





TANDRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Please excuse the shortness of this report but there has been much going on but even more importantly on the council front not much has happened apart from the **Local Government re-organisation** which seems to be covered by multiple avenues so I will not repeat too much of it except to say nine of the eleven districts and boroughs have proposed that we form a three tier authority in Surrey represented by three councillors per ward/division. The Tandridge councillors supported this proposal except for a couple of abstentions.

Collectively we agree that this proposal aims to protect local democracy, keep decision making closer to communities and reflect Surrey's existing local identities while also being financially viable.

Surrey County Council has proposed that we form a two-tier authority in Surrey represented by two councillors per ward/division.

Then Reigate and Banstead council made a proposal that they should form an authority with West Sussex and included Tandridge in their proposals despite them being strongly advised that we would not support such a proposal.

All the proposals for this fast track unitary are now with the Minister in government to review and advise. Over the summer, the government is expected to consult on the proposals. A final decision will be made in the autumn. Work will begin on implementation, with unitary elections scheduled for May 2026 and the new councils set up by April 2027.

Follow the progress by visiting www.tandridge.gov.uk and search for local government reorganisation (LGR).

Changes are coming to bin collection cycles In June there will be changes to some recycling and rubbish collections in the district to help improve efficiency. Currently about half the district has recycling collected one week while the other half has rubbish collected. All households will have recycling collected in the same week and rubbish the next. Food waste will continue every week as usual. If your collection cycle is changing, we will let you know well in advance. In the coming weeks, we will send postcards to affected households. Look out for bin hangers too, as they will have key information.

MyTandridge account Over 10,000 residents already have a "MyTandridge account" - have you got one yet? MyTandridge is your secure online account for quick and easy access to council services. It saves you time by remembering your details and lets you track requests and stay up to date. With your account, you can:

- Check bin collection days.
- Report missed bins or order new containers.
- Pay your council tax or business rates and set up a direct debit.
- Contact your local councillors.
- Check your housing rent balance and apply for services (council housing tenants and leaseholders only).

WARNING – **Do no put vapes in your rubbish or recycling bin** Please put vapes into a tied small bag, and put it next to your food caddy by 6am on your collection day, or you can take them to the community recycling centres or return them to the retailer you purchased them from.

Annual Council meeting I attended the Annual Council on 15th May where we voted in a new Chairman and Vice Chairman for the municipal year. This will now be my 11th year as your District Councillor and I will pledge to continue to do what I can in the best interest of Tatsfield and its residents. I will update you in next month's article about the roles that I accepted at the meeting.

Meanwhile enjoy what is looking like a nice period of weather. Don't forget to reuse as much grey water as possible or leave out bins, buckets, or other receptacles to collect much needed rainwater to water your plants and vegetables.

CLAIRF COUTINHO MP

Last month we commemorated the 80th anniversary of VE Day, marking the end of conflict in Europe in 1945 after six gruelling years. We

remember how Winston Churchill told jubilant crowds that "VE Day marks what is not a victory of a party or of any class, but a victory of the great British nation as a whole". A huge well done to all the volunteers who helped to organise the many fantastic events across East Surrey – from our parish councils to the Royal British Legion, to community groups and everyone in between.

In support of East Surrey's hardworking farmers, Alexia Lescure's first farmers' market was held in the glorious sunshine a few weeks ago to great acclaim. Local farmers will be selling cheese, flowers and crafts at Lingfield Primary School from 9am-1pm on Sunday, 8th June – so please pop by if you get the chance.

In Claire's rail survey many residents called for the return of the direct Caterham to London Victoria service. This has been a key request in our discussions with Govia Thameslink Railway. A key factor is the planned onward transfer from GTR's upgraded Great Northern fleet to Southern and Southeastern. Once additional carriages become available (expected from May 2026) one option is to bring back direct peak time services between Caterham and Victoria. While GTR have highlighted other potential uses for the extra carriages, we have made it clear, thanks to feedback from the rail survey, that East Surrey residents see this service as a priority. GTR has agreed to include the rail survey findings in discussions with the Department for Transport. We will keep up the pressure to bring this important service back.

THAMES WATER, WATER PIPE REPLACEMENT, BIGGIN HILL

Key details of the project have been confirmed (to date).

Thames Water is investing £5m in the replacement of 2.2 miles (3.9km) of aging water main along Main Road. This essential work will strengthen the network, reduce leakage, and improve the long-term reliability of water supply for the local community.

Project dates: work began on Tuesday 27th May 2025. The scheme is expected to run until September 2027. Teams will be working Monday to Saturday, six days a week.

How the works will be delivered: works will begin at the roundabout junction with Downe Road and progress in 200-metre phases towards the Churchill Way roundabout. To minimise disruption:

- Lane closures and multi-way traffic lights will be used throughout the scheme. These will be manually operated between 7am and 7pm to help manage peak-time traffic flows.
- A road closure will be in place on Blackness Lane, at the junction with Jackass Lane/Church Road, for approximately eighteen weeks. Access for residents will be maintained, and diversion routes will be clearly signposted.
- **Parking restrictions** may be introduced at times. Signage will be displayed in advance wherever this is required.
- Bus services will continue to operate as normal, with coordination from TfL.
- We will notify any customers who may experience temporary water supply interruptions in advance, with clear information about timing and duration.

Customer Engagement: a community drop-in session was held on 6th May. Thames Water are planning further engagement opportunities as the project progresses and will ensure residents and elected representatives are informed well in advance.

To keep the local community fully informed, we are sending letters to all households in the impacted areas and will also be issuing SMS text messages to help amplify awareness of the works and reduce confusion during traffic management phases.

NORTH DOWNS SINFONIA CONCERT 10TH MAY

A sunny evening greeted the May concert of North Downs Sinfonia, held in the Village Hall. The title of the concert was "The Famous and the Forgotten" indicating that there would be a contrast in the works played, some being well known and others not so well known.

The concert opened with one of Schubert's Overtures in an Italian Style following the classic style of a slow opening leading to a fast middle and end.



The overture can well be noted for its highly difficult parts for the wind players, and these were attacked with keenness from the NDS players. Some slight errors in these parts didn't distract from the overall uplifting and fervent nature of the piece, and the scene was set well for Bruch's Violin Concerto that followed.

The Violin Concerto was played by Haru Ushigusa, well known to NDS audiences for her previous performances of Vaughan-Williams Lark Ascending, Beethoven's Violin Concerto and most recently Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto. All previous performances had audiences open mouthed and shedding tears throughout, and tonight was no exception! The virtuosity of Haru's playing in the first movement was astounding, then contrasted with the deep emotion of the second movement. Through the whole concerto, her connection with conductor and orchestra was obvious for everyone to see and shows why she is such a cherished soloist for NDS to perform with — we sincerely hope it continues! The final movement was taken at an energetic speed and was flawless throughout, culminating in rousing final chords that drew instant, long-lasting and well-deserved applause from the audience. Haru should be playing in larger venues to larger audiences, but we are so glad that she is still playing in Tatsfield and we can't wait for her next performance with NDS!

Due to the pleasant evening temperatures, tables and chairs had been set up outside the Village Hall, which made for a wonderful way to enjoy a glass of wine in the interval.

The symphony for the evening was Mendelssohn's 8th String Symphony which he had reworked to add in wind and brass instruments, prior to composing his first full symphony. This is therefore not very well known or played often, so it was interesting to hear this symphony as a 'fresh' piece of classical music repertoire. Despite it being early on in Mendelssohn's composition career (he wrote it at the age of 14!) his mastery of different instrument sounds was very clear. The second movement stands out in this regard, as it was written for violas in three parts, supported by cellos, bassoons, and small parts for flutes and clarinets. The result was a movement very reminiscent of earlier Baroque period music with unique musical textures, and the abilities of the NDS viola section shone through. The final movement ended with a very lively presto section and

galloped the work to a pleasing and stirring conclusion, with Ben Knowles taking deserved applause for his conducting on the night and clearly diligent preparation of the orchestra beforehand. The orchestra also deserved the applause for their stamina throughout the demanding programme and overall execution.

We very much look forward to the next concert on Saturday 15th November where the incredible Mariatu Kanneh-Mason will come back to Tatsfield to perform Elgar's cello concerto – tickets will go on sale for this at the beginning of September and will surely sell out very quickly! Tatsfield is very lucky to have such a fantastic orchestra and top-class soloists – long may it continue.

TATSFIFLD MARTIAL ARTS

On 27th April, the Surrey County Championship took place in Redhill. TMA had seven members competing.

In the u16s, Jane Callaghan won a silver medal in the u57kg group. In the boys' u55kg group, Aiden Wawengkang placed fifth. Maude Stokes, fighting in the u32kg girls competed in only her second competition so lots of valuable experience gained.

In the o16s, Harvey Davy and Kayden Plinston both fought in the high grades u73kg group. Harvey found himself in a difficult pool. Only 16-years old, he was up against a 23-year-old black belt and a very experienced 45-year-old 3rd Dan black belt and, unfortunately, he was unable to progress out of his pool. In the other pool, Kayden lost his first fight to another 17-year-old black belt. In his second fight, he was up against a 40-year-old black belt and managed to win, throwing his opponent for a score. In his third fight, the semi-final, he faced the 3rd Dan that Harvey had fought earlier. It was a tough contest which went into golden score (extra time) before Kayden was caught by a throw so had to settle for a bronze medal – it was his first time competing at u73kg, so positives to be taken. Curtis Gatfield also competed in the u73kg group, in the lower grade division. No medal this time but this was his first competition so plenty of experience gained. Ben Davy fought in the high grades u81kg group and won the silver medal. At 47, he was giving away years to his opponents!

Finally, following his fifth place at the Antwerp Open early in the year, Kayden has been selected to represent England, at the Venray International in the Netherlands towards the end of June. This will involve a 4-day trip away with the England judo squad. Hopefully, he'll put in a similar performance to the one at Antwerp.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO



Almost every year, an item about the West End actress Edyth Goodall (1886-1929) appears in the records. 100 years ago, she had a holiday home in Goatsfield Road and in June 1925 in an

interview with the periodical, 'The Era', she described the benefits of having a second home in Tatsfield:

"The charms of country life always entrance me. There is tremendous fascination about it. Mothers love the green meadows; the mud on the country lanes; the farmyards and all the livestock therein; the birds of the air, and what is more, I love the splendid isolation.

"Country life is the closest thing to life. It is tremendously in touch with life itself. Indeed, it is real not artificial life. It is the atmosphere that holds me spellbound. Whether it is wet or whether it is fine, it makes no difference to me.

"Anybody who lives in London for instance, is cut off from the eternal miracle of Spring; and how many millions of people do not see Spring in her beauty.

"It is known that I have a cottage in the country, but when I tell people where it is they invariably say: "Have never heard of it, it is off the map." My cottage is in Tatsfield, exactly on the borders of Surrey and Kent.



"My problem really is how to live the 24 hours of every day. I am crazy about my work and the stage; but I am terribly anxious also to see to everything myself in the miniature farm I have at Tatsfield.

"Country life helps me in my theatrical work. It keeps one young and fresh. Any change of environment keeps me from getting stale. It is an extraordinary complete rest one gets when switched right away from the theatre and the people of big towns. That rest is necessary for one who like myself puts so much energy into her work as to become almost exhausted at the end of the performance.

"I feel sometimes utterly tired when I leave the theatre; and the mere fact that I hear the nightingale as I walk up to my cottage in the country, from the garage is consoling and refreshing to me.

"I always think what an awful thing it is that so many millions of English people die without having heard the nightingale.

"My cottage in the country is quite different from the residences of other artists one sees photographed weekly in the illustrated journals. You would be surprised to see my mode of dressing; a tunic, breeches, boots, and gaiters, and my husband wears clothes he

actually wore on a ranch in California. I have had the snow literally up to my knees; but I don't care, I hear the nightingale.

"I remember on one occasion, two friends of my husband came to the cottage, bringing with them their dress suits. We went into tears with laughter. Fancy a farmer and his wife in evening dress at home.

"My son always knows when I am coming to town, because he sees me in a skirt".

WILDLIFF GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

It's good news month!

Good News #1: Hedgehogs are out and about and have been seen in the village. So please do think about encouraging them with some cat biscuits. And maybe introduce a few hedgehog-sized (13cm x 13cm) holes in your fences to help them move about without venturing onto the roads. For more info search 'Hedgehog highway'.

Good News #2: There are now plenty of fledgelings about and the really good news for us are the mating pair of starlings in our garden – Mum has disappeared off to the nest and Dad is being run ragged taking food to the brood. Yay! These chirpy little birds were once everywhere but we've somehow decimated their population by a monstrous 85%. So, the poor starling is now on the red list as a critically endangered species. Hence, it's wonderful to see we have a breeding pair in our back yard.

Good News #3: Like many of you good folk, the RHS has got into the spirit of No-Mow-May, and they've had spectacular results across all five of their gardens. Flora and fauna have benefited greatly, and rare orchids and moths have made a dramatic comeback with some species making a first-ever appearance. And the Rosemoor meadows are reported to be brimming with wildlife (their words, not mine!).

Anyhow, back on the subject of wildlife gardening tips; I recently came across a couple of problems that both have the same solution. Firstly, many of us pet owners will put pet fur out for the birds to nest with thinking that we're doing our feathered friends a favour. But it turns out that, despite our best intentions, the opposite is true. The problem is that if a pet has been treated with flea or tick treatment then that's an insecticide that will poison the brood if it gets in a nest, and it's becoming a big problem. How sad is that; we're killing with kindness - dog groomers beware!

The second problem is that most of us will (or should) be using peat-free compost but I've found that it dries out fast, and my seeds, seedlings & cutting fail. But hurrah, there are water retaining granules you can buy to fix this. But a quick look on the RHS website will tell you that many of these products are plastic, and so the RHS don't recommend them because of the risk of micro-plastic contamination. I'm sure there are reputable suppliers that don't use plastic but it's difficult for us amateur gardeners to tell which is which.

The solution to both problems is one that appeals to me partly because I do a bit of part-time shepherding, so I have a soft spot for our fleecy friends. Yep, its sheep wool. You can put it out for the birds to safely nest with, and it also makes a perfectly natural water retaining additive for compost, especially for hanging baskets and seedlings. I'm going to give it a go and see how we get on. If you don't have access to sheep's wool, the RHS suggest a company called Twool (twool.co.uk) who sell a whole range of innovative stuff.

THE TATSFIELD GARDENER IN JUNE

It is ironic that as I write (mid-May) we are already hearing that water restrictions are likely, and we must take care to avoid excessive use of water in the house and garden. In over 20 years of warnings that we need to increase storage capacity to capture heavy rainfall in between periods of dry weather, it seems no one was listening! As for leaks, I won't go there! Be in no doubt, it will be the householders and gardeners who will be the first to suffer restrictions on our use of water, so we need to do what we can to store it. This dry period will break down, often with storms and heavy rain; having water butts connected to downpipes to capture rainwater is very effective. I can store 600 litres in two butts, and that will go a long way. Waste water, or grey water, from the house can be used to water the garden especially if it is stored for a while to let it settle before use.

Never water the garden in the heat of the day, water droplets on foliage in direct sun act as a lens and can cause a lot of damage and a lot of the water will be lost to evaporation. Never use a hose without a sprinkler on the end, plants can't absorb such a heavy amount and most of it will be lost.

Spare a thought for our wildlife in these conditions and put out shallow trays of water in a shady spot and on the bird feeders. Make sure to change the water regularly to avoid the risk of contamination and disease.

During May we had several weeks of cold, drying, wind from the North and East causing wind burn due to the drying out, or desiccation, of foliage irrespective of the amount of water used. In these conditions the rate of water loss from the foliage is greater than the plants' ability to replace it. Plants that were put out directly from the greenhouse are particularly vulnerable. The shock of foliage damage can stop a young plant from growing, and with some very soft plants, they may not recover.

This is a great year for flower and growth especially for shrubs and trees. You may be tempted to trim your hedges this month but before you do, please remember that our birds are still busy nesting, some with second broods. Cutting the hedge will cause great disturbance and can result in the nest being abandoned. More information is available at www.rspb.org

Of course, we mustn't forget the towering **Beech** trees that are equally beautiful at this time of the year, particularly when the sun shines through the canopy of fresh green leaves. Here's a photo to remind you, or perhaps to show what you missed. To my surprise, I got lost when I visited the woods. There are so many tracks to follow, most of which lead nowhere. I must remember to take a compass with me next year!



I'm not the only one who's been out and about with a camera. Amber (Tamcken) sent us some lovely photos of the **Mallard** ducklings on the village pond (25.04.25):

'I am sure you have had an influx of photos of our beautiful ducklings but I wanted to share mine with you. Prepare yourself for a cuteness overload!'





Thanks for sharing your photos, Amber. I was lucky enough to see ten adult Mallards on the water as I walked to the Post Office the other day. Having spoken to various locals, I can't help feeling that it is perhaps time to reinstate the duck house that used to adorn our village pond. Or perhaps that's too radical a thought for certain people to entertain?

A couple of weeks late Amber emailed again, this time with photos that prove once and for all that we do indeed have at least one **Raven** flying over the village. Up until now we've relied on purely anecdotal evidence, but Amber has now provided hard, <u>visual</u> evidence of their presence (09.05.25):

'Exciting news! I have just spotted one of our ravens this morning, unfortunately I did not have my camera but I was able to take a quick snap on my phone, I heard him before I saw him. The photo is not the best but I thought I'd share it anyway!'

Thanks for this great news, Amber. I don't think I've ever seen you without your camera!





'I had just finished dropping Lucien off at the nursery otherwise I probably would have had it. I always see amazing birds or plants when I don't have my camera! It was flying over the green by Sheree's. I hung around to see its partner but unfortunately it was alone.'

I'm amazed it was seen over the central village. Perhaps more sightings will be reported before too long. This reminds me of the time we had our first proven sighting of Red Kites. 'Exciting' is, without doubt, the best way of describing this observation.

This is a rare appearance, not just here in Tatsfield but within Surrey. John Bucknill stated in his book ('The Birds of Surrey', 1900): 'At the present day, whatever may have been its early status in the county, it is not, as far as I'm aware, a resident and only a very, very rare visitor'. Similarly, in 1972, Donald Parr, while recognising that there were probably Ravens breeding in Surrey in small numbers up to the middle of the nineteenth century, wrote ('Birds in Surrey, 1900-1970'): 'Extremely scarce visitor'. Did I say this was an exciting observation? I've changed my mind. This was a mega-exciting observation!



THE NIGHT SKY IN TATSFIFLD – JUNE 2025

Rather unbelievably, the summer solstice is upon us again with the result that astronomers get restless for more dark skies whilst the less astronomically minded are grateful for the maximum number of daylight hours. To be precise, that is 16 hours 35 minutes and 44 seconds of daylight on 21st June which, in round numbers, is 8 hours and 44 minutes more than we had at the time of the winter solstice in December.

The moment of the summer solstice occurs at 3:42am and marks the moment in time when the Earth's northern hemisphere is at its most tilted towards the Sun giving us, in the north, maximum daylight. If you were standing on the tropic of cancer at local midday, the Sun would be overhead. After the solstice the Sun gets imperceptibly lower in the sky each day which gradually reduces the amount of daylight.

However, in the middle of summer, when the Sun is high during the day for us in the northern hemisphere, it is low in the daytime sky for those in the southern hemisphere. We in the north can see that this is the case because at night the sky doesn't get properly dark as the Sun is never very far below the northern horizon. In other words, a Sun that is not far below the horizon for us is not far above the horizon in places such as Australia and New Zealand.

For it to be "astronomically dark" the centre of the Sun must be at least 18° below the horizon, something that doesn't happen from approximately 24th May until 20th July. During that time, we exist in astronomical twilight during the night when the Sun is between 12° and 18° below the horizon.

At the beginning of June, you might just catch sight of Jupiter very low down in the north west at around 9pm. As the month progresses, the planet gets closer to the Sun until on the 24th it passes the Sun (is in conjunction with it) and then appears in the morning sky some weeks later.

In the second half of June, Mercury appears soon after sunset low in the WNW at around 9pm. Please don't search for Mercury or Jupiter with any optical aid until you are certain that sunset has occurred or you risk permanently damaging your eyesight if you inadvertently look at the Sun.

Mars is the only reasonably bright planet that remains easily visible during the evenings this month. On the 1st at 10:30pm it is almost exactly due west with an altitude of 25°. From the horizon to overhead is 90° so Mars is just over a quarter of the way "up". As an aid to finding the red planet, the Moon is only 5° to the east (left) of it. Then again, on the 29th, the Moon is closer still being just 2° to the west (right) this time.

If you happen to look east in the early morning, around 4am, you will see Venus, now in the role of "The Morning Star", just under ten degrees above the horizon. As the month passes it climbs higher in the sky until, on the 30th, it is 14° in altitude at a similar time.

Entering the hall what a lovely bright, airy start to the exhibition. Colourful stands all around me displaying the talent and creativity of local artists and the buzz of conversations as visitors admired and critiqued the work.



I was offered a lovely glass of wine and, after a surprise encounter with some friends from my own art class, refreshed, I left my bag behind the counter and armed with a pen and notebook I set off enthusiastically to closely examine the individual artists' work.











Starting with BRIAN LING whose work was delightfully varied with a mixed colour palette and some very pleasing compositions. Astonishing when you are told he is colour blind. Any proceeds from his work he kindly donates to The Hospice in the Weald in memory of Wendy Maddison.

TASH WATERMAN next door was also very colourful. Though less colourful, her 'Rainy Day in London'

stood out with beautiful, contrasting light and shade. A great composition. The two silhouettes of ships on SIMON COOK's stand were wonderfully illuminated against dramatic skies. The intricate rigging immediately transporting one back to a bye-gone age. Fascinating also was his portrayal of two soldiers in white acrylic on a black background. CHRISTINE STAINER's paintings showed great originality. Her beautiful haystack surrounded by verdant grassy hills was particularly 'lush' with many of them working well as cards.

MAGGIE GARSTANG, obviously a lover of colour, had transported her love of flowers onto some beautifully modelled and decoupaged pigs and elephants. Her paintings especially the portraits reminiscent of Klimt with his use of gold leaf.







Onto the stage, where NIGEL SHAW had laboriously produced atmospheric oil pastels which led



the viewer into experiences of light and weather and almost, at times, remembered sounds, all within a very contained, almost monochrome colour palette. His mark making very like Monet's Haystacks creating atmosphere drew you in and I could imagine them treble the size

In stark contrast the flamboyant colours of CAROL GASKELL's flowers, landscapes and fruit were very pleasing. Her orange, plum, pear and apple were bold yet her flowers in vases were more delicate and looked almost like mosaics. Particularly enjoyable were her depictions of Toad, Badger, Ratty and Mole collaged onto a joyful stream. I imagine she is someone who likes to experiment according to her mood.

I wasn't surprised some of the boxed in marquetry and embroidery of RITA McKAY were not for sale. Time consuming and beautifully presented, they must have taken hours. Hard to put a price on but I hope they are hung where they can be suitably admired. The 'House on the Hill' by SUSAN SMALE draws you straight in with wonderful colours and depth. What a wonderful view! Susan's love of detail and nature was very evident in all her work.







Coming off the stage, an original and English take on Manga design so wonderfully translates into original and delightful cards. MOLLY CHAPMAN has perfected the often overlooked skill of cutting away the unnecessary detail and overworking. Her colour schemes were original and inspiring. In the next corner was STEVE GASKELL's beautifully illuminated butterfly wings and shiny beetle and dragonfly. Bold, beautiful and strangely alive! Such skill catching these colours in oil crayon and biro and making an age-old subject look so contemporary.

The works that LINDA LAMBERT exhibited especially came to life when struck through with flowing 'water' or 'cloud' in swirly multicoloured acrylic.









JACKIE FLAHERTY's accomplished and prolific paintings showed versatility and, also translated well into beautiful cards. Brimming with skill the MILLENIUM GROUP put together some delightful pictures, varied and worthy.

Beside them were MONICA WADE and SHIRLEY DAVIES, a stand full of mystery and myth with an interesting mixture of otherworldly landscapes. Something always draws me to driftwood and JO WEATHERALD's table with beautiful hanging beads and shells,



blending natural and synthetic threaded wall mountings, which would look beautiful inside the home or out.

Mixing abstract with slightly realistic, HANNAH FRANKLIN's work was different and interesting. Her 'Elephant and Dino

Boy Rocks' were original and great.

Coming onto the central aisles of the exhibition, I found TATSFIELD SCHOOL. They were represented very well among the more seasoned artists. Great original work by single pupils and, also, a couple of collaborations which showed a wide variation of skills.



KRIS SPENDLOVE has a very believable talent for depicting human bodies. 'The Workout' looked like he could spring out from the page! I imagine MIKE

MOORE's love of flowers may well extend to his garden? He certainly brings the vivacity inside and his vase of flowers were bright and lively. A special recommendation for GILL MANNERS' painting of 'Misty Riverside' an unusual and pleasing composition. In stark contrast the pear next to it was vibrant and showed how not commonly chosen colours can represent the object so well. What a skill!





Round the corner, JANE O'KEEFE uses felted wool to produce interesting pictures and wonderful animal sculptures beautifully mounted on slices of wood showing the rings in the
