

TATSFIFLD PARISH COUNCIL

On 11th March, the Parish Council met after yet another rainy wet day, our village daffodils are struggling in the mud and we all wish for brighter days ahead. All councillors were present and joined by District Councillor Martin Allen and two parishioners.

PLANNING

TA/2024/36/EIA Moorhouse Sandpit, Westerham Road, Westerham This is a periodic review (EIA scoping). No comment or response required by TPC at this stage.

TA/2024/95 1 Park Farm Cottages, Rag Hill Road, Tatsfield, Erection of a first-floor side extension, floor plan design and all associated works. Taking into account previous planning approvals this further extension would lead to the cumulative overall built form of the house being 'disproportionate additions' to the built form of the original house and therefore contrary to Local Plan Detailed Policy DP13(E). Objection.

TA/2024/189/NH 4 Sunnybank, Old Lane Tatsfield Proposal for a single storey rear extension under the "larger home extension policy" to an existing single storey one bed bungalow. Located in the Green Belt outside the defined Village. No comment.

FINANCE Approval was made on quotes received for continuing the new carpet through the hall and rooms one and three at the Aileen McHugo building. This is part of our refurbishment of the building.

NOTIFIED ITEMS

Furze Corner We have now received the final draft lease on Furze Corner and hope to proceed with signing the lease during early April.

EV Charging Points It was agreed to look into the possibility of installing Electric Charging Points in the Village Centre. Simon Cook will lead this project.

Footpath 21 Proposal by resident Jon Allbutt presented a proposal for SCC to repair and reinstate Footpath 21. The public footpaths and bridleways through our Parish are managed by Surrey County Council Rights of Way team. Jon will send his proposal to SCC for consideration.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN The Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan is going to referendum on May 2nd (Polling Day). Please ensure you vote and help to make a difference to the way we influence what happens in our village in the future. (More details later in magazine.)

AMB FIRE ASSESSMENT An assessment took place with Complisafe along with Councillor Martin Elmer and the Parish Clerk. I am pleased to report we passed with flying colours and were praised for our FRA and all the changes that had been made.

TATSFIFLD NFIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

We have reached referendum, and this requires parishioners to come out to vote for the Neighbourhood Plan on the 2nd May.



Tatsfield's Neighbourhood Plan completed its examination

by an independent examiner who worked speedily with us, to ensure that we were able to bring this to referendum. The examiner requested changes to some of the words and policies in order to make the plan "sound" in Planning Terms and to avoid any confusion or duplication with the National Planning Policy Framework which of course was updated during the term of our putting together the plan. We fundamentally accepted most of the changes and we are also pleased to say that the examiner accepted some of our requests to keep some of the policies in which he accepted affected the parish specifically and allowed them. Your vote for this plan will count and it already has had a positive effect on protecting the Green Belt when it was recently used in a Planning Application meeting where the officers had to upgrade the weight of the plan in decision making to "considerable weight".

After all the work the volunteers have put into this plan putting it together this is a pleasing outcome, so we now ask you, the entire parish to turn out on 2nd May and give this plan a resounding Yes vote. Thank You.

This is your chance to ensure that future development in Tatsfield is led by this plan to meet local opinion and expectations. With the plan in place the Parish Council can take greater control of the framework for decision making around the Parish and this will influence the way the Parish and village centre develops over the coming months and years. This will ensure a strong and sustainable future for our area whilst at the same time protecting the special character of Tatsfield which is so valued by residents.

ARE YOU READY TO VOTE ON 2 MAY?

Elections take place on Thursday 2 May for Tandridge District Council, Surrey Police and Crime Commissioner and some parish councils.

Residents in Tatsfield will also be voting on the referendum on the Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan, a community-led framework which will guide the future development, regeneration, and conservation of the area.

To be able to vote, you must be included in the Register of Electors. If you're not already registered, please submit an online application by Tuesday 16 April.

More information, including different ways to vote, can be found on the Electoral Commission's website: www.electoralcommission.org.uk

Polling cards arriving from 20 March

Residents should have start receiving their polling cards from 20 March. It will explain where your polling station is and will also give details of your postal vote if you've already registered to vote by post.

Your polling card is bigger, as it contains extra information about the need to bring photo ID to polling stations. You don't need to bring your polling card with you to the polling station.

Don't forget your photo ID

If you want to vote in a polling station, you'll need to bring photo ID, such as your photo driving licence or passport, otherwise you won't be able to vote. This is a relatively new requirement.

If you don't have photo ID, you'll need to apply for Voter ID by 5pm on Wednesday 24 April: www.gov.uk (citizenship and living in the uk/voting) More information about these elections, including the different ways to vote, can be found on the elections webpage at www.tandridge.gov.uk

As a result of the Electoral Boundary review where hundreds of you persuaded the commission that Tatsfield should remain as a one Councillor Ward, this will be our third election in three years. So, this is another opportunity for us as a Parish to reaffirm our independence by turning out to vote for the councillor of your choice.

I have stated in previous issues that I will be happy to stand again this year and have put my name forward. I will have completed nine years as your **District Councillor** in May 2024, and believe I have done a good job of representing the ward and the district and believe that continuity within that role will be just as important for the future. If you think that I have then please tell your friends and neighbours and any new people that have come to the village in the last year.

Please support me in this and keep Tatsfield independent of the politics that would otherwise affect decisions for Tatsfield not being made in its best interest.

If you would like to ask me anything about the role that I do for you and how I do it and make decisions on your behalf I would be happy to talk with you about it. In this instance and the vote for the Tatsfield Neighbourhood Plan your vote will count so please do use it and use it wisely. Thank You.

The business of Tandridge District Council will continue but there will be a greater emphasis on getting the voting across the district correct as it will be a big task with all 43 councillors across the district standing. That includes my Independent Group colleagues Jeremy Pursehouse for Warlingham East and Chelsham and Farleigh, Judy Moore for the newly formed Dormansland and Felbridge ward and Helena Windsor for the Bletchingley and Nutfield ward.

The true story of Sir Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton, who, in the months leading up to World War II, rescued 669 predominantly Jewish children from the Nazis. Nicky visited Prague in December 1938 and found families who had fled the rise of the Nazis in Germany and Austria, living in desperate conditions with little or no shelter and food, and under threat of Nazi invasion. He immediately realized it was a race against time. How many children could he and the team rescue before the borders closed? Fifty years later, Nicky lives haunted by the fate of the children

he wasn't able to bring to safety in England. It's not until a live BBC television show, 'That's Life', surprises him by introducing him to some surviving children now adults - that he finally begins to come to terms with the guilt and grief he had carried for five decades.

TATSFIELD GARDEN CLUB WITH BRYAN EVEREST ON 5 MARCH 2024

Our garden club meeting in March was well supported with keen Tatsfield, Biggin Hill and Westerham members. Bryan was on top form and entertained us so much with his wit. humour and wisdom - he really should be on the big stage. He had us all in fits of laughter and oozed encouragement from us all to support the Society's Horticultural Shows. Bryan began the evening talking on how to grow sweet peas. You put a layer of finely sieved compost in an old margarine looking tub, water, place 10 seeds on the top, spaced out evenly, and then cover with a thin layer of compost and water. Place this in a warm position i.e. on a windowsill, above a radiator or in an airing cupboard if you don't have a Propagator. They should emerge within 10 days. When the seedlings have two leaves you must pinch out the tops as it is the side shoots that produce the sweet peas. You must then put these plants straight out into an unheated greenhouse or something similar and plant out at the end of April. The ground must be prepared beforehand with Poultry Magic or similar, but NOT fresh manure, and push in your canes at a straight upright angle, and not wigwams as sweet peas like to grow upwards. Well informed of all this info it just leaves me to say GOOD LUCK. Bryan gave away numerous pots of mixed sweet peas for us all to have a go and enter the Autumn Show.

He explained how to take dahlia cuttings and it is these new plants that will be full of vigour and give you a wonderful cut display and gave away paper bags of potted up dahlia tubers for us all to grow on and also plant out at the end of April.

Then he diverged into the vegetable world, especially onions, shallots and garlic. He buys his sets in early January – before anyone else apparently, and plants them in single cells and keeps them in a cold frame or greenhouse ready for planting out in mid-March. He sows all his vegetable seeds in single cells, often three seeds to a cell so he can thin them out. By this he meant cauliflowers, cabbages, leeks, lettuce and beetroot. You must sow parsnips and carrots straight into the ground where they are to grow as they cannot be transplanted.

Bryan then moved onto our Spring Show. Last year he gave everyone 8-inch pots of daffodils to grow on for the show, and this year he is trialling pots of tulips. I was lucky enough to take home a pot. Bryan also told us how to have our daffodils at their prime ready for the show - either keep in the fridge (he must have a very large fridge), or a darkened room to hold back, or if cutting on the windowsill to encourage them to open. This only takes two days.

We had a break for refreshments, and we were greeted to steaming mugs of hot coffee and tea along with homemade freshly baked lemon drizzle cake. We all left the hall far happier than when we had arrived with pots of sweet peas and tulips, trays of onions, cabbages, potatoes, and lots of enthusiasm.

Thank you, Bryan, for sharing your expertise and good sense of humour. You are worth your weight in GOLD Θ

St Mary's Church Tatsfield Annual Meeting 2024 At 11.30am on Sunday 12 May in the Millennium Hall we will have our Annual Meeting of Parishioners followed by our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). Anyone resident in the Parish whose name is entered on a register of local government electors, as well as anyone whose name is on the Electoral Roll, is entitled to attend the Annual Meeting of Parishioners at which the Churchwardens are elected. All Lay persons whose names are on the Electoral Roll are entitled to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and take part.

St Mary's Church Electoral Roll 2024 – 2025 The Church Electoral Roll is your parish church's register of electors – it is a list of those entitled to attend and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting where the elections take place for:

(a) The Parochial Church Council; (b) The Parish Representatives on the Deanery Synod. Any person entitled to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting may raise any question of parochial or general church interest.

Preparation for the revised Electoral Roll will take place from Saturday 13 April to Saturday 27 April 2024. Under the Church Representation Rules any persons are entitled to have their names entered on the roll if they:

- Are baptised and aged 16 or over.
- Have signed a form of application for enrolment.
- Are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) having habitually attended worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment.
- Or are members in good standing of a church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves also to be members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

NIGFL'S NATURE NOTES

Let's begin, this month, by returning to John's (Rosenbaum) 2023 bird observations. I felt I had to ask about his wondrous raptor sightings. Sparrowhawks in the garden I understood, but the others - Kestrels, Merlin, Hobbies, Peregrines, Buzzards - did they fly over or did they actually visit his garden? If they visited, what was the attraction?

'In the garden and trees we have had **Kestrels** and **Sparrowhawks** (quite common), a **Peregrine** feeding on a Collared Dove on the lawn, a **Merlin**, and **Buzzards** in the trees. A Buzzard nested in the trees of my neighbour's garden for about three years producing young. Currently, we frequently have flyovers of **Red kites** and Buzzards. The **Hobbies** I see are normally flying at the same time as the migration of the hirundinidae. The raptors, I am sure, are attracted by the other birds on the feeders. I have also seen Peregrines flying up and down the valley and sometimes perched in trees. Kestrels are not as common as in the past, maybe because of the increase in Buzzards and Kites.'

Thanks to John for the development of his notes. He has certainly found an entertaining place to live. Pasting 'Excel' charts within these notes has proven to be beyond my ability. Consequently, if you would like to view John's detailed monthly observations, please email me and I'll send them on. What I can do is list the birds John saw over the entire course of 2023. The monthly count varies between 22 (February) and 33 (October). I wonder how this compares with your own sightings:

Blackbird, Blackcap, Black-headed gull, Blue tit, Bullfinch, Buzzard, Canada Goose, Carrion Crow, Chaffinch, Coal tit, Collared doves, Cormorant, Dunnock, Fieldfare, Goldcrest, Goldfinch, Great spotted woodpecker, Great tit, Green woodpecker, Heron, Greylag goose, Herring gull, Hobby, Jackdaw, Jay, Kestrel, Lesser black-backed gull, Long-tailed tit, Magpie, Mallard, Mistle thrush, Nuthatch, Pheasant, Raven, Red kite, Redwing, Ring-necked parakeet, Robin, Song thrush, Sparrowhawk, Starling, Stock



dove, Swallow, Tawny owl, Treecreeper, Willow warbler, Woodpigeon and Wren.

One winter visitor John did not see, but others did, is the Waxwing. An anonymous contributor sent this message (06.03.24):

'Just been watching a flock of 20 or so **Waxwings** along unmade Paynesfield Road. The first time I've ever seen them! Some were up in the trees and some at eye level, eating the rose hips. I've seen other people's posts on the 'Tatsfield Talk', Facebook page and had been longing to see one or two this winter. Really made my day! There have been other sightings in Vern Place this

winter. My attention was mostly drawn to them as there were quite a few and I didn't know what they were, so stood still and just watched for a few minutes. They are really beautiful birds, and I was really grateful to have been in the right spot at the right time!'

Wow – lucky you! Unfortunately, by the time I arrived they had moved on. They arrive in varying numbers on our shores most winters and this year bird watchers have reported a noticeable influx of them nationally. But to see them here in Tatsfield is exceptional. (thanks to Ted Shillibeer for his cover photo this month – Ed)

Our other news this month comes from Doris (Mitchell), who was delighted to see Redwings at her bird bath, via her webcam, and Martin (Allen) with his regular (and welcome) garden visitors update. Doris asked whether the Redwings had visited me, a little further up the road. Well, Doris, the answer is yes; I had a mini-flock of four constantly stripping berries from my weeping cotoneaster for a period of several days. It now stands naked. Oh, well – we can't have everything. Birds or berries, take your choice. Martin had no Redwings to report but his so-called 'unspectacular' observations do hold a little gem (16.02.24):

'The happenings at No.38 have been spectacularly unspectacular over the winter period, but just this week, as well as our resident flock of [House] sparrows, we have twice seen a Siskin on the sunflower hearts, a single Long-tailed tit on the fat balls, and among a flock of pigeons having their breakfast this morning were seven Jackdaws. We still get our sprinkling of Blue tits, Goldfinch, Robin and both male and female Blackbirds, so we hope things will at least not be worse than the last few years. Also, I don't know what it is but our garden is having holes dug into it. What they are looking for I do not know but at least it is irrigating the lawn!'

Thanks for your contribution, Allen. Regarding your holes, I am suggesting either squirrels or Jays. Both bury acorns in lawns and return to dig them up during the winter with the hope of recalling where they were buried. The worse their memories, the more holes get dug. Of course, if the holes are enormous, it could be badgers! Of equal interest is your sighting of a Siskin; not often seen and not included in John's 2023 list. Attracting one to your garden is what I would consider a major success. Well done. And how heartening that someone should mention that star of the spring songsters — the Blackbird. A grossly underrated bird, in my opinion, until one stops and listens. I find early evening to be the best time for a mind-enhancing serenade. Step outside and see.

Following my period of self-imposed, winter hibernation, I am now once more looking forward to getting out and about on a regular basis. Hopefully, you are too. If you come across something of interest, don't forget to send a message. What you find mundane others may find fascinating. Your audience awaits!

BFFKFFPING AT POSTACRE

It has been just over six years since we moved from Hayes to Tatsfield and have continued our beekeeping journey at Postacre. It was lovely to find there are other 'beeks' in the village and as a result we have been able to rehome some of last year's swarms to locations close by.



As we begin to enjoy the first signs of spring and emerge from our winter 'hibernation' and enjoy some warm sunshine at last, the bees are no exception. During the cold winter months, the bees are quiet and need little attention. Bees will recognise the rising temperatures and on a sunny day we might see some activity around the entrance of the hive which is an indication that the colony has survived the winter. Bees don't hibernate they "overwinter" which is the term we use for when bees reduce the size of the colony down from 50,000 to around 10,000. The queen will stop laying in winter months so



there is a natural decline in numbers. The queen and colony huddle to keep warm, conserve energy and only move to feed on honey stores we have left or sugar fondant we may have added.

What is inside the hive? As many as 50,000 bees and just one queen. A queen usually lives between 3-4 years. The colony isn't run by the queen, her job is to lay eggs and if she doesn't do that to the satisfaction of the colony, the colony will decide to swap her for a new queen! She can lay up to 2,000 eggs a day! 95% of a hive are worker bees, these are all females and they do all of the work from feeding the queen, nursing new bees, building new wax

comb, cleaning & guarding the hive and even removing dead bees! It's the workers that you see foraging in your gardens. The remaining 5% are drones — these are the males who have no other purpose than mate a new queen. They are usually removed by the workers towards the end of the season as they have no use and it's another mouth to feed! The boys can't sting either!

We have overwintered five hives from 2023 in our apiary and hoping to start 2024 stronger than any previous years. This means we will be 'busy bees' at Postacre! From March onwards the bee population will start to increase as the queen begins to lay again.

This leads into the 'swarm season'. It usually happens on warm sunny days from May to end July between 11-4pm. It's one of the most interesting things that bees do. Swarming is a natural instinct of reproduction where one colony becomes two. It is the bees' way of solving a space problem within the colony. Typically, it will be the existing queen leaving with half the colony, leaving the other half in the hive with a newly hatched queen. Swarms can be alarming and dramatic involving tens of thousands of bees in a large noisy cloud and scary if not experienced before. Once the 'scout' bees



have found a suitable home (not always in a sensible place) they will begin to settle with the queen somewhere in the cluster. Most swarms are not aggressive but if you notice a swarm, we would be very happy to come and collect and rehome (Andrew – 07889 156180).



The best bit about keeping bees is that they produce honey. A good hive will give two harvests of honey each year, once in early June and again in August/September. One bee will make just 1/12th of a teaspoon of honey in its life. So, each spoonful is very precious. You may have seen our 'Honey for Sale' sign on our Postacre gate – if the sign is there we have honey! If anyone is interested in bees and would like to join us for a hive visit – you are more than welcome. **Andrew**

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN APRIL

March was mild with reduced rainfall and spring got off to a very good start. The Met Office forecast for April is for average temperatures and rainfall.

Over the years I have had many comments about our summer floral displays in our mangers and hanging baskets; is there a secret I hear you say? Well, yes there are a few — buy good quality plants and plant them in their containers early, that means by mid-April. Choose good quality general purpose, peat free, growing compost. In trials last year I found that a 50:50 mixture of a proprietary compost with our wonderful Black Gold (collect from the Community Composting Group on Wednesday afternoons from 2.00-4.00pm or Saturdays from 10.00-12.00 at just £1.50 per big bag) was very successful, why not give it a try?

Before you fill your containers thoroughly mix a slow-release fertiliser and water retaining granules with the compost. If you are using mangers or hanging baskets, line them with coir matting making sure you cut the liner about an inch above the top edge of the container. Fill the containers firming the compost gently into the corners but do not compact the compost too firmly, plant roots need air as well as moisture to grow well. Before planting your chosen scheme make sure the plants have been thoroughly watered, putting dry plants into dry compost will set them back and take weeks to recover.

After planting thoroughly soak the compost by applying the water in two or three lots to avoid it spilling over the top edge. You will know that the compost is soaked when it runs freely out of the bottom of the container. You will not need to water again for at least a week unless the weather turns warm and dry. Find a sheltered sunny spot where the plants will settle and grow well but make sure you have some protective fleece or a light towel to put over the plants if the forecast indicates a cold night or cold winds by day. After about four or five weeks they will look very good and be ready to place in their

summer position. Buy a general-purpose liquid feed, preferably based on seaweed, to feed your containers every couple of weeks.

I have a feeling that, after such a wet winter, we just might be struggling for water this summer. Using mains water for watering plants should be a last resort, now is the time to plan for storing rainwater. It is important to choose a water storage container with a closely fitting lid to avoid it becoming a breeding ground for mosquitos and other bugs. If possible, buy a container made in the UK and of recycled plastic e.g. info@britishrecycledplastic.co.uk If your water store becomes smelly, treat it with an anti-algae product. Be careful about measuring the correct amount as a strong solution can be damaging to plants.

NO MOW MAY

It's that time of year when the best thing you can do for garden wildlife is to keep the lawn mower in the shed for No Mow May. The reasoning is that we have lost over 95% of our flower-rich meadows since the 1930s and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators such as bees and butterflies. It's a sad story but your lawn can help, and it won't cost you a bean! All you must do is let some, or all, of your lawn grow for a month so that those pesky daisies, buttercups, clover etc can spread their petals and leaves for the Bumbles and Painted Ladies to feast and let nature take its course.

How it works is that most lawns contain a wide range of small native meadow plants unless the lawn is very new or recently treated with chemical pesticides (aka lawn treatment). So if these beautiful little plants are allowed to grow and flower they will provide a welcome jump-start to the food chain for our much declined wildlife population. Just by taking a more relaxed approach to grassy areas can give insects, birds and small mammals a so-much better chance to thrive. Not convinced? In which case I should mention that the initiative is encouraged not just by the RHS, the RSPB and the Wildlife Trusts, but by David Attenborough who has publicly voiced his support. Enough



said? No Mow May was started by the conservation charity Plantlife in 2019 with the hope that many of the UK's millions of gardens will take it up and help protect and promote the nation's plants and pollinators. They're at www.plantlife.org.uk.

Interesting fact of the month. Painted Lady butterflies migrate to the UK from North Africa, the Middle East, and central Asia.

They fly at an incredibly high average altitude of 500m (over 1600') which is too high for us to spot them. And in 2009 their migration was measured on radar with 11 million entering the UK in spring and 26 million departing in the autumn. That's a lot of mouths to feed.

THINKING OF A NEW OR RESURFACED DRIVEWAY?

Subsidence, flooding, insurance claims, angry neighbours and costly legal wrangles are all things most householders would like to avoid. Yet they're all too commonplace for the unwary when surfacing/resurfacing a new or replacement drive. This isn't a salespitch, it's a cautionary neighbourly warning because it seems to happen frequently that an unintended calamity slips in under the radar whenever a driveway gets built or resurfaced. I have heard of a couple of recent occurrences in the village hence I was minded to write this piece.

The nub of the problem is that Tatsfield gets a whole lot of rain, and it will either soak into the ground, or run downhill – you only have to look at the torrents that run down roads on a rainy day to see the problem. But if you tarmac a drive the rain cannot soak in and hence it can only run downhill. And if your house is at the lower end of the drive and adequate drainage hasn't been installed, you're going to be on the receiving end of a whole lot of rainwater. I've seen this happen many times, and it can lead to all sorts of difficulties. And of course if it freezes it will turn into an impromptu ice rink. However, if the rainwater flows onto a neighbour's property, then things can get pretty tense – the worst case I've seen frequently submerged their next doors' garden under eight inches of water lapping against the conservatory walls.

Driveways can have some very unpleasant consequences and many of them can be harmful not only to people and property but also to the local environment. For this reason, Local Authorities have clear guidance about how to deal with the rainwater that will run very predictably downhill on a new drive. Depending on the circumstances, Tandridge may even require a formal Planning Application to ensure the job is done properly. Thankfully, most recommendations are simple, and they apply to any hardstanding, not just driveways:

- 1. Perhaps most importantly, first check with the council planning dept because any new drive over five square metres is likely to need Planning Permission. It took me a little while to work out that this is about half the size of a car parking space; it is tiny.
- 2. Maximise the retained area of lawn and vegetation. A minimum of 25% of the front garden must be retained as soft landscaping.
- 3. Incorporate Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) and permeable or porous materials that reflect the character of the area.
- 4. Do not direct run-off into the drainage system. Water companies may apply a surcharge if you do.

Effective sustainable drainage systems can be as simple as a grill-top channel drain running to a soakaway but the more imaginative gardeners out there might want to think about creating an attractive wetland garden feature – it's great for garden wildlife too.



However, the alternative is to view a live stream and watch the whole thing from the comfort of your armchair. There are a few sites that have already declared that they will have a live feed with **www.timeanddate.com** and **www.exploratorium.com** being just two.

Turning to something a little more current, Jupiter still dominates the evening sky but by the end of April it will be lost in the twilight. If you haven't seen its four Galilean moons then look now, as they are visible with binoculars, before it reaches solar conjunction on May 18th and is lost to astronomers for a while. For planets whose orbits lie beyond that of the Earth, solar conjunction refers to the moment when the planet in question, the Earth and Sun all lie in a straight line with the Sun in the middle. The planet is then behind the Sun as seen from Earth. When it emerges, it will be to the west (right) of the Sun and visible in the morning sky before sunrise.



The map is drawn for 1st April at 8:07pm which is when the Sun is below horizon signalling the beginning of nautical twilight. You'll notice that Mercury is still on view but is making its way back into the

solar glare and will only be visible for the first week of April.

By the end of April, the evening sky is bereft of bright planets. As I said, Jupiter is too close to the Sun although technically still an evening object. Venus is also too close to the Sun but will move into the evening sky in the coming months whilst Mercury, Mars and Saturn are also morning objects, but they too are still hidden by the morning twilight.

TATSFIFLD IN APRIL 1924



School Report At the beginning of the month, it was time for the annual prize-giving at the school. Parents were told that in spite of many difficulties, sickness and changes of staff, the year had

been very successful. The Board of Education had expressed satisfaction with 'all the new arrangements in the building'. The school was receiving a grant from the London Charities for Schools.

However, one of the many items stored in the National Archives at Kew is the report of an inspection of Tatsfield's school carried out that April but not completed until the following month. It paints a different picture of the state of the school in previous years and is not happy reading, reporting on the 'unsatisfactory state; the discipline was poor; the children were torpid' when the current Head had taken over in 1921. The school was then in a bad physical condition too. Since then there had been improvements. The Head 'had given much of his own spare time to repairing with the help of the boys and with his own hands such glaring defects as broken desks, broken fences ... and repairing the torn maps, charts and pictures.' At the same time levels of attainment had improved despite being held back by a steady turnover of supply teachers.

'Industrial Exhibition' There was more positive news in the Westerham Herald later in the month with the headline 'TATSFIELD IN A NEW LIGHT'. The village hall was taken over one Wednesday, aimed according to the promoter at 'stimulating village industries'. It was endorsed by the presence of the leader of the constituency Conservative Party and the local county councillor. Displays included objects from all corners of the world, homemade household goods as well as demonstrations of spinning, leather work and basketmaking. Prizes were awarded in more than a dozen classes for adults and children. And there was a novel attraction – 'wireless entertainment'.

Tangland Castle For sale for the third time in our records. It seems to have changed hands in 1894 and 1919 and was now up for auction again, including its contents and a relatively new 12 horse-power Rover touring car. A couple of weeks later, land attached to Tangland Castle, described as a three-acre miniature estate, also came up for auction and included what was described as a *'freehold small residence'*, 'Whyte Thorne' a five-bedroomed property in an acre of land. The Tangland Castle estate ran from Goatsfield Road to today's junction of Crossways and Greenway.

Rag Hill dangerous Later in April 1924 came a call for a sign to be put up at the top of Rag Hill warning drivers that it was dangerous. This arose from an accident in which a motorcyclist from Erith, with his wife and son in a sidecar, were all injured when it overturned on their Easter Monday excursion up to the North Downs.

U3A Finally, the History Project has been approached by a member of a U3A group, Dr Paul Mortimer, who has been researching into the life of Edyth Goodall. She was an actress who had a holiday home at Junes Close in Goatsfield Road a hundred years ago

and who is buried in Tatsfield churchyard. The plan would be to put on a performance joining up events of her life sourced from personal letters, manuscripts, unpublished research, magazines and newspapers. This would need twelve local people with an interest in acting to read the parts of famous people involved in her life. He has already organised a test performance in private at the Royal Exchange, Manchester and says he got a standing ovation.
