. I discovered this when I was potting-up a few plants in the sideway. The eggs had hatched and alarm calls were being sent by the adult male to warn the fledglings of my presence. This was a joyous discovery and, hopefully, an event that will be repeated next year. This is one maintenance job that 'Bob the Builder' will not be asked to fix!

Strangely, on the same day (29.05.22), I had two further surprises. Firstly, a flock of ten **Long-tailed tits** exploring and feeding in one of the larger acer trees and then, secondly, a garden visit from a **Lesser black-backed gull**! As previously stated, I find gull identification very difficult looking skywards. However, when one drops down onto the lawn to pick up some scraps I'd thrown out, that job of identification becomes somewhat easier. I can only assume that it was passing, happened to spot some little white specs on the otherwise green grass and decided to investigate. Unexpected and welcome.

My system of storing paper cuttings has failed. Somewhere (the recycling bin?) is an article about unusual birds having arrived from foreign parts and how this is a possible indicator of a hot, dry summer to come. Time will tell.

Michelle Hitchcock reminds us that if we are interested in protecting wildlife (which I feel sure we all are), we can find out how to become more active by going to this website: **www.follywildliferescue.org.uk**. They're even on Facebook. (So I'm told!)

It's summer, so let's get off the pavements and roads and on to the footpaths. There are plenty to follow locally and at this time of the year you won't even arrive home with dirty shoes. <u>Get out while the sun shines!</u> (Or should you prefer – 'Make hay'!)

THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIELD – JULY AND AUGUST 2022

Now that the summer solstice has passed, astronomers tend to look forward to the longer nights but have forgotten, thanks to the balmy summer evenings, that in general longer nights bring lower temperatures. However, before that happens let's remember that the major planets will be demanding of our attention as we see them transfer their allegiance to the evening skies as the year progresses.

If you are unlucky enough to be able to look, even briefly, at the early morning sky around 4:15 to 4:30am close to the middle of July (14th to 15th), you will see four bright planets, as well as the Moon, strung out across the sky from the north-north-east to the south-south-west. They are, from east to west (left to right) Venus, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn and the Moon. If you look a little later, the Moon is below Saturn on July 16th and below Jupiter on July 19th.

By mid-July, Saturn will rise close to the south-east, at around 10:30pm although you will need to be patient for it to move clear of the murk that lingers close to the horizon. As mentioned above it is still visible as dawn breaks. However, things are improving for the ringed planet because it will reach opposition early in August. This is when a planet, beyond the Earth's orbit, is at its closest to us so it appears at its largest and brightest.



By the time we reach mid-August, the brighter planets are beginning to appear late in the evening. Saturn, which lies furthest west now rises at sunset and by 10pm it has been joined by the considerably brighter Jupiter. The diagram shows the situation on August 16th at 11pm and gives the altitude of both planets. Remember from the horizon to the overhead point (zenith) is 90°. I have included Neptune for completeness although it is not a naked eye object.

In June we reached the summer solstice when we had the maximum number of hours of sunlight which, in some quarters, is referred to as mid-summers day. However, it may surprise you to know that just thirteen days later, on July 4th, the Earth will be as far away

from the Sun as it can possibly get. Surely, in the middle of summer, you would expect that we (in our elliptical orbit around the Sun) would be at our closest to our parent star but that isn't the case. In fact, the difference in distance between our closest and furthest point has an almost insignificant effect on the amount of heat that reaches us despite that variation being approximately five million kilometres. It is the tilt of the Earth's axis that plays the major role in how the seasons change and the temperatures vary. In the winter our planets north pole (which of course is the pole closest to the UK) is tilted away from the Sun which means sunlight strikes our part of the Earth at a very shallow angle, about 15° at midday. In the summer the north pole is tilted towards the Sun meaning it climbs higher in the sky. It is never overhead for us but it reaches an altitude of around 62° so that the effect of warming is much greater.

TATSFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY ANNUAL WISLEY VISIT, MAY 2022

Twenty two people arrived at the RHS Wisley Gardens ready for our group entry at 10am. It is an event we arrange every year as we are allowed one visit for up to 40 people with free entry with our affiliation to the RHS.

Wisley is the flagship garden of the RHS and one of the most visited and loved gardens attracting over a million visitors a year. There are 75 gardeners, 25 students and 4 apprentices, and over 100 volunteers. The gardens cover an area of 240 acres.

George Fergusson Wilson, a keen grower of fruit and orchids, bought the garden in 1878. After Wilson's death, Sir Thomas Hanbury purchased the garden along with a neighbouring farm and donated it to the RHS.

Fortunately the weather was warm for our visit; the sun was shining and I was greeted with lots of happy faces ready for the delightful experience which lay ahead. Some people had not visited since the new entrance has been created, and it really has turned out to be a quite a feat of engineering. We are allowed to enter the gardens with the allocated tickets, as and when you wish and not as a group. Some of us enjoyed coffees and then entered.

I was accompanying Syliva Hyett, and we teamed up with Sandy and Jon Allbutt. We were very fortunate, as we had our expert horticulturist on hand. The Stars of the Show on entering the peonies and we made sure we took lots of photos.

Sauntering on at our leisure we came across the massive 12 metre high Glass House, built to celebrate the RHS bicentenary. It covers an area equal to 10 tennis courts. Jon described the glasshouse construction and it was very interesting to hear how it was built and used recycled glass from the previous glasshouse. There was a vast pelargonium collection which showed how many different varieties and colours there are. The Tropical plants were enormous and unbelievable that you could be stood in such a jungle setting. We read that robins and wagtails are able to operate the automatic opening vents and make their nests in there - clever birds. There is also a Dry Arid garden section which is full of cactus and succulents.

Coming outside again for fresh air we walked over to the new Science Research block, called Hilltop. The views from the upper levels enticed us to stop for lunch-sandwiches and ice lollies. This building opened in 2021 and is home to their Scientists who are hard at work researching the issues that affect our everyday lives.

We wandered on to view the rose beds, but it is still a little early to get the full impact, but we were greeted with the Wisteria Arches in full bloom, complimented with the purple sensation alliums.

No visit is complete without a stop at the shop and garden centre. This time there were no purchases made however.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN JULY AND AUGUST

With high summer upon us we can assess how our gardens are being challenged by bugs that would threaten our plants and trees. I note that the Chestnut Leaf Miner continues to reduce and we are looking forward to another year with conkers, such a pity that playing conkers is considered to be too dangerous! The Rosemary Beetle population continues to increase and is causing damage to foliage, beautiful shiny beetles with striped backs about 3/4mm long and slow moving; this bug can also attack Lavender. Lily

Beetle was not a big problem this year on my Fritillaries and Lilies, hand picking works very well but be careful, their defence is to fall off at the first sign of attack!

Box continues to suffer from attack on several fronts – suddenly going brown with no evidence of leaf damage could signify the dreaded Box Blight, a nasty soil borne disease for which there is no remedy, dig up and preferably burn all parts of the plant to ash and avoid replanting in the same place. If your Box is in a pot, going brown could be due to drying out, looks very similar to Box Blight. Box can also suffer from attack by a caterpillar that can strip the foliage. A healthy plant can make new foliage, but this leaves it much weakened, and it will need plenty of watering and a liquid feed. At the first signs of foliage damage, use a jet of water regularly to knock the caterpillars off the leaves. Avoid using insecticides if you can, these tiny caterpillars are an important food source for many species of bird.

For some years now the RHS at Wisley have been running trials of alternative plants for hedging and topiary. The plants are now well established and well worth a visit. The trial includes Pittosporum, Sarcococca, small specie of Holly and many more.

Conserving our water supplies at this time of the year is critical so please do not water your lawn – if it goes brown it will recover quickly when the rains return. Capture rainwater in butts and anything you can find especially if there is a big rainstorm. Water plants in containers as later in the evening as you can to reduce loss by evaporation. Also, watering during the day can result if severe scorch of leaves if the sun is hot.

The highlight on the Saturday was provided by Howard Aylett and Brian Ling, taking us back half a century to the spectacular activities of the Paynesfield



were sometimes to be believed only when the rather grainy version of Super 8 cinefilm coverage was on the screen behind them to provide the evidence. The residents of Paynesfield Road, helped by others from further afield in Tatsfield, were a remarkable source of inspiration, entertaining ideas and practical knowledge of how to bring a community together year after year. Giant floats were built on the verges of Paynesfield Road ready to be driven, sometimes with a police escort, down Clarks Lane to Westerham.

Brian and Howard were able to describe how the Gang provided entertainment and raise the profile of Tatsfield in the 1960s and 70s. Their final entry in the Westerham Carnival was in 1987.

Information about Tatsfield a century ago was provided all weekend in the AMB in the 220 pages of the 1921 Census return for Tatsfield. This gave details of everyone living in or visiting Tatsfield's houses on census night. We were able to provide copies of census entries to visitors wanting to know who lived in their house in 1921, or where previous generations of their families were then living. Among members of long-established Tatsfield families who were able to help us navigate through the various surnames were lan Longley and Niall Kells in particular.

A number of enquiries led later to email exchanges which filled gaps in several local family histories and fleshed out material already in our archives.

Also on display were six albums of postcards and photographs of the parish as well as contemporary newspaper accounts of how the village celebrated previous royal events, starting with Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887.

The information on display seems to have encouraged sales of our books about Tatsfield, the Paynesfield Road Gang and Tatsfield school right up until Bob David and I were shutting up shop on Sunday evening.



On the Green on Sunday the stall set up by Greg and Kate Watkins had been superbly embellished by the publicity material donated by Richard Budgen. The large photographs on show of Tatsfield in the last century prompted a number of visitors to pass on memories of life and personalities in the village all those years ago.

Copies of '*Tatsfield* – the First 2000 Years' – were also on sale on the Green. With 150 pages

of key historical information, photographs, maps and fun trivia about Tatsfield for only £10, this second, up-to-date, edition of our book provides answers to the quiz that Greg and Kate devised specially for the weekend.

They hope that you enjoyed the quiz (please do message us – email address below - if you didn't get a chance to take it and we'll get one to you) and that it showed what a rich local history we have in our village.

The current edition of the village history is on sale in Sheree's for £10. If you live further away, but close to the village, just message us and we'll arrange free delivery, as we can of other publications we have. Otherwise, we can arrange for delivery by post to any destination.

The History Weekend in the AMB will itself be recorded in the archive thanks to a series of photos taken by Lorna Halfpenny-Beeby, two of which appear above.
